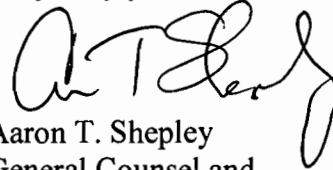

**CENTEGRA'S WRITTEN COMMENTS IN OPPOSITION
TO MERCYROCKFORD PROJECT NOS. 15-038, 15-039 AND 15-040**

Dear Ms. Avery:

I am the President of Insurance Services and General Counsel for Centegra Health System, and I am writing in opposition to MercyRockford's proposed hospital projects #15-038, #15-039, and #15-040.

MercyRockford's applications should be denied because they do not and cannot meet the requirements of the State Planning Act. Specifically, the proposed projects fall short in at least three ways: 1) the proposed hospital project is directly contrary to the State Board's objectives of avoiding unnecessary health care construction and improving access to essential health services for the medically underserved and indigent. Nothing more than a waste of precious health care resources, the project will cost the community approximately 400 million dollars while actually reducing access to care, especially for the people who need it the most, 2) Approval of MercyRockford's projects will result in an unnecessary duplication of facilities and reduced access for Rockford's most needy and 3) the proposed projects will not merely exacerbate an existing maldistribution of beds in the planning area; they will create one. A final and independent concern is that the applications seem to continue a trend started over a decade ago by MercyRockford's controlling entities, Mercy Alliance, Inc., and Mercy Health System Corporation of submitting Certificate of Need ("CON") applications for projects that do not comply with State Board rules and claiming alternatively that the rules should not apply to them or that the rules are wrong.¹ When the Board has refused to ignore the rules at Mercy's suggestion, Mercy has filed suit.

A. MercyRockford's Proposed Projects Are Predictably Contrary to the Illinois Planning Act and the Rules of The Illinois Health Facilities and Services Review Board.

1. MercyRockford's applications fail to document a need for a new hospital location

The bed capacity minimum for a new medical/surgical category of service is 100 beds. 77 Ill. Admin. Code 1110.530(g)(1). MercyRockford's applications fail to request the minimum, instead proposing to split their medical/surgical beds between two facilities, with 84 medical/surgical at the proposed new Riverside campus and 70 beds at the existing Rockton Avenue campus, neither of which meets the rule requiring a 100 medical/surgical bed capacity minimum for a hospital in a Metropolitan Statistical Area. Although MercyRockford contends that there will be over 100 hundred beds between the two campuses, this argument misses the mark completely, because it ignores that the purpose for requiring at least 100 medical/surgical beds is *to promote efficiency* and that purpose is not met when two facilities—whether campuses within the same hospital or not—each fail to meet the required minimum number of beds.

Despite MercyRockford's proposed net decrease in medical/surgical beds, the State has calculated an excess of medical/surgical beds in MercyRockford's Planning Area that does not justify MercyRockford's proposed additional location in a part of Rockford already served by other hospitals. The State Board has determined that there is a calculated excess of 283 medical/surgical and an excess of 40 obstetric beds in the Planning Area. Even with an overall reduction in the number of beds, the Planning Area would still have an excess of 214 medical/surgical beds. Under the circumstances, moving beds from one side of Rockford to the other, with an approximate price tag of \$400 million dollars is not merely contrary to the intent and purpose of the Planning Act; it is a pure waste of the community's resources.

2. MercyRockford's application will create a maldistribution of beds in the third largest city in Illinois

MercyRockford is required to document that its project will not result in an unnecessary duplication and *maldistribution of services*. 77 Ill. Admin. Code 1110.530(d). A maldistribution exists when the planning area has an excess supply of facilities, beds and services. 77 Ill. Admin. Code 1110.530(d). Currently, Rockford is served by three hospitals: one on the west side, one in central Rockford and one on the east. MercyRockford's proposed project will almost completely remove the hospital serving the west side of Rockford and place a new 400 million dollar facility on the east, four minutes from an existing facility. This proposed shift of services and beds from the west side of Rockford to the east side of Rockford, will result in an excess of services on the east side and will impair access to health care services for Rockford's west side residents. In short, MercyRockford's application doesn't merely exacerbate a maldistribution of health care services in Rockford; it creates one, contrary to the purpose of the State Board and its rules.

3. Mercy already operates one underutilized hospital in Illinois, it should not be allowed to operate two more

In 2003, Mercy Health System Corporation acquired Harvard Memorial Hospital in McHenry County. According to Mercy Harvard Memorial's responses to AHQs, as reported in its annual Hospital Profiles, in the dozen years that Mercy has run the facility its med/surg utilization has never exceeded 31% and has been as low as 15.3%. Mercy cannot justify the med/surg beds requested for its two hospitals in Rockford. It should not be permitted to operate two more undersized and underutilized hospitals in Illinois.

