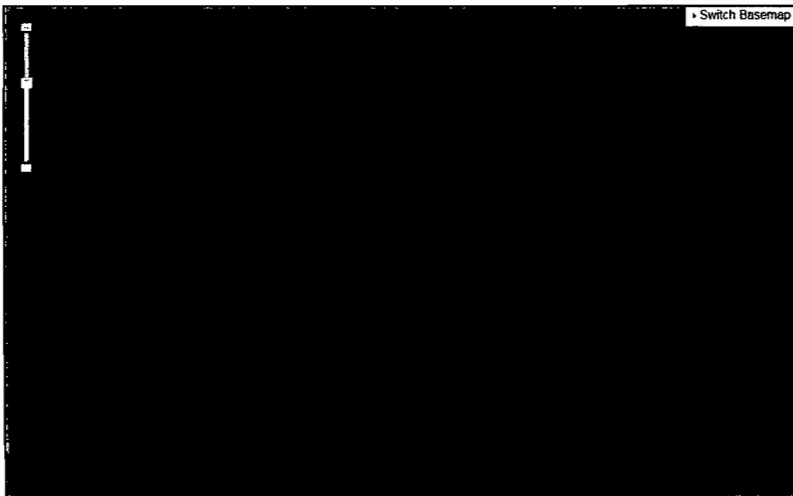

This project is for the establishment of a freestanding birthing center in Bloomington, IL, to be owned and operated by the private entity known as Bloomington-Normal Birthing Center, LLC. In accordance with the Health Facilities Planning Act, the proposed birthing center is designed to reverse the trends of increasing costs of health care, while maintaining highest quality standards and enhancing choice and access for the population served by the center to receive the necessary health services.

BNBC Land, LLC, a limited liability corporation comprised of the principle owners of Bloomington-Normal Birthing Center, LLC, has a signed letter of intent to purchase a building at 6 Westport Court in Bloomington, located in B-1 zoning and the site of a former daycare. The proposed birthing center will do business as Bloomington-Normal Birthing Center. As proposed, this project would be one of the 10 possible birth centers allowed as part of the demonstration project set forth in Section 1110.3130 "Birth Center - Alternative Health Care Model - Review Criteria" of Title 77, Chapter II, Subchapter a of the Illinois General Assembly Administrative Code. More specifically, the proposed center would fulfill the requirement to be one of three allowed sites to be located in a municipality with a population of 50,000 or more not otherwise located in Cook, DuPage, Kane, Lake, McHenry or Will counties.

Figure 1: HPSA Bloomington-Normal, IL



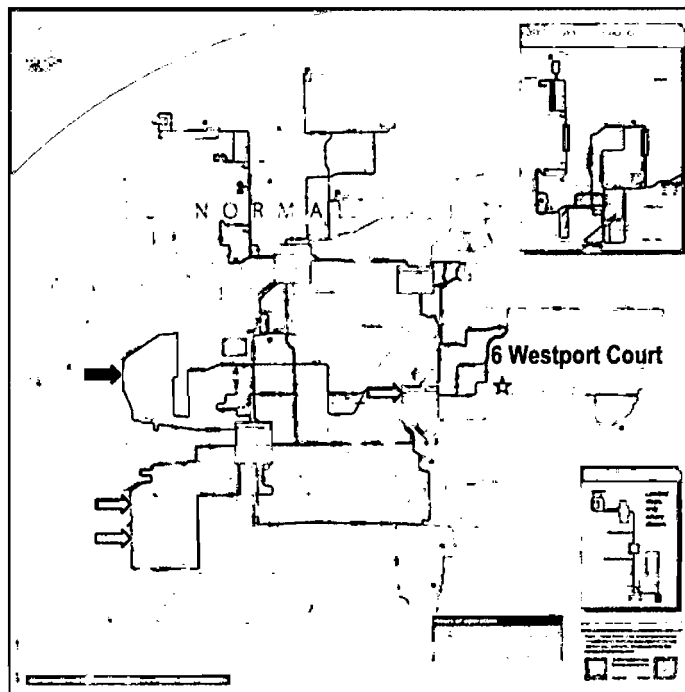
The proposed site at 6 Westport Court will predominantly serve the residents of a health professional shortage area in accordance with Section 1110.3130 "Birth Center - Alternative Health Care Model - Review Criteria" of Title 77, Chapter II, Subchapter b of the Illinois General Assembly Administrative Code: *The first 3 birth centers authorized to be operated by IDPH shall be located in or provide service to a health professional shortage area, as determined by the U.S.*

Department of Health and Human Services. [210 ILCS 3/30]. As shown in the map titled Figure 1, the Westport property for the proposed birthing center (denoted as a red star) is approximately 3 miles to the east of the designated primary care health provider shortage area (green shaded area), but it is part of the larger mental health shortage area (purple). The owners of Bloomington-Normal Birthing Center, LLC considered two other properties in south Bloomington which were in the HPSA designated area; however the Westport site proved to be the best overall choice when considering access to EMS, proximity to hospital, location along a major east-west thoroughfare, access to interstates, access to public transportation as well as best purchase value and renovation potential. It is also positioned in an area that is the directional growth for the community, to the east. The proposed site is a 22 year old, 6000 sf building in very good condition, being purchased for \$50/sf. It is less than a 1/2 mile from the closest EMS (Bloomington Fire State 3, located on Empire Street), and under 2 miles from OSF St. Joseph Medical

Center, with which Bloomington-Normal Birthing Center, LLC has secured a contractual transfer agreement. Being close to EMS and OSF St. Joseph Medical Center is of utmost importance to the owners of Bloomington-Normal Birthing Center, LLC to ensure a patient immediate access to emergency surgical backup services and other such higher level care, as stipulated in Section 1110.3130 "Birth Center - Alternative Health Care Model - Review Criteria" of Title 77, Chapter II, Subchapter f of the Illinois General Assembly Administrative Code: *Birth centers shall be located within 30 minutes ground travel time from the licensed hospital to allow for an emergency caesarian delivery to be started within 30 minutes after the decision that a caesarian delivery is necessary.* [210 ILCS 3/35]

Access to public transportation and other supportive services to the Center's intended patients and families are also important criteria. The property is situated along Empire St/Route 9, which is a major east-west thoroughfare that most directly connects the HPSA area to the west to this property. Figure 2 shows the local bus lines for in town public transportation that we expect to be of service to the Center's patients who rely on or prefer public transportation. The most direct route for the most underserved of the community would be taking the brown, yellow or red from the west or south to the Eastland Mall transfer point, and then getting on the teal to Westport. The distance covered in this trip is approximately 5-6 total miles. The proposed site will also be about a mile from the YWCA on Hershey and Empire, and about 4 miles from the McLean County Health Department, with which we expect to build relationships to help serve the needs of their clients needing maternity care.

Bloomington-Normal is fortunate to be located at the crossroads of several major highways: I-55, I-74, and I-39, as well as US-51 to the south, US-150 east/west, and IL-9 east/west which provide direct access to the most rural sections of the region. Such proximity to these highways will allow for easy access to the communities of the nearby counties of Logan, Dewitt, Tazewell and Woodford, all or significant portions of which are designated as HPSA areas.

The populations of Bloomington and Normal are 77,000 and 53,000 respectively; and the entire county population for McLean County is 170,000 and is expected to surpass 176,000 by 2017. Directionally the growth of the community is to the northeast in Normal and east/southeast in Bloomington, for which the proposed birthing center site is well positioned. The eastside of Bloomington-Normal is also still the focus of a possible eastside bypass study intended to improve the connectivity of I-55 and I-74 to the east.

The principle owners of Bloomington-Normal Birthing Center, LLC have secured the financing from Heartland Bank and Trust Company, Bloomington, IL to support the startup of the new proposed birthing center business, including startup expenses, as well as purchase and renovations of the property. Initially a line of credit will be extended to the principles of Bloomington-Normal Birthing Center, LLC to cover the

expenses incurred during the pre-approval phase of this project. If granted approval of the CON application for this project by the state, the principles will proceed with the purchase and renovation of the property at 6 Westport Court, Bloomington. Heartland Bank and Trust Company has already approved the financing for the principles to move forward with the purchase and renovation of the property.

The proposed birthing center is a substantive project because it is offering a new service not otherwise offered in McLean County (Illinois Health Planning Area D-04), or anywhere in downstate at this time. Bloomington-Normal Birthing Center will offer an out of hospital birthing service to those who are low risk and who want to choose a safe alternative in a comfortable environment that minimizes the use of technology and is cost effective. The proposed Bloomington-Normal Birthing Center facility will offer up to 3 birthing rooms, space for prenatal visits, educational space, along with private office space, and personal, home-like space for family to gather during the labor experience. All new patients will receive a consultation to ensure that the birthing center is the safest choice for mom and baby's needs. The Center's team of professionals will guide their patients through a very personal birth experience, from prenatal care, natural childbirth, and full postpartum care. The Center expects to deliver about 200 births per year, and offer an array of educational classes including childbirth education, diet/exercise, as well as pregnancy massage/yoga and support group options for our patients.

The Birthing Center, which will operate as a closed model for the professionals delivering the birthing services, will employ a staff of Registered Nurses, Certified Nurse Midwives, Techs, and Doulas. Two midwives are already employed as part of the owners' practices, and have interest in working for the Birthing Center. The pool of registered nurses in the community is boosted by the two College of Nursing programs in Bloomington-Normal: Mennonite College of Nursing at Illinois State University, and Illinois Wesleyan University College of Nursing. Furthermore, Heartland Community College offers an Associate Degree in Nursing, a Practical Nursing Certificate, or a Nursing Assistant Certificate; and the Bloomington Area Vocational Center offers numerous healthcare related programs, such as Nursing Assistant and Advanced CNA. These educational programs along with the pool of candidates from area hospitals and medical offices will be the primary source for our staff and clinical director for the Birthing Center. Additionally, the Central Illinois region boasts of a very engaged and enthusiastic network of midwives and doulas. This group has embraced the early discussions about bringing a birthing center to Bloomington-Normal. Over 100 attended an educational event held in November, and over 300 have engaged with the Bloomington-Normal Birthing Centers' Facebook page, BN Birthcenter, in less than 3 months. Several others are following the Center's news via Twitter, Instagram and Pinterest.

