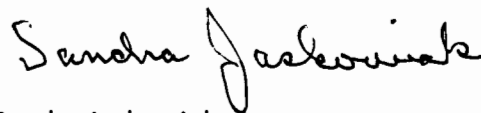

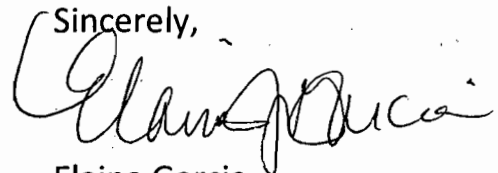

I strongly oppose giving St. Elizabeth a certificate of need. I oppose for several reasons.

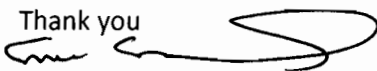

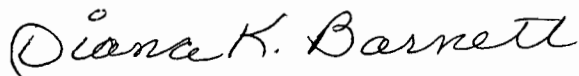

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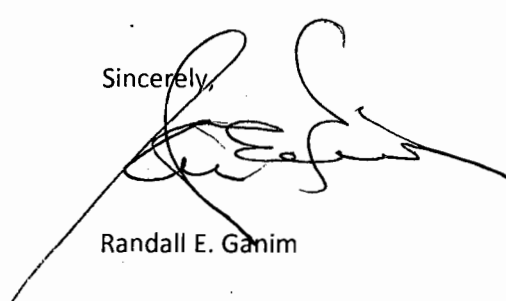

I'm writing this letter to voice my concerns about St. Elizabeth Hospital's request to move to O'Fallon. I have also proposed a possible solution for the move that provides a Win-Win solution for everyone involved.

St. Elizabeth Hospital and its parent company Hospital Sisters Health System has given two reasons why the hospital needs to move to O'Fallon:

1. The downtown Belleville location is not as easily accessible (one-way streets & parking) as the proposed site off interstate 64.
2. Modernization (Rebuilding or Remodeling) at the current Belleville Hospital site is not cost effective or efficient.

Concerning the cost of rebuilding (\$365M) or remodeling (\$353M) at the current location, these costs are not significantly different ($< 18\%$) from the cost of building a new hospital (\$300M) especially since all of these costs are only estimates that are dependent on the construction requirements as defined by St. Elizabeth Hospital. (The 18% difference is well within the 20% estimating cost error when comparing any two of the hospital cost estimates – typical building cost estimates have a $\pm 10\%$ error.) Also, the new hospital will have half the number of beds as the current hospital (144 vs. 303), which actually makes the new hospital twice as expensive as modernization. Therefore, it's very difficult, if not impossible, to do a realistic comparison of these costs and the assumed cost savings of relocating the hospital.

Obviously the relocation of the hospital to O'Fallon would definitely improve access for patients and emergency services to the new hospital near interstate 64 and get away from Belleville's congested downtown streets. But what about the people that don't have transportation – how do people get medical care without traveling to Memorial or the nearest hospital in O'Fallon, Red Bud and Sparta?

Another concern about the move is there will only be 51 beds (Red Bud with 25 beds & Sparta with 26 beds) to serve the people south and west of the current St. Elizabeth's Hospital while there will be 1,767 beds north of the current location. The surrounding communities to the south and west of Belleville have voiced their opposition to the move for the obvious reason – they are concerned people will not have easy access to medical services they need and will have farther to travel to get the critical emergency-room care when they need it. And obviously being farther away from a hospital could make the difference between life or death in an emergency situation.

In reality, I think St. Elizabeth's wants to move to get away from the poor, unemployed and uninsured people in Belleville that might have problems with paying their bills. I think St. Elizabeth's does not want to deal with people on Medicaid or people that receive subsidies under the Affordable Care Act (subsidies that go away over time) or have to deal with the State of Illinois with its financial problems. I think the bottom-line business concern for St. Elizabeth's Hospital is – they are very concerned that payments made through a third-party payer will not cover the costs of the medical services that they provide.

As far as moving St. Elizabeth's Hospital to O'Fallon, it makes good business sense for St. Elizabeth to move and I would support the move if – and it's a big IF – the medical needs of the people in Belleville were addressed and the people of Belleville had easy access to medical care and services they need without having to go to Memorial Hospital or any other hospital in the Belleville area.

What I propose is that the State of Illinois step-up and be part of this relocation – by establishing a “Medical Clinic” at the current St. Elizabeth Hospital in partnership with St. Elizabeth (and possibly Memorial) and the City of Belleville to provide the critical emergency-room care and personal medical services that the people of Belleville need in their daily lives. The State of Illinois would take ownership of the hospital building and maintain the building for the medical clinic. As far as the doctors, nurses and administrators needed for the clinic, the State of Illinois would establish a “College Tuition-Assistance Program” that would pay for a student's tuition to get these young professionals to work at the clinic for five years after their graduation.

Therefore, the Medical Clinic provides a Win-Win solution for everyone concerned by keeping the medical care and services needed in downtown Belleville and allowing St. Elizabeth's to move to O'Fallon. The Medical Clinic plan can prove to be a good "Business and Community Model" for other cities in Illinois and possibly the nation – by providing medical care to the poor and under-served in urban areas and keeping health-care costs affordable without burdening the middle-class with higher premiums for medical insurance.

Additional Side Comments:

In another way of establishing Medical Clinics in some large urban areas, the Federal Government could get involved using Veteran Administration Hospitals as the Medical Clinics to provide the medical care and services needed by the poor, unemployed and uninsured people.

In a November 14th USA Today newspaper, an article titled "Hospitals: System set up to fail" talks about the 43 Rural Hospitals closed since January 2010. The hospital administrators say federal regulators and state governments created policies and reimbursement rates that make it impossible for rural hospitals to survive. These stand-alone community hospitals are basically funded through government programs – Medicare (44.8%) and Medicaid (14.0%) – because that's how their patients are insured. So my question is – What's a State to do to provide medical care for its residents?

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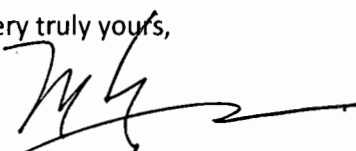

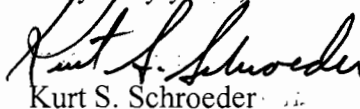