B. The MercyRockford Proposal Continues a Trend of Disregard for the State Review Board and its Rules That was Commenced More Than a Decade Ago By Mercy Health System.

1. In 2010 When the State Board Followed Applicable Rules and Denied Mercy Health System's Application to Construct a New Hospital in Crystal Lake, Mercy Sued.

In December 2010, Mercy filed an application with the State Board for a new hospital in Crystal Lake. In June 2011, the State Board issued an Intent to Deny; in December 2011, the Board issued an Initial Denial of the project; and in September 2012, the Board voted a Final Denial of Mercy's Crystal Lake Hospital project. The State Board concluded that Mercy did not document compliance with several State Board review criteria, including the following criteria: "Planning Area Need," "Unnecessary Duplication/Maldistribution," "Performance Requirements," and "Clinical Services Other Than Categories of Service."²

Despite Mercy's failure to comply with the State Board's rules or meet the review criteria, Mercy sued the State Board, arguing that the State Board's decision should be reversed as contrary to the State Board's rules and as arbitrary and capricious. Opposed by the State Board and existing area providers, Mercy eventually dismissed the lawsuit.³

2. In 2012 When The State Board Followed Applicable Rules And Granted a Certificate of Need for The Construction of Centegra Hospital Huntley, Mercy Sued.

In July 2012, the State Board approved Centegra's application to build a new hospital in Huntley, Illinois. The State Board considered findings contained in the State Board's State Agency Report, the application material, public hearing testimony and documents, testimony before the State Board and the Illinois Health Facilities Planning Act (the "Act").⁴ In September 2012, the State Board issued a ten-page Written Final Decision describing in detail how Centegra complied with the State Board's processing, classification policies and review criteria. Notwithstanding the fact that Centegra's application complied with the State Board's rules and

review criteria, Mercy sued the State Board, arguing that the decision to approve Centegra's hospital was contrary to the Act and the State Board's rules. Mercy continues to appeal the State Board's decision and court rulings upholding the decision to issue a permit to Centegra.

3. Mercy Demonstrated Its Disrespect For The State Board And Its Rules During Its Association With A Project That Was Approved After Mercy's Contractor Bribed A Former Member Of The State Board

In 2003, Mercy Health System Corporation filed its first CON application for a new hospital in Crystal Lake. Following that application process, three people connected with the application were indicted on federal corruption charges, including Mercy's contractor, Jacob Kiferbaum, and its CON attorney, Steven Loren. The third person was Stuart Levine, the State Board's Vice-Chairman.⁵ The 2003 application, similar to the pending MercyRockford applications, did not comply with State Board regulations and review criteria, and it was initially voted down by unanimous vote.⁶

After receiving an Intent to Deny, Javon Bea, CEO of Mercy Health System Corporation hired Jacob Kiferbaum as contractor for the failed application.⁷ One month after entering into a contract, Kiferbaum introduced Richard Gruber, Mercy Alliance, Inc.'s Vice-President, to Stuart Levine, then vice-chairman of the Board. According to Gruber's sworn statement, Levine told Gruber that Kiferbaum was a man of integrity and that Gruber could trust him.⁸

The day before Mercy's application was reconsidered by the State Board, Kiferbaum called Levine and said "Javon Bea is panicking now."⁹ Kiferbaum said Bea was panicking because he did not know who the fifth vote would be to approve his CON application. Levine told Kiferbaum that Mercy's lawyer, Steven Loren, "knows exactly what's what and things are fine." Kiferbaum was to tell Bea that he was in good hands.

The next day, Bea, Gruber, and Loren appeared before the State Board for the reconsideration of the application.¹⁰ The approval of Mercy's application was described by one reporter who was there as follows:

"In the middle of the vote, the roll call was halted as [Chairman Thomas] Beck and Levine whispered to each other. Levine then approached Dr. Imad Alamanseer, who had voted 'pass' instead of 'yes' or 'no.' After another whispered conversation between

Levine and Alamanseer, Alamanseer changed his 'pass' to 'yes,' providing the vote needed to pass the project."¹¹

After the reconsideration vote, Levine called Loren and discussed the Mercy CON approval. Loren said that, "Javon knows that he stole, he said he's at second base."¹² Kiferbaum also called Levine to discuss the State Board meeting. Kiferbaum told Levine that Javon Bea said "Stuart was masterful" and "we would never ever would of gotten' this."¹³ Kiferbaum said Javon Bea knows "how to play the game."