Bloomington-Normal Birthing Center will not discriminate against any patient requiring treatment because of the source of payment for services, including Medicare and Medicaid recipients; and it will be certified to participate in the Medicare and Medicaid programs. Furthermore, Bloomington-Normal Birthing Center will adhere to charitable care practices consistent with comparable health care providers in the area. Finally, Bloomington-Normal Birthing Center will adhere strictly to birth center practice standards as outlined by the American Association of Birth Centers (AABC), and will plan to obtain full accreditation from the AABC. Patients of the Birthing Center will be continually monitored during the course of their pregnancy to ensure they meet the criteria for a low risk pregnancy. The Center's certified nurse midwives will be highly trained in the process of natural childbirth, offering their patients a variety of labor and delivery options including water birth for laboring and delivery. The principle owners of Bloomington-Normal Birthing Center, LLC believe in the benefits of water birth and anticipate offering it as an option to patients. To honor the ACOG opinion statement on water births, however, the Center's Medical Director will remain in close collaboration with AABC and ongoing studies on this topic. All activities of the Center will be closely monitored for quality and compliance by the Center's team of board certified obstetricians.

Bloomington-Normal Birthing Center, LLC is seeking approval for a free-standing birthing center, via the Certificate of Need process from the IL Health Facilities Services Review Board (IHFSB). If approved we will seek licensing to operate from the IDPH.

2. Complete description of the proposed undertaking:

This project is for the establishment of a freestanding birthing center in Bloomington, IL, to be owned and operated by the private entity known as Bloomington-Normal Birthing Center, LLC. In accordance with the Health Facilities Planning Act, the proposed birthing center is designed to reverse the trends of increasing costs of health care, while maintaining highest quality standards and enhancing choice and access for the population served by the center to receive the necessary health services.

BNBC Land, LLC, a limited liability corporation comprised of the principle owners of Bloomington-Normal Birthing Center, LLC, has a signed letter of intent to purchase a building at 6 Westport Court in Bloomington, located in B-1 zoning and the site of a former daycare. The proposed birthing center will do business as Bloomington-Normal Birthing Center. As proposed, this project would be one of the 10 possible birth centers allowed as part of the demonstration project set forth in Section 1110.3130 "Birth Center - Alternative Health Care Model - Review Criteria" of Title 77, Chapter II, Subchapter a of the Illinois General Assembly Administrative Code. More specifically, the proposed center would fulfill the requirement to be one of three allowed sites to be located in a municipality with a population of 50,000 or more not otherwise located in Cook, DuPage, Kane, Lake, McHenry or Will counties.

All new patients will receive a consultation to ensure that the birthing center is the safest choice for mom and baby's needs. The Center's team of professionals will guide their patients through a very personal birth experience, from prenatal care, natural childbirth, and full postpartum care. The Center expects to deliver about 200 births per year, and offer an array of educational classes including childbirth education, diet/exercise, as well as pregnancy massage/yoga and support group options for our patients.

The proposed site at 6 Westport Court will predominantly serve the residents of a health professional shortage area in accordance with Section 1110.3130 "Birth Center - Alternative Health Care Model - Review Criteria" of Title 77, Chapter II, Subchapter b of the Illinois General Assembly Administrative Code: The first 3 birth centers authorized to be operated by IDPH shall be located in or provide service to a health professional shortage area, as determined by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services. Bloomington-Normal Birthing Center will not discriminate against any patient requiring treatment because of the source of payment for services, including Medicare and Medicaid recipients; and it will be certified to participate in the Medicare and Medicaid programs. 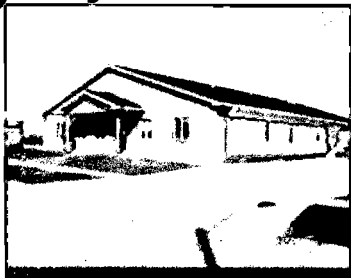

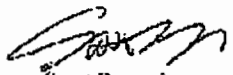

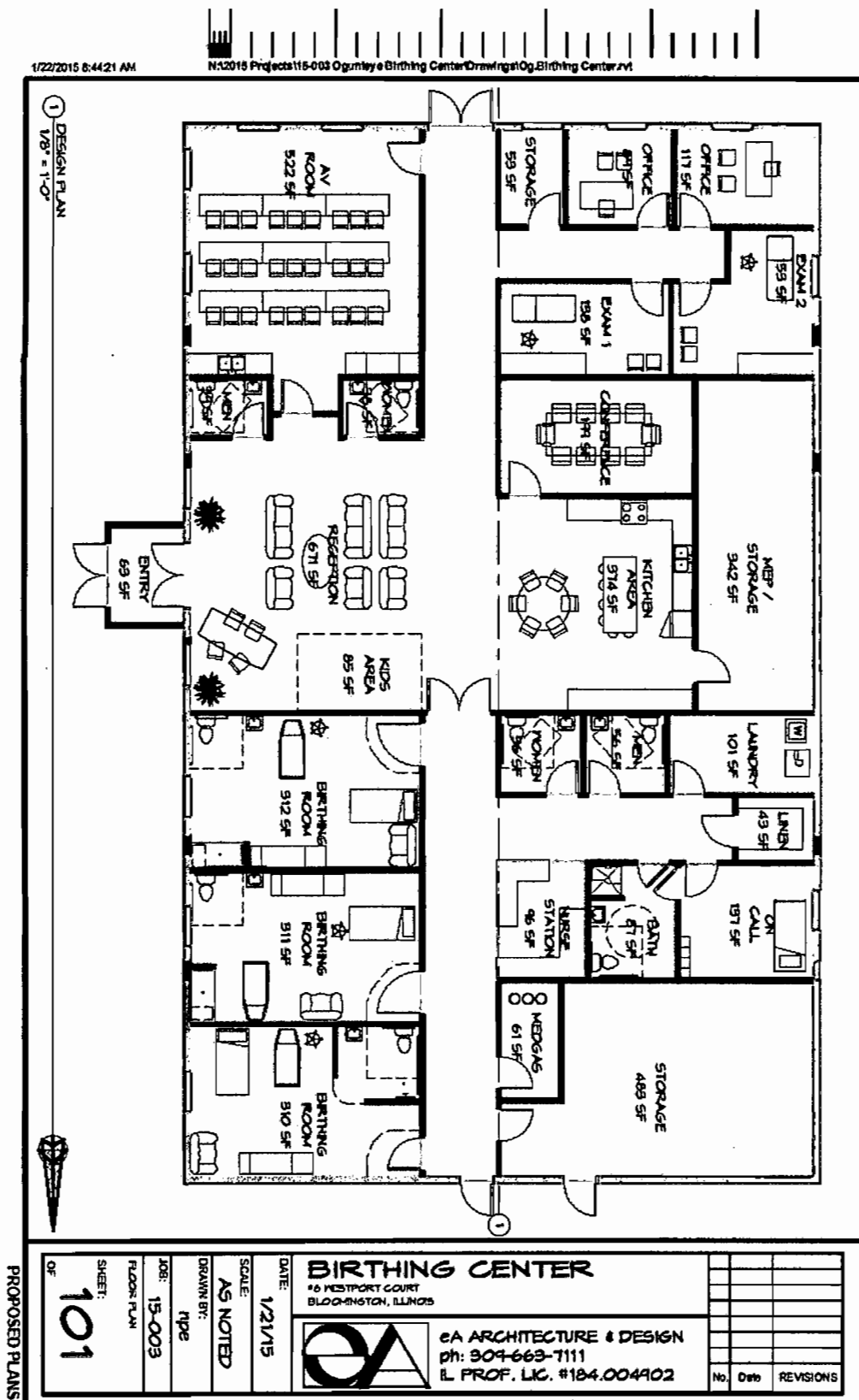

1. How will the project provide health services that improve the health care or well-being of the market area population to be served?

The proposed Bloomington-Normal Birthing Center will offer a new service not otherwise offered in McLean County (Illinois Health Planning Area D-04), or anywhere in downstate at this time. Bloomington-Normal Birthing Center will offer an out of hospital birthing service to those who are low risk and who want to choose a safe alternative in a comfortable environment that minimizes the use of technology and is cost effective. It will address the need to control the upward spiraling trend of healthcare costs without compromising quality of care.

In 2013, Illinois had \$7.6 billion in unpaid hospital bills, and as such Illinois realizes that healthcare spending is not sustainable and must change. Illinois enacted the "Alternative Health Care Delivery Act" permitting new facilities to be established on a demonstration basis. The cost of maternity and newborn care are one of the biggest contributors to state-funded healthcare bills, making the concept of a freestanding birth center especially appropriate for serious consideration of alternative models of healthcare delivery. According to a study done in 2013, commissioned by Childbirth Connection, Catalyst for Payment Reform, and the Center for Health Care Quality and Payment Reform, (transform.childbirthconnection) the cost to Medicaid for a vaginal delivery is approximately \$9,000. Another study done in the Medicare & Medicaid Research Review in 2014 calculated the average costs of care for childbirth at a freestanding birth center to be \$2,780 less than that of a hospital (Howell et al. E7), or a savings of nearly 30% per birth.

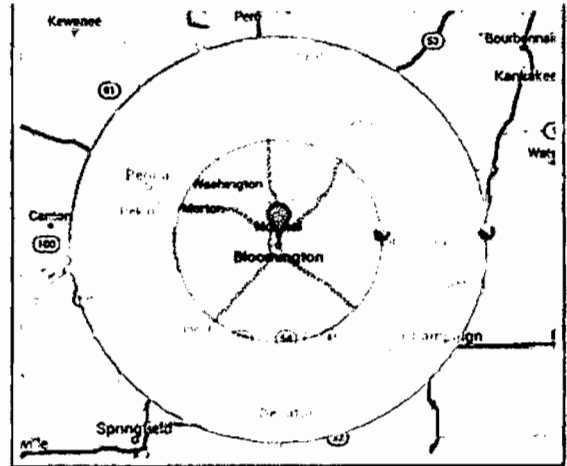
And yet, the most redeeming quality of the birthing center is that it is a safe alternative that delivers quality of care comparable to that of the hospital. According to the National Birth Center Study I, fetal and neonatal outcomes were similar as hospital births: Fetal mortality rate was 0.47/1000; Neonatal mortality rate was 0.40/1000. Furthermore, The National Birth Center Study I, which is a study conducted on 12,000 women who were admitted to 84 birthing centers from 1985 to 1987, retrospectively concluded, "Few innovations in health service promise lower cost, greater availability and a high degree of satisfaction with comparable degree of safety". Another study, "San Diego Birth Center Study – A Prospective Study" done in 1998, backed up the National Birth Center Study I, as it concluded, "Current results suggest similar morbidity and mortality between the birth center model and traditional care model, with less resource utilization translating to lower costs in the collaborative practice model. Results suggest that collaborative practice using a freestanding birth center as an adjunct to an integrated perinatal health care system may provide a quality, lower cost alternative for the provision of perinatal services."

Bloomington-Normal is ideally located in the central part of the state, at the crossroads of I-74, I-39, I-55, and US-51. According to the American Association of Birthing Centers (AABC), birthing centers typically increase market share for obstetrics patients by about 25 miles. Traditionally the market share for both hospitals has been McLean County. Expanding the radius beyond the county by 25 miles shows that Bloomington is ideally situated to serve the major communities in Central Illinois: Peoria to the west, Streator and Pontiac to the north, Champaign to the east and Decatur and Lincoln to the south.



Bloomington and Normal combine for a population of approximately 130,000, while the county is on track to top 176,000 by 2017. Bloomington-Normal has always enjoyed a vibrant economy, with a varied portfolio of industries including insurance/financial, education, manufacturing and agriculture. It is home for State Farm headquarters and Country Financial. It is also home to several higher education institutions: Illinois State University, Illinois Wesleyan University, Heartland Community College and Lincoln College. The community has traditionally boasted of a younger community, with an average age of 32, compared to 35 statewide and upwards of 40 in some of the more rural areas in the region. The community has earned a reputation as being a good place to raise a family. In 2011, Bloomington-Normal was named one of the 100 Best Communities for Young People, according to The America's Promise Alliance and ING. Bloomington-Normal was the only community in Illinois to receive the designation. Movoto.com, a real-estate research blog, recently ranked Illinois' 50 most-populated cities looking at factors including crime, education, home values, amenities, cost of living and employment. Normal was considered the best place to live in downstate Illinois. Bloomington followed closely in the #2 position. In 2013, Bloomington was rated #4 on a list of cities you should live (Vox.com), and #3 on a list of cities in the US to look for a job in healthcare, sales, the trucking industry, or restaurant business (Beyond.com). Bloomington was ranked #1 in the State of Illinois and #28 nationally on Forbes list of "The Best Small Places for Business and Careers." Normal has gained notoriety for its proactive stance on sustainability and quality of life. The town was recognized in November 2014 by the League of American Bicyclists as a Bronze Level Bicycle Friendly Community, joining more than 325 visionary communities from across the country. Normal has also been recognized for its development of its Uptown business district, most notably its new traffic circle. The space has been awarded one of the USEPA's highest honor in 2011 - the National Award for Smart Growth Achievement for a Civic Place; and it received the 2012 Transportation Planning Excellence Award by the Federal Highway Administration and Federal Transit Administration. Normal was featured recently in a Chevy Volt commercial as being an "EV Town USA", as both Bloomington and Normal set out on a mission years ago to become the most EV-friendly place in the United States.

All of these accolades illustrate the health and vibrancy of the Bloomington-Normal twin cities, making it a ripe setting for a new business such as the birthing center to locate.

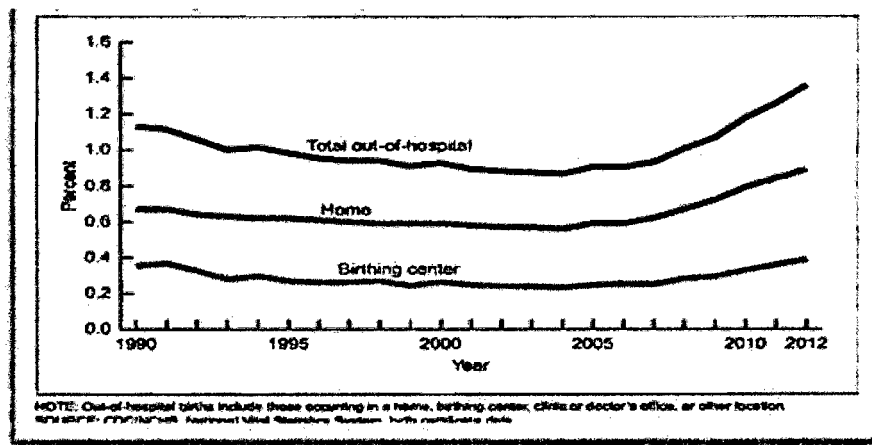
3. Identify the existing problems or issues that need to be addressed, as applicable and appropriate for the project. [See 1110.230(b) for examples of documentation.]

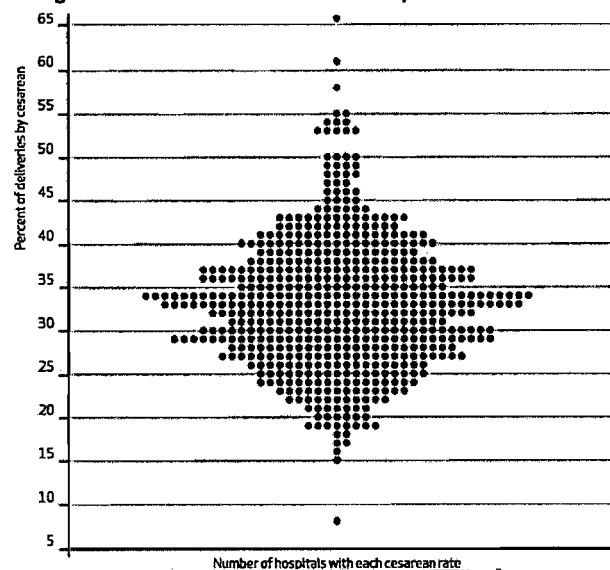
Figure 2: 1990-2012 Trend of Out of Hospital Birth, United States

The freestanding birth center such as Bloomington-Normal Birthing Center addresses the growing trend of out-of-hospital births. Figure 2 illustrates how this trend of out-of-hospital births has risen over the past 10 years.

The greatest increase has been seen among non-Hispanic white women, who are two to four times more likely to give birth out-of-hospital compared to other racial and ethnic groups. While home births are clearly not a

recommended option; the properly accredited birthing centers staffed by certified nurse midwives do have the support of American College of Obstetrics and Gynecology (ACOG) and American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP). In this same time period, the number of U.S. birthing centers increased from 170 in 2004, to nearly 250 in early 2013.

In a 2012 report, published the *Journal of Midwifery & Women's Health*, researchers analyzed two decades of CDC data that showed a greater proportion of women are choosing to rely on midwives. Experts think this trend is a direct reaction to rising rates of C-section births. "Midwives approach birth differently than many physicians: they shy away from inducing labor in most situations, which can lead to a greater likelihood of cesarean delivery. Starting early in the prenatal period, they may take a more holistic approach, emphasizing diet. In labor, they spend much more time in the delivery room, encouraging a woman to try different positions or to walk around to get labor moving." (Rochman, 2012)

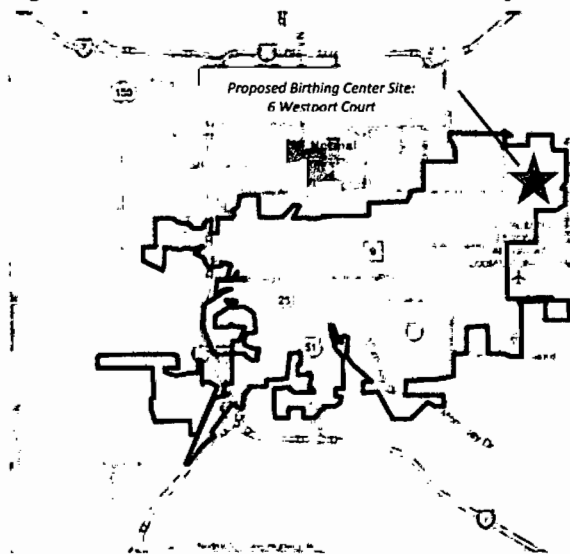
Figure 3: 2009 Distribution of US Hospital Cesarean Rates

In Bloomington-Normal, c-section rates have typically been very high. Both hospitals reported overall c-section rates from 33.8% (310/916) to 39.1% (616/1576) according to their 2013 Annual Hospital Questionnaire, which places them on the upper half of the range of reported c-section rates nationally, as shown in Figure 3.

According to an article published in *Health Affairs* in 2013, by Kozhimannil, Law, Virnig, hospital cesarean rates vary substantially across the U.S. Hospital cesarean rates varied 10-fold across the U.S., from 7% to 70%, and can vary as much as 15-fold for low-risk hospital cesarean delivery rates in facilities with at least 100 deliveries. Such large variations around cesarean rates indicate that differences in practice patterns may be driving costly potential overuse of cesarean in many U.S. hospitals, and ultimately give the consumer concern over an “over-medicalized” birth. The birthing center would give women who meet the low-risk criteria for an out-of-hospital birth the option to have a natural physiological birth. The *National Birth Center Study II* shows that less than 1 in 16 had a cesarean birth (a 6% CS rate) compared to the nearly 30% nationally, and upwards of 35- 40% locally. Having a birthing center in Bloomington-Normal, therefore, would positively impact the local c-section rate.

Given that the cost for a c-section can be 50% higher than a vaginal delivery (transform.childbirthconnection), a birth center in Bloomington-Normal would also help to curtail the costs associated with giving birth. The sticker shock of healthcare is arguably a concern regardless of socio-economic status, but it is especially so for those who fall below poverty level. In the figure to the left, the area outlined represents areas with residents living under the poverty level. Bloomington and Normal rank about even with the state in residents at or below poverty level (14% of population), and by some estimates that figure has been growing steadily in the past 10 years. As shown

earlier in this report, much of Bloomington and Normal also fall within a health provider shortage area.

Bloomington-Normal Birthing Center, therefore, can be the agent of change needed in Central Illinois to:

- a. provide a safe alternative for an out-of-hospital birth experience;
- b. bring some real change to the practice patterns in this community surrounding prevalence of c-sections, and
- c. better align costs with the actual needs of the low-risk maternity patients, who are generally healthy, as well as motivated and engaged to seek the best possible care for themselves and their baby for this episode of care.

5. Detail how the project will address or improve the previously referenced issues, as well as the population's health status and well-being.

Opening Bloomington-Normal Birthing Center in Bloomington-Normal will offer an out of hospital birthing service to Central Illinois women within a 60 miles radius of the twin cities. Having this option available will curtail both the growing trend of at-home births nationally that was substantiated by our own community event; and it will help curtail the alarmingly high c-section rate and associated costs in this community.

Furthermore, placing a birthing center in Bloomington-Normal fulfills the need to address an area designated as a healthcare provider shortage area, as follows: *...[S]hall be located in or provide service to a health professional shortage area, as determined by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services. [210 ILCS 3/30]* Those who are low risk and are looking to minimize cost and overuse of technology will finally have a safe alternative in a comfortable environment of a birthing center.

The proposed Bloomington-Normal Birthing Center facility will offer 3 birthing rooms, space for prenatal visits, educational space, along with private office space, and personal, home-like space for family to gather during the labor experience. All new patients will receive a consultation to ensure that the birthing center is the safest choice for mom and baby's needs. The Center's team of professionals will guide their patients through a very personal birth experience, from prenatal care, natural childbirth, and full postpartum care. The Center also plans to offer an array of educational classes including childbirth education, diet/exercise, as well as pregnancy massage/yoga and support group options for our patients.