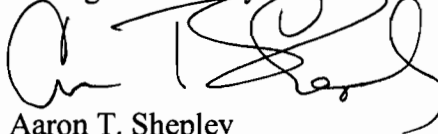
Shortly thereafter, a whistleblower revealed the conspiracy to rig the Mercy CON vote, and a federal investigation into the Mercy Crystal Lake CON was made public.¹⁴ The then-Governor imposed a moratorium on "all meetings and actions of the Board until the Board is reconstituted by law."¹⁵ In August 2004, all of the sitting State Board members were removed from office by an Act of the Illinois General Assembly.¹⁶ A little more than a year after the board approved Mercy's project, a circuit court judge overturned Mercy's CON permit.¹⁷ Kiferbaum, Loren and Levine eventually pled guilty to corruption charges.

Conclusion

Mercy is now before the State Board again for a new hospital project. The Act requires that the State Board consider the MercyRockford applications "with particular regard to the qualification, background and character of the applicant." 20 ILCS 3960/2. We urge the State Board to carefully consider Mercy's background and character as it reviews the MercyRockford application. Similar to its past applications, the MercyRockford applications do not comply with the State Board's review criteria and constitute an unnecessary duplication and maldistribution of health care services. For these reasons, we respectfully request that the State Board deny MercyRockford's applications.

On September 11, 2012 the Illinois Health Facilities and Services Review Board (State Board) issued its final denial of the application for permit for the above-referenced project. The State Board rendered its decision following consideration of the application, supplemental and modified information, the State Board staff report, the testimony of the applicant, and oral and written testimony from interested parties. The State Board's decision was also based upon the applicant's failure to document conformance with the following review criteria:

- ☐ Criterion 1110.530(b) - Planning Area Need
- ☐ Criterion 1110.530(c) - Unnecessary Duplication/Maldistribution
- ☐ Criterion 1110.530(f) - Performance Requirements

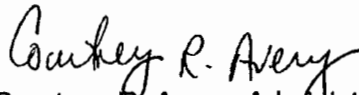

On July 24, 2012, the Illinois Health Facilities and Services Review Board approved the application for permit for the referenced project based upon the project's substantial conformance with the applicable standards and criteria of 77 Ill Adm. Code 1110 and 1120. In arriving at a decision, the State Board considered the findings contained in the State Agency Report, the application material, public hearing testimony and documents, any testimony made before the State Board, and the Illinois Health Facilities Planning Act (20 ILCS 3960).

- **PROJECT:** #10-090 – Centegra Hospital-Huntley – The permit holders are approved for the establishment of a 128 bed acute care hospital consisting of 100 medical surgical beds, 20 obstetric beds, and 8 intensive care beds located at the East Side of Haligus Road, between Algonquin Road and Reed Road. The new facility will consist of 384,135 gross square feet of new construction. The operating entity licensee is Centegra Hospital-Huntley and the owner of the site is NIMED Corporation.
- **PERMIT HOLDERS:** Centegra Hospital-Huntley and Centegra Health System, 385 Millennium Drive, Crystal Lake, Illinois
- **PERMIT AMOUNT:** \$233,160,352
- **PROJECT OBLIGATED BY:** January 24, 2014
- **PROJECT COMPLETION DATE:** September 30, 2016

This permit is valid only for the defined construction or modification, site, amount and the named permit holder and **is not transferable or assignable**. In accordance with the Planning Act, the permit is valid until such time as the project has been completed, provided that all post permit requirements have been fulfilled, pursuant to the requirements of 77 Ill. Adm. Code 1130 and may result in an invalidation of the permit, sanctions, fines and/or State Board action to revoke

the permit.

The permit holder is responsible for complying with the following requirements in order to maintain a valid permit. Failure to comply with the requirements may result in expiration of the permit or in State Board action to revoke the permit.

1. OBLIGATION-PART 1130.720

The project must be obligated by the **Project Obligation Date**, unless the permit holder obtains an "Extension of the Obligation Period" as provided in 77 Ill. Adm. Code 1130.730. Obligation is to be reported as part of the first annual progress report for permits requiring obligation within 12 months after issuance. For major construction projects which require obligation within 18 months after permit issuance, obligation must be reported as part of the second annual progress report. If project completion is required prior to the respective annual progress report referenced above, obligation must be reported as part of the notice of project completion. The reporting of obligation must reference a date certain when at least 33% of total funds assigned to project cost were expended or committed to be expended by signed contracts or other legal means.

2. ANNUAL PROGRESS REPORT-PART 1130.760

An annual progress report must be submitted to IDPH every 12-month from the permit issuance date until such time as the project is completed.

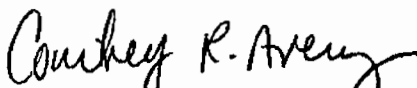
3. PROJECT COMPLETION REQUIREMENTS-PART 1130.770

The permit holder must submit a written notice of project completion as defined in Section 1130.140. Each permit holder shall notify IHFSRB within 30 days following the project completion date and provide supporting documentation within 90 days following the completion date and must contain the information required by Section 1130.770.