The owners of Bloomington-Normal Birthing Center, LLC anticipate a healthy collaboration with the two hospitals in the community as well as with the area's medical community. In the spring of 2014, the owners reached out to both hospital administrators, and by fall, they secured a contractual transfer agreement with OSF St. Joseph Medical Center. In November 2014, Bloomington-Normal Birthing Center, LLC held an educational event for the medical community to educate and begin a dialogue with their colleagues on this topic. Over 40 members attended this event where keynote speaker, Dr. Steve Calvin, a perinatologist of Minneapolis MN and director of two Minneapolis birthing centers gave an educational talk on "Birthing Centers: Why the Time Has Come". The goal of this event was to help all to see that the addition of birth center(s) in a community will allow hospitals to provide more productive and smart utilization of resources to care for the more acute patient.

Finally, the owners of Bloomington-Normal Birthing Center, LLC would like to devote a portion of the prenatal clinic space of the birthing center to the re-establishment of a community prenatal clinic. Such a clinic had been operated in the community with funding from the local hospitals; however, it has recently ceased operations. The Center's midwife staff would help to fill this void, by using the Center's clinic space for prenatal care to the uninsured and underinsured pregnant mothers in Bloomington-Normal and the surrounding area. The owners and staff of the Bloomington-Normal Birthing Center believe that such a community clinic for prenatal care would be an important extension of the Center's mission to ensure the best outcomes for pregnant mothers and babies.

6. Provide goals with quantified and measurable objectives, with specific timeframes that relate to achieving the stated goals, as appropriate.

For Bloomington-Normal Birthing Center, the total market is defined, according to American Association of Birthing Center (AABC) standards, as 25 miles beyond the boundaries of McLean County, which traditionally has been the market for the Bloomington-Normal hospital-based obstetric services. Numerically speaking the total potential birth center market breaks down as follows, using estimates for partial counties that may cross the "plus 25 mile" radius. The estimate, therefore, for the base year market potential is 211 total births, which is derived by taking the total births, less industry standards that account for only low risk (83%) and only those who would choose a birth center experience (4%). See Table 1.

Attachment 10: Purpose of Project

Starting with the base figure of 211, birth center volume is estimated by applying national birth center utilization statistics from AABC. The term "risk out" is used to reflect the attrition that occurs among patients who may start out at the birth center, but due to a variety of clinical factors, the patients no longer meet the birth center risk criteria. The term "transfer" is used to reflect the patients who require a transfer to higher level care either when they present or during labor. See Table 2.

Therefore, by Year 3 Bloomington-Normal Birthing Center would expect to be operating at 150 births/year, and by Year 5, that number stretches over 200. At 150-200+ births per year, the Center could comfortably support two full-time Certified Nurse Midwives, a third CNM part-time/registry, a clinical director and an administrative director. Additional support staff of receptionist and additional birthing assistants (RN's, LPN's and Doulas) would be added in Years 2-5 to support the additional volume, and the clinical and experiential needs of the patients and families. The Bloomington-Normal Birthing Center would expect to achieve a positive net margin between Year 2 and 3, and maintain approximately a 15% net margin annually.

Also noteworthy is the overall growth in obstetrics volume for the hospital with which Bloomington-Normal Birthing Center has a contractual transfer agreement. Because birthing centers typically draw from a larger geographic area than the hospitals (+ 25 miles), the hospital, OSF St. Joseph Medical Center, will potentially gain by Year 3 over 50 patients who "risk out" of the birthing center and require the higher level care of the hospital.

Attachment 11: Alternatives

The alternatives considered for this project include the following:

- A. Proposed: Start an independently owned birthing center (with 3 birthing rooms)
- B. Joint Venture: Start a birthing center as part of a joint venture with a hospital/health system.
- C. Existing Resources: Do not start a birthing center and continue with current in-hospital services.

The decision to bring a birthing center to the Bloomington-Normal medical community (option A or B) or not (option C) is based on 3 qualitative factors: c-section rate, cost of care, and quality outcomes.

Another study, "San Diego Birth Center Study – A Prospective Study" done in 1998, backed up the National Birth Center Study I, as it concluded, "Current results suggest similar morbidity and mortality between the birth center model and traditional care model, with less resource utilization translating to lower costs in the collaborative practice model. Results suggest that collaborative practice using a freestanding birth center as an adjunct to an integrated perinatal health care system may provide a quality, lower cost alternative for the provision of perinatal services."

With Quality Outcomes for fetal and neonatal mortality comparable among hospitals and accredited birthing centers following best practices, the deciding factors for pursuing a birth center or not become cost and practice patterns regarding c-section rate. A birthing center is a lower cost operation than a hospital in that it is operating only when patients are present, and thus the national data showing birthing center births costs at 70% of hospital births stand to reason. Arguably the most compelling reason to bring a birthing center specifically to the Bloomington-Normal area is to address the practice patterns in this community concerning the over- medicalized tendencies, as reflected in the higher than national average c-section rate.

Therefore, Option C (not bring a birthing center) to Bloomington-Normal was eliminated from further consideration.

Attachment 11: Alternatives

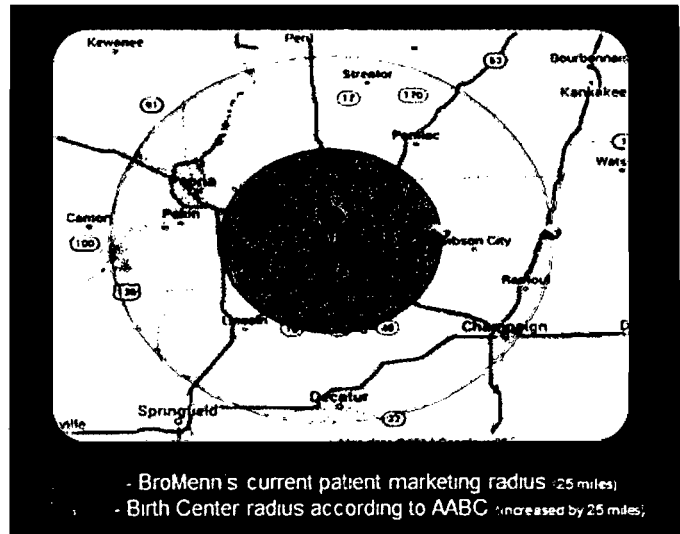


Figure 2: Business Impact of Birthing Center on Hospital

Confident that bringing a birthing center to Bloomington-Normal is the right idea based on the above discussion, the owners next evaluated whether to pursue the venture independently or as part of a joint agreement. In April 2014, the owners made presentations to both hospital administrations about bringing a birthing center to the community. The owners shared data with each hospital's administrative team that showed how a birthing center could actually open up new markets and produce new volume for the hospital (Figure 1) and bring new revenue to the hospital from those birthing center patients who risk out of the birthing center option (Figure 2). While the hospitals may lose a small percentage of their current business to the birthing center (8 births in one year, shown in the table below), they have the opportunity to gain business from those patients who come from outside the hospital's normal market, seeking a birthing center experience but who risk out of the birth center option and therefore transfer into the hospital for higher level services.

Figure 1: New Markets of Birthing Center

OSF St. Joseph Medical Center has expressed interest in the project, and as such it has entered into a contractual agreement with Bloomington-Normal Birthing Center, LLC to accept transfers from the birthing center. While conversations between the leadership of Bloomington-Normal Birthing Center, LLC and OSF St. Joseph Medical Center are ongoing regarding how to strengthen the relationship between the hospital and birthing center, no joint venture agreement has been reached.

The owners of Bloomington-Normal Birthing Center, LLC received the financial backing from Heartland Bank in December 2014, and at that time, decided to move ahead with the birthing center as an independently owned entity in the interest of time. Time is of the essence to submit a request for a birthing center, not only to be part of the state's demonstration project for birthing centers, but (and perhaps more importantly) to bring a much needed service to the community that will enhance the obstetric services of this region. The leaders of Bloomington-Normal Birthing Center, LLC believe so strongly in the mission of the birthing center that they are committed to leading the efforts to realize this service. Once the Center is established, the leaders of the Birthing Center will be open to evolving the ownership structure, should any opportunities present themselves, for the advancement of the Center.

Finally, the decision regarding scope/size of the birthing center stems largely from research and advice received from industry experts. Representatives from Bloomington-Normal Birthing Center, LLC have attended the "How to Start a Birthing Center" Workshop offered by the American Association of Birthing Centers. They have also sought the advice of Dr. Steve Calvin, MD, perinatologist from the Minneapolis area and leading expert in birth center start-ups. These experts recommend that a 2- or 3-bed model is a very manageable size for opening a birthing center. Representatives from Bloomington-Normal Birthing Center had the opportunity to speak with owners of birthing centers during the AABC Workshop, and all were pursuing 2- or 3-bed centers initially.

In the tables below, Figure 3 Part 1 and Part 2, the business proforma for Bloomington-Normal Birthing Center bears out what the experts and others were advising: 2-3 beds supports approximately 200-250 births/year, which nets a very conservatively a safe 3 year return on investment. Two hundred births per year coincides with the results of the market research conducted for this area, which projects approximately 211 births in the third year, with growth upwards of 250 in 5 years.

- Market studies of the Bloomington-Normal Birthing Center market bore out what the experts and others were advising. As shown above, the market research for this area projects approximately 211 births in the third year, with growth upwards of 250 in 5 years.

Conservatively assuming approximately 30 hour turnover rate per bed (12-18 hours per every labor/delivery/recovery/postpartum and 4-8 hours for room cleaning/restocking), each bed could support a birth approximately every other day, or 180-200 births per year. To account for the possibility of two births simultaneously, each bed should be expected to serve about 90-100 births per year. In Year 1, primarily one bed will be used to support the anticipated volume of 55 births; by Year 2, the second bed will be necessary to support the 122 births; and by Year 3, the third bed will be necessary to support growth beyond 200 births annually. Should the Center's volume reach 300 and more births per year, the owners would consider expanding to a fourth bed or applying for additional birth center license.

In accordance with Health Facilities And Regulation (210 ILCS 3/) Alternative Health Care Delivery Act, this project would be one of the *10 possible birth centers allowed as part of the demonstration project* set forth in Section 1110.3130 "Birth Center - Alternative Health Care Model – Review Criteria" of Title 77, Chapter II, Subchapter a of the Illinois General Assembly Administrative Code. More specifically, the proposed center would fulfill the requirement to be *one of three allowed sites to be located in a municipality with a population of 50,000 or more not otherwise located in Cook, DuPage, Kane, Lake, McHenry or Will counties*. The proposed Bloomington-Normal Birthing Center is applying to be the first center downstate, in McLean County. Given that the Center will be among the first 3 birth centers authorized to operate by the Department, its location is such that the Center will predominantly serve the residents of a health professional shortage area, as determined by the United States Department of Health and Human Services.
2. Bloomington-Normal Birthing Center is owned and operated by a private entity known as Bloomington-Normal Birthing Center, LLC, as shown in the articles of incorporation included on the following page.

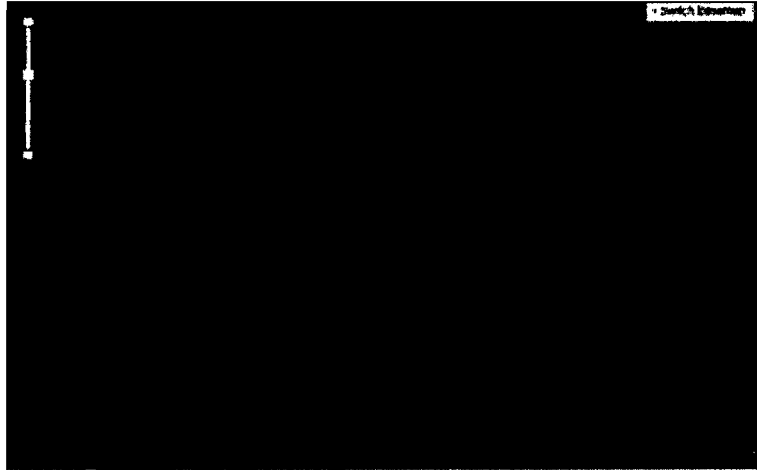

► RE: Criterion 77 IAC 1110.3120 (b) Health Professional Shortage Area

The location of Bloomington-Normal Birthing Center will be located in and will predominantly serve the residents of a health professional shortage area.

As documented in Section I of this application, the Westport property for the proposed birthing center (designated as a red star in the figure to the right) is approximately 3 miles to the east of the designated primary care health provider shortage area (green shaded area), but it is part of the larger mental health shortage area (purple shaded area).



The Westport site proved to be the best overall choice when considering access to EMS, proximity to hospital, location along a major east-west thoroughfare, access to interstates, access to public transportation as well as best purchase value and renovation potential. The property is situated along Empire St/Route 9, which is a major east-west thoroughfare that most directly connects the HPSA area to the west to this property. The distance covered in this trip is approximately 5-6 total miles and it along a major route of the local bus system. The proposed site will also be about a mile from the YWCA on Hershey and Empire, which presents opportunities to collaborate with the YWCA women's programs. The property's close proximity to several major highways, I-55, I-74, and I-39, as well as US-51 to the south, US-150 east/west, and IL-9 east/west, will allow for easy access to the communities of the nearby counties of Logan, Dewitt, Tazewell and Woodford, all or significant portions of which are designated as HPSA areas.

Admission Criteria

The Admission Criteria for Bloomington-Normal Birthing Center, LLC establishes the policies and procedures for determining the medical and social risk factors that would exclude women from the low-risk intrapartum group.

As of the date on this policy, the Admission Criteria for Bloomington-Normal Birthing Center, LLC is as follows, in accordance with the Birth Center Demonstration Program Code, Section 265.1550 Admission Protocols for Acceptance for Birth Center Clients. Any revisions to this policy shall be made and approved by the birth center's governing body.

- 1) Bloomington-Normal Birthing Center will not discriminate against clients based on disability, race, religion, source of payment, sexual preference/orientation or any other basis recognized by applicable State and federal laws.
- 2) Bloomington-Normal Birthing Center will accept only clients whose births are planned to occur following a normal, uncomplicated, and low-risk pregnancy shall be allowed to receive services at the birth center.
- 3) Bloomington-Normal Birthing Center will accept only clients who meet criteria for general health and low risk, as determined by a physician or a certified nurse midwife of Bloomington-Normal Birthing Center, using the following criteria for exclusion as a birth center client. These criteria shall be applied to all clients prior to acceptance for birth center services and throughout the pregnancy for continuation of services. Bloomington-Normal Birthing Center's Medical Director and Director of Nursing and Midwifery Services shall make the final determination of each client's risk.
 - Body mass index of less than 18 or greater than 40 (client will not be accepted).
 - Medical problems, including, but not limited to:
 - a) Heart disease, pulmonary embolus, or chronic hypertension not controlled by medication;
 - b) Congenital heart defects assessed as pathological by a cardiologist, placing mother and/or fetus at risk;
 - c) Severe renal disease;
 - d) Current drug or alcohol addiction;
 - e) Diabetes mellitus or gestational diabetes not controlled by diet;
 - f) Thyroid disease that is not maintained in a euthyroid state;
 - g) Bleeding disorder or hemolytic disease;
 - h) Adrenal disease;
 - i) Systemic collagen, connective tissue and autoimmune diseases (e.g., systemic lupus erythematosus, anti-phospholipid syndrome, progressive system sclerosis, and periarteritis nodosa);
 - j) Acute or chronic liver disease;
 - k) Neurological disorder or seizure disorder requiring use of anticonvulsant drugs;
 - l) Active HIV positive or confirmed active genital herpes at term;
 - m) Active subarachnoid hemorrhage, aneurysm;
 - n) Active hernia of the nucleus pulposus;

- o) Active lung function disorder/COPD;
- p) Active moderate to severe asthma;
- q) Tuberculosis, active; or
- r) Active inflammatory bowel disease, including ulcerative colitis and Crohn's disease.
- s) Previous history of obstetrical complications, including, but not limited to:
 - i) Previous gynecologic uterine wall surgery where uterine cavity was entered;
 - ii) Two previous caesarean sections;
 - iii) Previous caesarean section with documented conditions: vertical scar, placenta anterior and low lying;
 - iv) Cervical insufficiency (and/or Shirodkar-procedure);
 - v) Placental abruption;
 - vi) Postpartum hemorrhage as a result of cervical tear;
 - vii) Postpartum hemorrhage, other causes;
 - viii) Manual removal of a placenta.
- ix) Risk factors in prenatal course of current pregnancy, including, but not limited to:
 - 1. Anemia (less than 9 gm hemoglobin concentration and not responding to therapy);
 - 2. Complete placenta previa in third trimester;
 - 3. Nonvertex presentation in labor;
 - 4. Pre-eclampsia;
 - 5. Known multiple gestation;
 - 6. Hypertension – resting blood pressure 140/90 or an increase of 30 systolic or 15 diastolic over the client's baseline pressure;
 - 7. Premature labor at less than 37 weeks; the client may return to the birth center if undelivered at 37 weeks;
 - 8. Premature rupture of membrane at less than 37 weeks;
 - 9. Prolonged rupture of membranes requiring Pitocin induction/augmentation;
 - 10. Prolonged pregnancy (at 42 completed weeks or more);
 - 11. Significant isoimmunization against Rh or other antigen that may affect the fetus with rising titres;
 - 12. Pyelonephritis;
 - 13. Toxoplasmosis;
 - 14. Rubella;
 - 15. Cytomegalovirus;
 - 16. Parvovirus infection;
 - 17. Tuberculosis, active;
 - 18. Syphilis;
 - 19. Ectopic pregnancy;
 - 20. Deep venous thrombosis;
 - 21. Placental abruption; or
 - 22. Dead fetus.

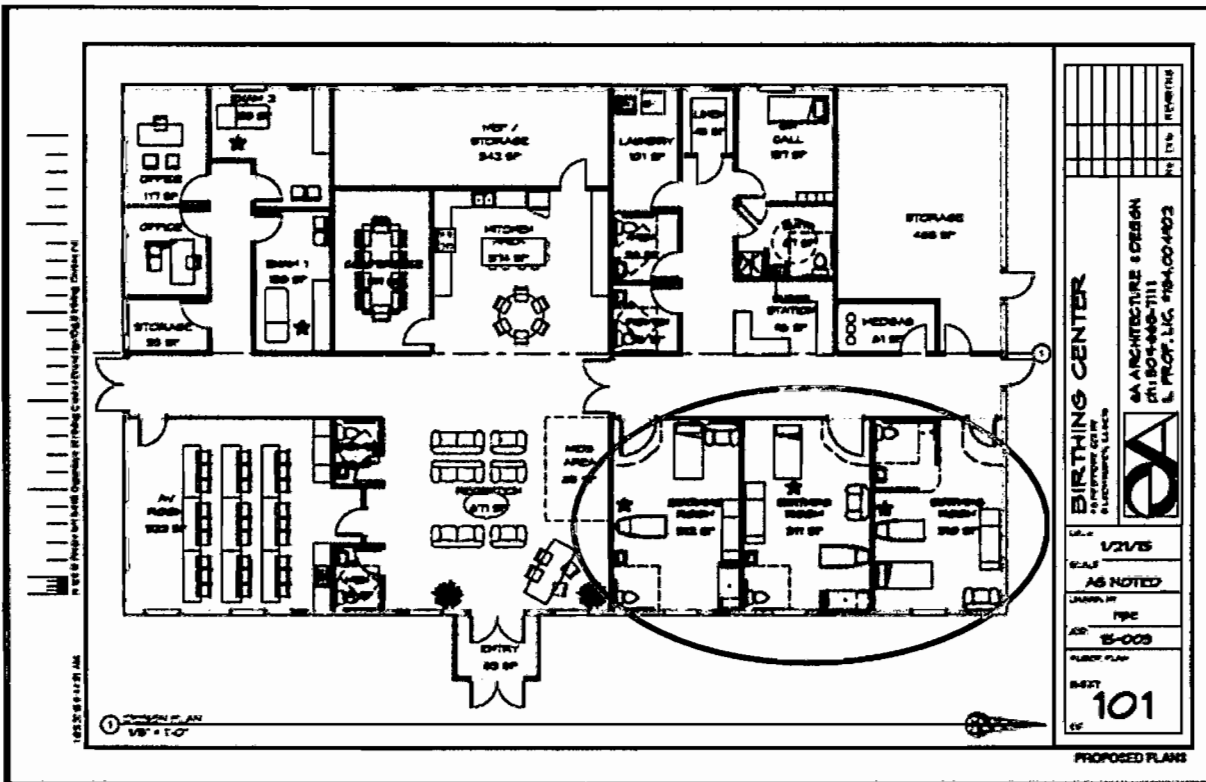

- 4) Bloomington-Normal Birthing Center will exclude women who fail to register for acceptance with the birth center before 32 weeks gestation and who have not received prenatal care shall be excluded from admission, unless a written, signed exception is made by the Center's Medical Director on an individual basis. The woman shall otherwise meet the criteria for the risk assessment that are set forth in this policy, the birth center shall have documentation of prenatal care, and the birth center shall comply with the letter of agreement between the birth center and the hospital in the Perinatal System.
 - a) Any pregnant walk-in person who is beyond 32 weeks of gestation or is ready to deliver her baby, and who has not previously been approved for admission, shall be immediately transferred to a hospital.
- 5) Bloomington-Normal Birthing Center will not accept a number of women in active labor who have been admitted to the birth center at any given point in time that is greater than the number of birth rooms in the birth center.
- 6) Bloomington-Normal Birthing Center will require all clients who are accepted to agree to the following practices of the Center, and failure to do so would exclude a client from services at the Center:
 - a) All clients must have an obstetrician, family practitioner/physician, or certified nurse midwife attend each woman in labor from the time of admission through birth and throughout the immediate postpartum period.
 - b) All clients must fully understand and accept the Center's practice of no general anesthesia, which includes spinal/epidural, or regional, may be administered at the birth center.
 - c) All clients must fully understand and accept the Center's practice of no pharmacologic agents permitted to induce or enhance labor.
- 7) Before acceptance and admission to services, a client will be informed of:
 - a) The qualifications of the birth center clinical staff;
 - b) The risks related to out-of-hospital childbirth;
 - c) The benefits of out-of-hospital childbirth; and
 - d) The possibility of referral or transfer if complications arise during pregnancy or labor, with additional costs for services rendered.
 - e) The Center's protocol for antepartum acceptance and transfer to a hospital, and intrapartum and postpartum transfer to a hospital, in accordance with the letter of transfer agreement established between Bloomington-Normal Birthing Center, LLC and OSF St. Joseph Medical Center.
- 8) Bloomington-Normal Birthing Center will obtain the client's written consent for birth center services, and a copy of the signed consent shall be included in the client's individual clinical record.
 - 9) Bloomington-Normal Birthing Center will provide prospective clients with the Center's admission criteria upon request.