This permit does not exempt the project or permit holder from licensing and certification requirements, including approval of applicable architectural plans and specifications prior to construction. **Please note the Illinois Department of Public Health will not license the proposed facility until such time as all of the permit requirements have been completed.**

**BUSINESSMAN AND POLITICAL FUNDRAISER ANTOIN REZKO INDICTED
IN TWO FRAUD CASES, INCLUDING SCHEME TO EXTORT MILLIONS OF
DOLLARS FROM FIRMS SEEKING TEACHERS' PENSION FUND INVESTMENTS**

CHICAGO—Two federal grand jury indictments were unsealed today charging Chicago area businessman and political fundraiser **Antoin Rezko** in connection with two separate and extensive fraud schemes. One indictment alleges that Rezko participated with Chicago businessman **Stuart Levine** in a scheme to obtain millions of dollars by shaking down firms doing business before two Illinois regulatory boards on which Levine served. The second indictment alleges that Rezko fraudulently obtained more than \$10 million in loans for a pizza restaurant business from General Electric Capital Corp. (GECC) and also defrauded investors in that business.

The 24-count superseding indictment charging Rezko and Levine alleges that the first stage of their scheme began in 2003 when the two men agreed to divert to Rezko and his associate \$250,000 out of a \$375,000 finder's fee paid by an investment firm that received \$50 million in investment funds from the Teachers Retirement System (TRS), on whose board of trustees Levine served, and that they engaged in a flurry of additional illegal deal-making during the spring of 2004. During April and May of 2004, according to the indictment, Rezko and Levine arranged to split among themselves and others nearly \$5 million in kickbacks from six different investment firms then

seeking funds from TRS and another state pension fund. Rezko and Levine also allegedly agreed to tell a seventh firm that it would only receive a \$220 million allocation from TRS if it either paid \$2 million to a consultant who would funnel the money evenly to Rezko and Levine, or made a \$1.5 million political contribution to a certain public official. During the same time period, the indictment alleges, Rezko and Levine also were seeking to obtain a kickback of at least \$1 million from contractor Jacob Kiferbaum, whose construction company was to build a new facility for Mercy Hospital in Crystal Lake, Illinois, if that facility received approval from the Illinois Health Facilities Planning Board, on which Levine sat. After the firm seeking the \$220 million investment from TRS rejected the alleged extortion attempt in early May 2004, Rezko and Levine's fraud scheme was further thwarted when Levine was confronted by federal agents on May 20, 2004, according to the indictment.

The loan fraud indictment, which charges only Rezko, alleges that he fraudulently caused GECC to extend more than \$10 million in loans to finance what Rezko portrayed as sales of two different groups of pizza restaurants in the Chicago and Milwaukee areas. In fact, the indictment alleges, the sales were sham transactions that occurred at inflated prices, and involved the presentation of false financial information to GECC. The indictment alleges that in addition to defrauding GECC, Rezko defrauded investors in his pizza business by concealing the fact that he was transferring the company's assets to himself and a straw purchaser.

Rezko, also known as "Tony," 51, of Wilmette, who, in addition to owning pizza and fast food restaurant franchises in Illinois and Wisconsin, developed real estate and was involved in political fund-raising in Illinois, was added as a new defendant in a pending federal corruption case that was brought against Levine and others last year. In that case, Rezko was charged with 15

counts of honest services wire and mail fraud, six counts of aiding and abetting Levine's solicitation of bribery, two counts of money laundering and one count of attempted extortion. In the GECC loan fraud indictment, Rezko was charged with two counts of wire fraud. Both indictments were returned by a federal grand jury on Oct. 5 and unsealed today, announced Patrick J. Fitzgerald, United States Attorney for the Northern District of Illinois.

Federal authorities have obtained an arrest warrant for Rezko, who is believed to be traveling abroad. The indictment seeks forfeiture from Rezko of \$250,000, or substitute assets including his home in Wilmette and a second home in Lake Geneva, Wisconsin.

Levine, 60, of Highland Park, a lawyer who also served on the Illinois Health Facilities Planning Board (Planning Board), was charged in the same counts as Rezko in the superseding indictment. Levine, whose attorney, Jeffrey Steinback, authorized the government to disclose that Levine is cooperating with the government, is scheduled to plead guilty in the TRS case on Oct. 27 before U.S. District Judge Amy St. Eve.

"This indictment describes a frenzy of corrupt scheming, particularly in April and May 2004, in which political insiders sought to manipulate the activities of two state boards to fleece investment firms and individuals. The defendants and their associates put the word out loud and clear: you have to pay to play in Illinois," Mr. Fitzgerald said.