► RE: Criterion 77 IAC 1110.3120 (d) Bed Capacity

As shown in the preliminary architectural drawing below, Bloomington-Normal Birthing Center will have 3 birthing room beds to support 200 births annually. Conservatively assuming approximately 30 hour turnover rate per bed (12-18 hours labor/delivery/recovery/postpartum and 4-8 hours for room cleaning/restocking), each bed could support a birth approximately every other day, or 180-200 births per year. To account for the possibility of two births simultaneously, each bed should be expected to serve about 90-100 births per year. In Year 1, primarily one bed will be used to support the anticipated volume of 55 births; by Year 2, the second bed will be necessary to support the 122 births; and by Year 3, the third bed will be necessary to support growth beyond 200 births annually. Should the Center's volume reach 300 and more births per year, the owners would consider expanding to a fourth bed or applying for additional birth center license.

► RE: Criterion 77 IAC 1110.3120 (e) Staffing Availability

According to a recent article in the *Pantagraph* (December 23, 2014) employment trends in McLean County are improving along with the rest of the state. While the decrease in unemployment suggests an improving economy, the good news is tempered somewhat by the facts posted in the same article that McLean County lost about 1,000 jobs from the previous year. While much of the loss is in jobs occurred in business-professional and financial jobs, a deeper dive into data published by Bloomington-Normal Economic Development Council's "2014 Demographic Profile" show a contraction from 2011 to 2013 of about 6% in educational and health services (10,700 to 10,100 employees). It stands to reason that such contraction might occur in health services given the growing financial pressures faced by the entire healthcare industry. (<http://www.bnbiz.org/Home.aspx>) Bringing an alternative healthcare delivery model such as a birth center to the community will help stimulate job opportunities in health services, and also give a dedicated place for certified nurse midwives and doulas to practice their profession.

Bloomington-Normal is home to two Bachelors and Masters level nursing programs: the Mennonite College of Nursing at Illinois State University and the Illinois Wesleyan University College of Nursing. Furthermore, Heartland Community College offers an Associate Degree in Nursing, a Practical Nursing Certificate, and a Nursing Assistant Certificate; and the Bloomington Area Vocational Center offers numerous healthcare related programs, such as Nursing Assistant and Advanced CNA.

These educational programs along with the pool of candidates from area hospitals and medical offices will be the primary source for our staff and clinical director for the Birthing Center. Additionally, the Central Illinois region boasts of a very engaged and enthusiastic network of midwives and doulas. With over 100 attending a birthing center educational event in November, and over 300 engaged with the Bloomington-Normal Birthing Centers' Facebook page, the Bloomington-Normal Birthing Center can expect plenty of interest when it begins recruiting efforts for its director and staff.

Bloomington-Normal Birthing Center, LLC has a signed contractual agreement with OSF St. Joseph Medical Center, Bloomington, IL for the referral and transfer of patients in need of an emergency caesarian delivery, as shown on the following pages.

LETTER OF TRANSFER AGREEMENT

This Letter of Transfer Agreement ("Agreement") is made and entered into as of the execution of the Agreement by both parties (the "Effective Date") by and between OSF St. Joseph Medical Center ("Hospital"), and The Bloomington Normal Birthing Center, LLC (Birthing Center).

AGREEMENT

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual covenants and promises set forth herein and for such other good and valuable consideration, the receipt and sufficiency of which are hereby acknowledged, the parties hereto agree as follows;

The Birthing Center and Hospital enter into a contractual agreement where the Hospital agree to provide Emergency Surgical Backup care for Birthing Center patients who are in need of emergency caesarian delivery, and the Hospital provides care for Birthing Center patients needing any of the services available via the Hospital's services and its Perinatal System. The Hospital agrees to provide a copy of the Hospital's maternity services to the Birthing Center and any updates made to their services. Both parties agree to the Illinois Health Facilities and Services Review Board recommendation and EMTALA terms. Both parties agree to the terms set forth in the following sections regarding transfer of patients, relationship of parties and general provisions of the agreement.

1. DEFINITIONS

1.1 **Emergency Surgical Backup** and **Inclusion in Perinatal System** defined by Illinois Health Facilities and Services Review Board, Certificate of Need Permit Birth Center Application, January 2012 Edition

1.1.1 Criterion 77 IAC 1110.3120 (f) – **"Emergency Surgical Backup"**

1.1.1.1 Document that either: The birth center will operate under a hospital license and will be located within 30 minutes ground travel time from the hospital; **OR**

1.1.1.2 **A contractual agreement has been signed with a licensed hospital for the referral and transfer of patients in need of an emergency caesarian delivery.**

1.1.2 Criterion 77 IAC 1110.3120 (h) – **"Inclusion in Perinatal System"**

1.1.2.1 **Letter of agreement with a hospital designated under the Perinatal System and a copy of the hospital's maternity service; OR**

1.1.2.2 An applicant that is not a hospital shall identify the regional perinatal center that will provide neonatal intensive care services, as needed to the applicant birth center patients; and a letter of intent, signed by both the administrator of the proposed birth center and the administrator of the regional perinatal center, shall be provided.

1.2 **EMTALA**: The Emergency Medical Treatment and Active Labor Act (Title 42, U.S.C. § 1395D(D)).

1.3 **Emergency Medical Condition**

- a. A medical condition manifesting itself by acute symptoms of sufficient severity (including severe pain, psychiatric disturbances and/or symptoms of substance abuse) such that the absence of immediate medical attention could reasonably be expected to result in
 - i. placing the health of the individual (or, with respect to a pregnant woman, the health of the woman or her unborn child) in serious jeopardy;
 - ii. serious impairment to bodily functions; or
 - iii. serious dysfunction of any bodily organ or part.
 - b. With respect to a pregnant woman who is having contractions:
 - i. that there is inadequate time to effect a safe transfer to another hospital before delivery; or
 - ii. that transfer may pose a threat to the health or safety of the woman or her unborn child.
- 1.4 Transferring Facility: The facility that is transferring a patient pursuant to this Agreement.
- 1.5 Receiving Facility: The facility that is receiving a patient pursuant to this Agreement.
- 1.6 Capability: The physical space, equipment, supplies, specialized services that the facility provides and the level of care that the personnel of the facility can provide within the training and scope of their professional licenses.
- 1.7 Capacity: The ability of the facility to accommodate the individual requesting examination or treatment of the transferred individual. Capacity encompasses such things as numbers and availability of qualified staff, beds, and equipment and the facility's past practices of accommodating additional patients in excess of its occupancy limits.

2. TRANSFER OF PATIENTS

- 2.1 A provider or personnel at the Transferring Facility shall determine and document that the patient is appropriate for transfer in accordance with all applicable federal and state laws and regulations regarding transfer as well as with applicable requirements of the Transferring Facility's transfer policies.
- 2.2 A provider or personnel at the Transferring Facility shall notify the Receiving Facility and obtain consent to transfer and confirmation that the patient meets the Receiving Facility's admissions criteria relating to appropriate bed, personnel and equipment, and confirm the Receiving Facility feels that it has the capability to treat the patient.
- 2.3 The Transferring Facility shall arrange and coordinate the method of transportation of the patient to the Receiving Facility and shall assume responsibility for the patient's care and safety during transport. A provider or personnel at the Transferring Facility shall, given the patient's condition, designate the appropriate level of care, including qualified personnel and appropriate equipment, needed during transfer. Receiving Facility shall not be responsible for the patient until arrival at the Receiving Facility.
- 2.4 A provider or personnel at the Transferring Facility shall send to the Receiving Facility with the patient all information concerning the patient which is required to ensure continuity of care,

including but not limited to a transfer summary, copies of appropriate portions of the patient's medical record, and any other information which is appropriate or required by federal or state law or regulation. Medical records maintained by each party shall remain the property of that party.

- 2.5 A provider or personnel at Transferring Facility shall notify the patient or the patient's legal representative of the transfer and shall provide any additional information required by state or federal law or regulation. Where reasonable efforts have been made to locate a representative of the patient, and notification of the patient is not possible due to the patient's physical or mental condition, notification shall not be required where the patient is unaccompanied. Written acknowledgement of notification shall be appropriately documented and obtained in writing in accordance with appropriate federal or state laws or regulations.
- 2.6 Personnel or personnel at Transferring Facility shall be responsible for assuring that the patient is accompanied by any personal effects which the patient brought to the Transferring Facility, or shall otherwise make appropriate disposition of the patient's personal effects to the patient's legal representative or family.
- 2.7 Receiving Facility agrees to accept and provide appropriate medical treatment to each patient for whom a provider at Receiving Facility and Transferring Facility have consented and confirmed acceptance of transfer.
- 2.8 The Transferring Facility will document patient transfer information using the attached Bloomington Normal Birthing Center Transfer Form.

3. RELATIONSHIP OF PARTIES

- 3.1 Transferring Facility and Receiving Facility shall bill in accordance with their usual and customary practices those parties financially responsible for the care rendered to the patient by their respective facility. Neither party shall have liability to the other for the other party's charges.
- 3.2 In the performance of the work, duties, and obligations under this Agreement, it is mutually understood and agreed that both parties are at all times acting and performing as independent contractors. Neither party is authorized or permitted to act as an agent or employee of the other. Each party shall be responsible for its own acts, omissions, debts and obligations and shall not be responsible for the acts, omissions, debts and obligations of the other party.
- 3.3 The parties agree that they shall each maintain professional and comprehensive general liability insurance at a minimum of one million dollars (\$1 million) per incident / three million dollars (\$3 million) per aggregate. The parties shall furnish each other evidence of such insurance within sixty (60) days following execution of the Agreement and thereafter on or before the renewal date of each such policy of insurance. Each of these policies of insurance shall not be canceled until at least thirty (30) days prior written notice has been given to the other party.
- 3.4 Each party agrees to indemnify, defend and hold the other harmless from and against all loss, claims or liability of any kind, including reasonable attorneys' fees, arising from or relating to

their actions or inactions or those of their respective agents, employees or representatives acting under their control, supervision or direction in performing under this Agreement.

- 3.5 Nothing in this Agreement shall be construed to require the referral of a patient by or to either party.

4. GENERAL PROVISIONS

- 4.1 This Agreement may be amended any time by mutual agreement of the parties provided that such agreement is reduced to writing and signed and dated by the parties' authorized representatives.
- 4.2 In the performance of acts pursuant to this Agreement, the parties shall comply with all applicable federal, state and local laws, regulations, and ordinances.
- 4.3 Nothing in this Agreement shall be construed as limiting the rights of either facility to contract with any other facility on a limited or general basis.
- 4.4 This Agreement states the entire contract between the parties in respect to the subject matter of this Agreement and supersedes any oral or written proposals, statements, discussions, negotiations, or other agreements before or contemporaneous to this Agreement. The parties acknowledge that they have not been induced to enter into this Agreement by any oral or written representations or statement not expressly contained in this Agreement.
- 4.5 If any provision of this Agreement is deemed invalid or unenforceable by court of appropriate jurisdiction, then the unenforceable or invalid provisions shall be deemed to be deleted from this Agreement, All remaining provisions of this Agreement shall be deemed to be in full force and effect.
- 4.6 Birthing Center and each of its providers, practitioners, employees, agents, contractors, subcontractors, and servants (hereinafter collectively referred to as "Staff") represents and certifies that neither it nor any healthcare practitioner who provides services on Birthing Center's behalf has been convicted of any conduct that constitutes grounds for mandatory exclusion as identified in 42 U.S.C. § 1320a-7(a). Birthing Center further represents and certifies that it is not ineligible to participate in Federal health care programs including but not limited to Medicare, Medicaid, or in any other state or federal government payment program, and that no such proceeding is pending. Birthing Center agrees that if DHHS/OIG excludes it, or any of Birthing Center's staff who provides Birthing Center services, from participation in Federal health care programs, Birthing Center must notify the Hospital within ten (10) days of knowledge of such fact. In the event that an investigation of Birthing Center or its staff is initiated by any state or federal governmental agency, the Hospital reserves the right at its sole discretion to immediately terminate this Agreement. It is understood and agreed to by the parties that the ability to verify if Birthing Center or any or its Staff are currently debarred is dependent upon the accuracy of the information contained on the DHHS/OIG list of excluded persons and the representations of Birthing Center's Staff.

The Bloomington-Normal Birth Center will use a group care model for its prenatal care and education. This model is often referred to as Centering Pregnancy, and will encompass health assessments, education and support of pregnant women who plan to birth at the birth center. Under the direction of a birthing center practitioner, 8-12 women of similar gestational ages will meet together, receive care skills, participate in discussions, and develop a support network with other group members. Each pregnancy group meets throughout pregnancy and early postpartum. The practitioner, within the group, completes standard physical health assessments. Patients meet with their midwife and other group participants for an extended period of time, usually 90-120 minutes, at regularly scheduled visits over the course of their care. This model of care promotes greater patient engagement, personal empowerment and community-building. Other services that will be provided to the community would be childbirth preparation, childbirth refresher courses, doula services, newborn care classes and breastfeeding classes.

In the fall 2014, representatives of Bloomington-Normal Birthing Center, LLC met with leadership of the McLean County Health Department to discuss ways that the Center can be a resource for the Health Department's Family Case Management staff. Family Case Management is a free program offered in cooperation with the Illinois Department of Human Services that connects pregnant women to health and wellness services. Bloomington-Normal Birthing Center expects to work closely with the case managers and their clients as an option for wellness-based maternity services.

To provide consultation and/or transport of mothers to an appropriate facility to meet the needs of both the mother and unborn child.

PROCESS:

1. The following maternal patients are considered to be appropriate for management and delivery by the primary physician at Level II hospitals without requirement for a maternal-fetal medicine consultation.
 - a. Normal current pregnancy although obstetric history may suggest potential difficulties;
 - b. Selected medical conditions controlled with medical treatment such as mild chronic hypertension, thyroid disease, illicit drug use, urinary tract infection, and non-systemic steroid-dependent reactive airway disease;
 - c. Selected obstetric complications that present after 32 weeks gestation, such as, mild pre-eclampsia/pregnancy induced hypertension, placenta previa, abruptio placenta, premature rupture of membranes or premature labor;
 - d. Other selected obstetric conditions that do not adversely affect maternal health or fetal well-being, such as, normal twin gestation, hyperemesis gravidium, suspected fetal macrosomia, or incompetent cervical os;
 - e. Gestational diabetes, Class A1 (White's criteria).
2. The attending health care provider shall consult a maternal-fetal medicine subspecialist, for each of, but not limited to, the current pregnancy conditions listed. Subsequent patient management and site of delivery shall be determined by mutual collaboration between the patient's physician and the maternal-fetal medicine subspecialist.
 - 1) Maternal Conditions (Consultation)
 - a. Asthma; Severe (multiple hospitalizations)
 - b. Cardiac disease (Cyanotic, prior MI, aortic stenosis, pulmonary hypertension, Marfan syndrome, prosthetic valve, AHA Class II or greater)
 - c. Diabetes mellitus (Class D or greater)
 - d. Family history of genetic problems (Down syndrome, Tay-Sachs disease, PKU)
 - e. Hemoglobinopathy (SS, SC, S-thal)
 - f. Hypertension (Chronic, with renal or heart disease)

- g. Pulmonary disease (Severe obstructive or restrictive)
 - h. Renal disease (Chronic, creatinine ≥ 3 with or without hypertension, requirement for prolonged anticoagulation, severe systemic disease)
 - i. Prior fetal structural or chromosomal abnormality
 - j. HIV (Symptomatic or low CD4 count)
 - k. CDE (Rh) or other blood group isoimmunization (excluding ABO, Lewis)
 - l. Severe systemic disease that adversely affects pregnancy
 - m. Fetal abnormality suspected by ultrasonography – other than anencephaly
- 2) Maternal Conditions (Transfer)
- a. Patients from the above consultation list, for who transfer is deemed advisable by mutual collaboration between the maternal-fetal medicine physician at the Level III hospital and the obstetrician at the referring office of the hospital.
 - b. Isoimmunization with possible need for intrauterine transfusion.
 - c. Suspected congenital anomaly compatible with life.
 - d. Insulin-dependent diabetes mellitus.
 - e. Cardiopulmonary disease with functional impairment.
 - f. Multiple gestations with exception of twins.
 - g. Premature labor prior to 32 weeks
 - h. Premature rupture of membranes prior to 32 weeks
 - i. Medical and obstetrical complication of pregnancy, possibly requiring induction of labor or cesarean section for maternal or fetal conditions prior to 32 weeks gestation.
 - j. Severe pre-eclampsia or eclampsia.

POLICY:

Level II Standards for Neonatal Care

PROCESS:

1. The following neonatal patients are considered appropriate for Level II hospitals without a requirement for neonatology consultation:
 - a. Premature infants at 32 or more weeks gestation who are otherwise well;
 - b. Infants with mild to moderate respiratory distress (not requiring assisted ventilation in excess of six hours);
 - c. Infants with suspected neonatal sepsis, hypoglycemia responsive to glucose infusion and asymptomatic neonates of diabetic mothers;
 - d. Infants with a birth weight greater than 1500 grams who are otherwise well.
2. The attending physician shall consult a neonatologist for the following neonatal conditions but not limited to:
 - a. Birth weight less than 1500 grams;
 - b. 10 minute Apgar scores of 5 or less;
 - c. Handicapping conditions or developmental disabilities that threaten subsequent development in an otherwise stable infant.
3. Minimum conditions for transport for conditions including but not limited to:
 - a. Premature birth that is less than 32 weeks gestation;
 - b. Birth weight less than 1500 grams;
 - c. Assisted ventilation beyond the initial stabilization period of six hours;
 - d. Oxygen requirements in excess of 50 % (greater than 6 hrs.)
 - e. Congenital heart disease associated with cyanosis, congestive heart failure or impaired peripheral blood flow;
 - f. Major congenital malformations requiring immediate comprehensive evaluation or neonatal surgery;
 - g. Neonatal surgery requiring general anesthesia.

- h. Sepsis, unresponsive to therapy associated with a persistent shock or other organ system failure;
- i. Uncontrolled seizures;
- j. Stupor, coma, hypoxic ischemic encephalopathy Stage II or greater;
- k. Double-volume exchange transfusion;
- l. Metabolic derangement persisting after initial correction therapy;
- m. Handicapping conditions that threaten life for which transfer can improve outcome.

Charity Care Plan

The mission of Bloomington-Normal Birthing Center is to provide a high-quality, cost effective out-of-hospital birth experience for low-risk pregnant mothers and babies, for prenatal care, natural childbirth, and full postpartum care. Inherent in the Center's mission are values of respect and compassion for all human beings. With its mission and values as its guiding philosophy, the Bloomington-Normal Birthing Center is committed to always putting the needs of the patient first, and thus enacting a charitable policy designed to meet the needs of patients with difficult financial circumstances.

Scope of Policy

The scope of the Bloomington-Normal Birthing Center Charity Care policy has three components:

a) providing a fair and equitable financial assistance program; b) providing education and resources for our patients, and c) offering outreach for prenatal care for the underserved.

Policy Attributes

Financial Assistance: The Bloomington-Normal Birthing Center will follow a fair and consistent method for the reviewing and granting requests for charitable medical care to our patients who are unable to pay their hospital and/or clinic bills due to difficult financial situations. A designated business office representative will review individual cases and make a determination of financial assistance that may be offered. Eligible individuals include patients who do not have insurance and patients who have insurance but are underinsured. Patients must cooperate with any insurance claim submission and exhaust their insurance or potential insurance coverage before becoming eligible for financial assistance. The need for financial assistance will be based on a person's historical financial profile and current financial situation, including individual and family income, assets, employment status, family size and availability of alternative sources of payment. Assistance may include individualized payment plans, medical services at reduced rates, and partial and full write-offs, using federal poverty income guidelines. The Center will use fair and consistent collection practices that are in the best interest of all parties involved.