Mr. Fitzgerald announced the charges with Robert D. Grant, Special Agent-in-Charge of the Chicago Office of the Federal Bureau of Investigation; Byram Tichenor, Special Agent-in-Charge of the Internal Revenue Service Criminal Investigation Division in Chicago; Kenneth T. Laag, Inspector-in-Charge of the U.S. Postal Inspection Service in Chicago; and James Vanderberg, Regional Inspector-in-Charge of the U.S. Department of Labor Office of Inspector General.

The indictment alleges that beginning no later than the spring of 2003 and continuing through at least July 2004, Rezko and Levine, together with others including Joseph Cari, Steven Loren, Jacob Kiferbaum and Individual A, schemed to defraud the beneficiaries TRS and the people of the State of Illinois of money and property and the right to Levine's honest services. TRS, a public pension plan for teachers and administrators in public schools statewide except in Chicago, serves approximately 325,000 members and beneficiaries and has assets in excess of \$30 billion.

Cari and Loren, both formerly prominent Chicago lawyers, each pleaded guilty in the pending TRS fraud case. Kiferbaum, a suburban construction executive, pleaded guilty in the pending Planning Board case. All three are cooperating with the government and awaiting sentencing.

According to the indictment, Rezko, Levine and their co-schemers fraudulently used and sought to use Levine's position and influence, as well as that of other TRS trustees and Planning Board members, to enrich themselves and their associates. Rezko and Levine solicited and demanded millions of dollars in undisclosed kickbacks and payments and received and directed hundreds of thousands of dollars in actual undisclosed kickbacks and payments from investment firms seeking to do business with TRS and from Kiferbaum, the indictment alleges. Rezko and Levine's illegal activity included:

- ▶ Rezko using his relationship with certain state officials to ensure that he and Levine had the ability to influence the actions of TRS and the Planning Board to enrich themselves and their associates. This included in the spring of 2003 – after being asked by Levine and Individual A to do so – Rezko and Individual B agreed to use their relationships and influence with high-ranking state officials to oppose the proposed consolidation of TRS, the Illinois State Board of Investment (ISBI), and the State University Retirement System (SURS), into a single pension fund. In exchange, Levine and Individual A agreed to use their influence and Levine's position at TRS to ensure that TRS used investment firms and hired lawyers identified by Rezko and Individual

B. It also included in the spring of 2004 Rezko using his relationships and influence with high-ranking state officials to facilitate Levine's re-appointment to the TRS board, representing that it had been approved by a high-ranking state official, as well as the appointment of two new TRS trustees who voted with Levine on matters of interest to him and Rezko;

- ▶ Using Levine's position with TRS, and their combined influence over TRS staff, TRS trustees, and Loren to assist certain investment funds in obtaining TRS funds, in exchange for payments by those investment firms and their representatives to individuals and entities Rezko and Levine designated;
- ▶ Agreeing to establish or acquire a company that they or individuals they directed would control, and using their influence with TRS trustees and staff to ensure that their company would be chosen to make hundreds of millions of dollars of real estate investments for TRS, without disclosing their financial interests to TRS. Rezko and Levine expected to share the profits from this company; and
- ▶ Assisting Mercy Hospital in receiving Planning Board approval for a new hospital in northwest suburban Crystal Lake to be built by Kiferbaum Construction Company, in exchange for Kiferbaum paying a kickback of approximately \$1 million or more to Rezko and Levine.

Regarding Investment Firm 7, the indictment alleges that Levine used his influence in February 2004 to delay a planned \$220 million real estate investment by TRS with Firm 7 so that Levine could extort the firm. Levine and Rezko then agreed to extort either \$2 million that they would share or a \$1.5 million political donation for a certain public official from Individual J, who was a principal of Investment Firm 7, by threatening to withhold the \$220 million allocation unless Individual J made such a payment. They further agreed that Levine would arrange for Individual A to indicate to Individual J that Investment Firm 7 had not received its \$220 million allocation because the firm had not contributed significantly to a certain public official.

Rezko, Levine and their co-schemers backed down from the alleged extortion attempt when Individual J threatened to expose the scheme, but they further vowed that Investment Firm 7 would not receive any future business from any state entity. Subsequently, Individual A spoke to

Individual J on several occasions to discourage him from exposing the scheme. Individual A falsely advised Individual J that Rezkco and Levine had nothing to do with the delay in Investment Firm 7 receiving its allocation, and assured him that Levine and Individual A had used their influence with TRS staff to ensure that Investment Firm 7 would receive its allocation. On May 25, 2004, five days after he was first confronted by federal agents, Levine and the TRS board voted to approve the \$220 million investment.