Education & Resources: Bloomington-Normal Birthing Center will provide education and assistance to help patients find sources to fund their care, including identifying alternative sources of funding for their medical care and opportunities to work with outside agencies. The Center will work in conjunction with local agencies such as the Health Department's Family Case Management staff to connect our patients with the necessary resources for physical, emotional and financial well-being.

Outreach for Prenatal Care: The owners and staff of the Bloomington-Normal Birthing Center believe that a community clinic for prenatal care would be an important extension of the Center's mission. The Center will devote a portion of the prenatal clinic space of the birthing center to the re-establishment of a community prenatal clinic that was once operated with funding from the community's hospitals. Using the Center's clinic space, the Center's midwife staff would provide prenatal care to the uninsured and underinsured pregnant mothers in Bloomington-Normal and the surrounding area.

Quality Assurance Plan

The Quality Assurance Plan for Bloomington-Normal Birthing Center is a plan that outlines the Center's ongoing, objective and systematic process of monitoring, evaluating and improving the quality, appropriateness and effectiveness of care.

Scope of Plan

Bloomington-Normal Birthing Center shall adopt, implement and enforce a written quality assurance and improvement program that includes all health and safety aspects of client care for both mother and infant. Bloomington-Normal Birthing Center shall engage in an ongoing and systematic process for monitoring and evaluation of the quality and accessibility of care and services, that includes:

- 1) Admission of clients appropriate to the capabilities of the center;
- 2) Client satisfaction;

- 10) The integrity of surgical instruments, medical equipment and client supplies;

- 12) Appropriateness of medications prescribed, dispensed or administered in the birth center;
- 13) Problems with compliance with any federal or State laws;
- 14) At least an annual review of protocols, policies and procedures relating to maternal and newborn care;
- 15) Appropriateness of the risk criteria for determining eligibility for admission to and continuation in the birth center program of care;
- 16) Appropriateness of diagnostic and screening procedures;
- 17) Quarterly meetings of clinical practitioners to review the management of care of individual clients and to make recommendations for improving the plan of care;
- 18) Regular review and evaluation of all problems or complications of pregnancy, labor and postpartum and the appropriateness of the clinical judgment of the clinical practitioner in obtaining consultation and attending to the problem;
- 19) Evaluation of staff on ability to manage emergency situations by unannounced periodic drills for fire, maternal/newborn emergencies, power failure, etc.

Plan Attributes

In accordance with the AABC STANDARD, the Bloomington-Normal Birthing Center Quality Assurance Plan is a program for monitoring and evaluating the quality of direct care services to childbearing families, and the environment. The Bloomington-Normal Birthing Center's Medical Director, Director of Midwifery Services and Administrator shall ensure the following plan is enacted:

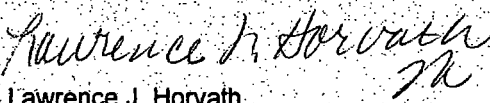

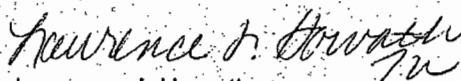

Attachment 20: Economic Feasibility

A. Reasonableness of Financing Arrangements

The principal investors have secured financial backing of Heartland Bank, with which two of the owners have a history of financing their respective practices.

The bank vice president has issued a letter of intent for proposed financing, along with the line of credit for \$200,000 issued in December 2014 to cover start up costs.

B. Conditions of Debt Financing

The principal investors evaluated 3 financial proposals from area banks; Heartland, First Farmers State Bank, and PNC. The investors selected Heartland's proposal based on its competitive terms and flexibility to work with the owners. See attached letter from Heartland Bank.

C. Reasonableness of Project and Related Costs

The costs of the project are reasonable as follows:

- **Preplanning Costs** are approximately 1.7% of the total project cost, within the standards set forth in Appendix A.
- **Construction And Modernization Costs** per square foot are approximately **\$79/sf**, which is on par with comparable offices in the areas (\$80/sf). There are no standards for birthing centers set forth in Appendix A.
- **Contingencies** are estimated at **10%** of construction, typical for area construction market.
- **Architectural/Engineering Fees** are estimated at **10%** of construction costs, according to industry standards.
- **Capitalized Equipment Costs** not included in construction are estimated at **6%** of total project. There are no standards for birthing centers set forth in Appendix A.
- **Building Acquisition Costs** are **\$50/sf**, or \$300,000 for 6,000sf building. The cost of the building plus the cost of construction/modernization total approximately \$129/sf, which is reasonable for medical office space that can range as high as \$200/sf.

The owners of Bloomington-Normal Birthing Center have been advised by other birthing center owners and experts to keep costs low at the outset. The owners believe they have followed this advice closely, to make a reasonable investment to launch the birthing center without over-extending themselves financially.

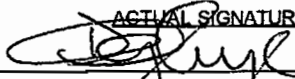
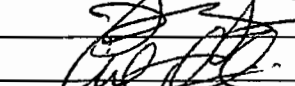
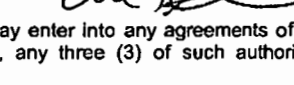

SAFETY NET IMPACT STATEMENT that describes all of the following must be submitted for ALL SUBSTANTIVE AND DISCONTINUATION PROJECTS:

The project's material impact, if any, on essential safety net services in the community, to the extent that it is feasible for an applicant to have such knowledge.

The Impact on Safety Net Services by the Birthing Center will be evident in the Center's restoration of the community clinic for prenatal care. The Center will devote a portion of the prenatal clinic space of the birthing center to the re-establishment of a community prenatal clinic that was once operated with funding from the community's hospitals. Using the Center's clinic space, the Center's midwife staff would provide prenatal care to the uninsured and underinsured pregnant mothers in Bloomington-Normal and the surrounding area.

Bloomington-Normal Birthing Center, LLC will also offer educational offerings that will benefit McLean County Health Department's Family Case Management clients. Family Case Management is a free program offered in cooperation with the Illinois Department of Human Services that connects pregnant women to health and wellness services. Bloomington-Normal Birthing Center expects to work closely with the case managers and their clients as an option for wellness-based maternity services. The Bloomington-Normal Birth Center's group care model for its prenatal care and education, i.e., Centering Pregnancy. This model of care promotes greater patient engagement, personal empowerment and community-building. Other services that will be provided to the community would be childbirth preparation, childbirth refresher courses, doula services, newborn care classes and breastfeeding classes.

The proposed site of the Bloomington-Normal Birthing Center at 6 Westport Court will predominantly serve the residents of a health professional shortage area. An important feature of the site is easy access to public transportation. The property is situated along Empire St/Route 9, which is a major east-west thoroughfare that most directly connects the HPSA area to the west to this property. The most direct route for the most underserved of the community would be a trip that is approximately 5-6 total miles. The proposed site will also be about a mile from the YWCA on Hershey and Empire, and about 4 miles from the McLean County Health Department.

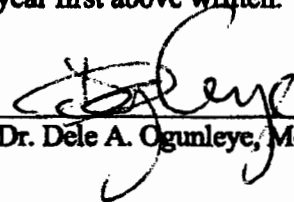

The doctors also intend to offer water births at the center. "We believe in the benefit of water births," said Ogunleye. "We will offer them in conjunction with the American Academy of Birthing Centers."

The doctors expect the center to attract about 55 mothers the first year and 250 by the third or fourth year.

"It's not meant to replace hospital labor and delivery," Ogunleye said.

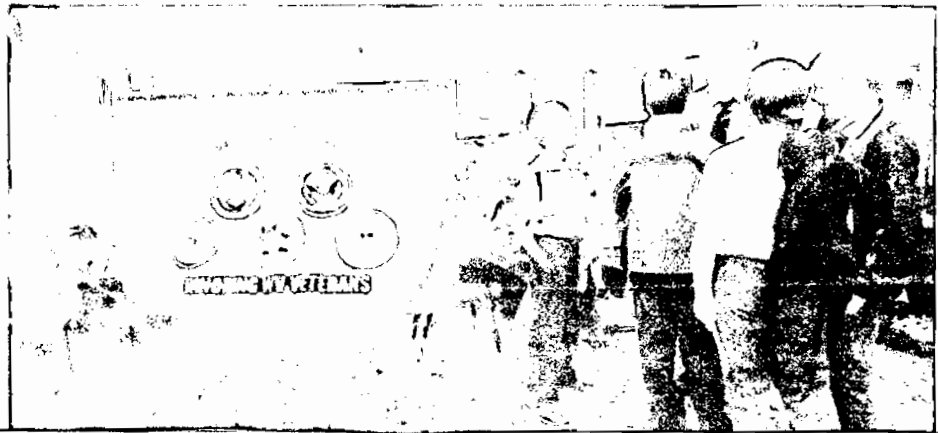
Chad Boore, president of OSF St. Joseph, said with health care reform, "It's less about volume and more about cost of care. The health care of the future is collaboration. We look for opportunities to partner in non-traditional ways."

The center would offer prenatal classes, childbirth education, diet/exercise and psycho-social support. Expectant mothers would be screened throughout the process to ensure they meet the low-risk pregnancy standards. Mothers may opt to have a hospital birth at any time. The birthing center also has plans in place in case there are complications that require hospitalization.

Santiago said the state requires a birthing center to be within 30 minutes of a hospital.

The Tractor Lane location is eight minutes from OSF St. Joseph and about eight or nine minutes from Advocate BroMenn, he said.

That site is going through a building inspection. If it is not approved, the doctors are considering a couple of other sites.

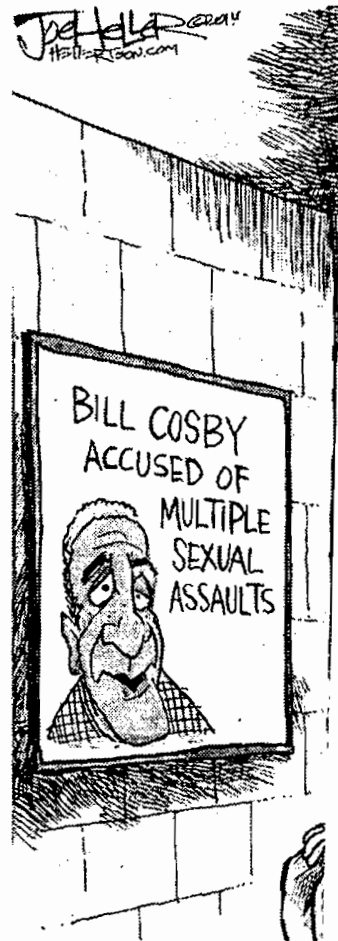
... to HOOAH (Healing Outside Of A Hospital) that hosted injured and recovering soldiers for a deer hunt at Funks Grove.