Another new allegation in the superseding indictment details Rezkco and Levine's agreement that each expected to receive at least approximately \$1.3 million from Individual I, a Chicago businessman who acted as a placement agent for Investment Firm 6. In the spring of 2004, Levine and Individual I agreed that Levine and Rezkco would help Investment Firm 6 obtain funds from TRS and other state pension boards in exchange for Individual I paying Levine two-thirds of the finder's fees and management fees that Individual I would receive from the firm, and Rezkco and Levine agreed to evenly split the portion of the fees that Individual I would pay Levine, the indictment alleges. The \$2.6 million they expected to share was based on the size of the investment they believed TRS would make in Investment Firm 6.

Rezkco also agreed to use his influence with other Illinois state pension funds to help Investment Firm 6 obtain investments from them. After Levine arranged a meeting with himself, Loren, Individual I, and representatives of Investment Firm 6 about how the firm 6 should proceed with an application for funds from TRS, Levine told Individual I on May 19, 2004, that he intended to recommend Investment Firm 6 to TRS staff after that month's TRS board meeting. When Levine was approached by law enforcement agents on May 20, 2004, Investment Firm 6 had not yet applied for TRS funds, and Levine did not attempt to help the firm after that date.

The indictment also alleges that Rezko and Levine agreed to assist Investment Firm 5 in obtaining \$25 million from TRS, in return for a fee that Investment Firm 5 would pay to Individual G, who worked with Rezko's real estate business and who would then share that fee with Rezko. As part of the scheme, it was agreed that Individual G would not be disclosed to TRS as receiving a finder's fee from Investment Firm 5 because of Individual G's close association with Rezko. Instead, Individual G instructed Firm 5 to replace his name on the disclosure with the name of Individual H, who was a business associate of Individual G and a political fund-raiser, according to the indictment.

The indictment also adds new allegations concerning Rezko's role relating to the actual or proposed placement of TRS funds with four other unnamed investment firms – identified as Investment Firms 1, 2, 3 and 4 – that were contained in the original indictment. As part of the scheme, Rezko and Levine agreed to assist Individual C in obtaining TRS funds for Firms 1, 2 and 3, and, in return, Levine would instruct Individual C to pay a share of his finder's fees to individuals chosen by Rezko.

Regarding Investment Firm 1, in August 2003, the TRS board approved placing \$50 million in two Firm 1 funds, with Individual C receiving a total fee from Firm 1 of \$375,000. In early 2004, Rezko told Levine that Individual C should pay \$250,000 of his finder's fee from Firm 1 to Individual D, who was involved with Rezko in operating a chain of pizza restaurants. Levine instructed Loren to prepare a sham consulting agreement that would pass scrutiny if someone like the U.S. Attorney looked at it, and Individuals C and D later signed the agreement and further agreed that there would be two installment payments of \$125,000 each. Although the first payment made

on time, the second payment was accelerated at Rezko's insistence. Individual D used a substantial part of the money he received from Individual C for Rezko's benefit, the indictment alleges.

Regarding Investment Firms 2 and 3, on April 12, 2004, Levine directed Individual C to share his potential finder's fees with Individual E, who was Levine's friend and business associate. On April 14, 2004, Rezko and Levine agreed that they would each receive one-third of the fees that Individual C expected to receive, which they expected would be approximately \$250,000 from Firm 2 and \$1 million from Firm 3. Ultimately, after Levine was questioned by federal agents on May 20, 2004, neither firm received TRS funds.

Regarding Investment Firm 4, which had already submitted an application to obtain TRS funds, in the spring of 2004, Levine, with Cari's assistance, attempted to coerce Firm 4 into hiring a consultant who would receive a finder's fee from the firm. Rezko and Levine allegedly agreed that they would share evenly the finder's fee that Firm 4 paid, which they expected would be about \$750,000, and Rezko directed that the fee be paid to Individual F, a businessman and Rezko associate, to whose wife Rezko owed a substantial sum of money. Ultimately, after being questioned by agents on May 20, 2004, Levine voted at the TRS board meeting five days later to approve an \$85 million investment with Firm 4, without the firm paying any finder's fee to associates of Rezko and Levine.

The second indictment unsealed today alleges that between 2001 and August 14, 2003, Rezko defrauded GECC, of Bellevue, Washington, and individual investors in connection with the financing and sale of Papa John's pizza restaurants in the Chicago and Milwaukee areas. Rezko was the president of Rezko Enterprises LLC that was owned by individual investors and that owned pizza restaurants directly and through subsidiaries, including PJ Chicago LLC.

Rezko allegedly schemed with four unnamed individuals to sell off pizza restaurants owned by Rezko Enterprises to a company owned by a co-schemer and another company wholly- owned by Rezko for inflated prices and without the knowledge of the individual investors.

The indictment alleges that Rezko and his co-schemers fraudulently obtained a \$4.5 million loan from GECC in March 2001 to finance the purchase of the Milwaukee stores by a straw purchaser and his company at an inflated price, and through the submission of fraudulent documents, including false financial statements about the condition of the pizza stores.

The indictment alleges that Rezko and his co-schemers made similar fraudulent representations to obtain a \$6 million loan from GECC in October 2001 in connection with Rezko's sale of the Chicago area pizza restaurants from Rezko Enterprises to his own company, Chicago PJ LLC. After closing on the loan for the Chicago stores, the loan became delinquent, and Rezko caused additional false financial information to be submitted to GECC in asking for forbearance on the default.

In addition, Rezko allegedly misled individual investors about the performance and financial condition of Rezko Enterprises by providing fraudulent financial statements that made it appear that Rezko Enterprises still owned the Chicago and Milwaukee area stores, and by falsely characterizing the GECC loans as re-financing of existing debt.

Both indictments were returned under seal last week based on information that Rezko was then outside the United States but had immediate plans to return. That information has not proved accurate, and the government has no current information as to whether or when Rezko intends to return to the United States, Mr. Fitzgerald and the law enforcement officials said.

The government is being represented by Assistant U.S. Attorneys Christopher Niewoehner, Carolyn McNiven, Kaarina Salovaara, Reid Schar, Jacqueline Stern and John Blakey.

If convicted, the charges alleged in the indictments carry the following maximum penalties on each count: mail fraud, wire fraud and attempted extortion – 20 years in prison and a \$250,000 fine (except in the GECC loan fraud case, the two wire fraud counts each carry a maximum of five years in prison); soliciting a bribe and aiding and abetting that offense – 10 years and a \$250,000 fine; and money laundering – 20 years in prison and a \$250,000 fine. As an alternative maximum fine, the Court could impose a fine of twice the gross profit to any defendant or twice the loss to any victim. The Court, however, would determine the appropriate sentence to be imposed.

The public is reminded that an indictment contains only charges and is not evidence of guilt. The defendants are presumed innocent and are entitled to a fair trial at which the government has the burden of proving guilt beyond a reasonable doubt.

ANSWER: Other than communications to the Illinois Health Facilities Planning Board, defendant knows of only one communication involving Stuart Levine and an employee of defendant. In or about February 2004, Mercy employee Rich Gruber had a brief conversation with Stuart Levine and Jacob Kiferbaum. Kiferbaum introduced Levine and Gruber to each

other, and Levine told Gruber that Kiferbaum was a man of integrity and that Gruber could trust him, or words to that effect. Gruber replied that he was impressed with Kiferbaum's construction company, or words to that effect. Gruber, Levine, and Kiferbaum were present during this conversation.

2. State whether any director, officer, employee, attorney or agent of Mercy Crystal Lake Hospital and Medical Center Inc., Mercy Health System Corporation or Mercy Alliance Inc. had any communication with Thomas Beck, Michael Malek, Fortune Massuda, Annamarie Carrie-York, Danalyn Rice, Imad Almanaseer, or Pamela Orr relating in any way to: a proposed hospital in Crystal Lake, Illinois; Jacob Kiferbaum; Kiferbaum Construction; Nicholas Hurtgen; or Bear Stearns & Co. during the period January 1, 2003 through April 21, 2004. If so, state as to each such communication the date, the name and address of each person who was a participant to the communication or present during any such communication, and the substance of what was said.

ANSWER: Other than communications to the Illinois Health Facilities Planning Board, defendant knows of no such communication.

3. 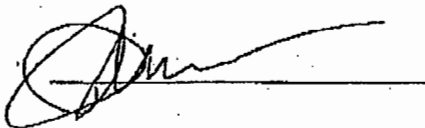

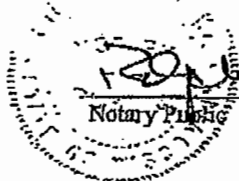

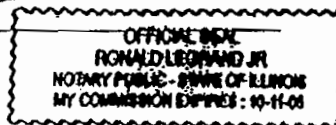

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Hospitals left scratching their heads

Unknown what vote means for Orland plans

A strange turn of events at the Illinois Health Facilities Planning Board on Wednesday has stoked fears the board — which will decide the fate of two Orland Park hospital plans in June — is being politicized.

On Wednesday, the board narrowly approved Illinois' first new hospital in almost 25 years — a 70-bed hospital to open in 2006 as Mercy Crystal Lake Hospital and Health Center.

The board turned down two hospitals proposed for Plainfield and Bollingbrook, saying they did not meet state criteria.

The Crystal Lake plan, put forth by Mercy Health System, was unanimously rejected in December.

It won approval on a 4-to-3 vote Wednesday, with one pass, after several speeches and developments that left health care professionals in the audience puzzled.

Board members spoke of the board's power to ignore state criteria. They whispered in conferences during the vote, and one board member changed his mind after seeing the votes of his peers.

Those for and against the two proposed hospitals in the Orland Park/Tinley Park

Interstate 80 corridor came to the hearing and watched closely for signs of what to expect in June, when their proposals come before the board.

Stunned by what unfolded, hospital executives did not want to comment on the "irregularities" because many of them have projects pending before the board.

In December, the board denied Mercy's Crystal Lake proposal. Hospital planners had a chance to modify their plans to meet state standards. Those guidelines are intended to keep health care costs down by regulating the number and cost of new facilities.

On Wednesday, some of the board's eight members expressed concern about Mercy's system of hospitals. Mercy Alliance Inc. is the parent company of Mercy Health System, which operates 49 facilities in 21 Illinois communities. Mercy directly employs all the physicians and specialists who practice there.

Others were concerned the hospital didn't propose at least 100 medical-surgical beds — the minimum by state standards for establishing a new full-service hospital in the area. Mercy also proposed a hospital in an area, fast-growing McHenry County, that has too many licensed beds already, according to state calculations.

It appeared the proposal would be turned down again until board chairman Thomas Beck signaled his support.

Also supporting the proposal was Stuart Levine.

Levine and Beck are the only two members who have served on the board before the election of Democratic Gov. Rod Blagojevich.

In the middle of the vote, the roll call was halted as Beck and Levine whispered to each other. Levine then approached Dr. Imad Alamanseer, who had voted "pass" instead of "yes" or "no." After another whispered conversation between Levine and Alamanseer, Alamanseer changed his "pass" to "yes," providing the vote needed to pass the project.

Asked after the meeting about what happened, Alamanseer said, "I was convinced that there was merit to the project; I just wanted to see how the others would view the project."

Another board member, Pamela Orr, who's new to her post, left the meeting during discussion of the Crystal Lake project. When she returned, she decided to pass on the Crystal Lake vote.

The overall vote crystallized competing philosophies on the board.

The board's assistant legal counsel, David Carvalho, has tried to push the new board members toward a strict reading of state regulations, asking the board members to adhere to existing standards and avoid approving projects that do not meet those standards.

Carvalho said approving new facilities in areas where too many licensed beds already exist is unfair to those health care facilities who "sit on the sidelines" waiting to propose

projects until existing beds are filled.

"It makes it difficult for the board going forward," Carvalho said.

Beck and Levine said they disagree and value the board's freedom.

During the meeting, the two joked about "the old days" when they approved projects bearing all negative staff recommendations and turned down projects that met each and every criterion.

"You never know what we're going to do," Beck said.

Sources said parties with projects that come before the board are concerned Beck and Levine — a politically connected member who formerly served on the Illinois Gaming Board — will take control and leave board decisions vulnerable to lobbyists.

Political powerbrokers including Jeff Ladd and David Wilhelm are representing some of the major players with desires to build hospitals in affluent, high-growth areas.

Also Wednesday, Beck announced the board's newest member will be Bernard Weiner, who has previously served on the Health Facilities Planning Board with Beck and Levine. He's been a contributor to the campaigns of Republicans Lee Daniels and George Ryan.

The power balance on the board is particularly crucial because four more hospital proposals are pending and the board is in the midst of rewriting its rules and standards.

Naperville-based Edward Hospital's plan for Plainfield, denied on a 7-to-1 vote, and Adventist Health System's plan for Bolingbrook, denied by unanimous vote, can be brought back to the board for reconsideration.

The proposals by St. Francis Hospital to build a new hospital at LaGrange Road and 171st Street and by Advocate to build a new hospital at LaGrange Road and 179th Street will be considered at the board's June 16 meeting in Chicago.

Hospital president alleges

Whistleblower lawsuit may taint Wall Street, Springfield

A top Chicago financial power broker allegedly tried to shake down a Naperville hospital seeking to expand, a lawsuit says.

Either give the \$200 million project to a contractor friendly with a state official who must approve the expansion or the project dies.

The hospital balked.

And the state all but killed the expansion two months ago.

That deal was just one of a host of shake-down schemes involving financial powerbroker Nicholas Hurtgen, who runs the Chicago office of Bear, Stearns & Co. Inc., according to a federal whistleblower lawsuit. The civil suit was filed under seal in May by administrators at Edward Hospital in Naperville. The Chicago Sun-Times obtained it Thursday.

While the alleged schemes vary in detail, Hurtgen is described as one of the key players.

Also named was Jacob Kiferbaum, who runs a Deerfield construction company.

Kiferbaum is friends with Stuart Levine, a millionaire political powerbroker. Until he resigned this month, Levine was vice chairman of the state board that decides whether hospitals can open or expand.

None of the men returned messages for comment. Bear, Stearns declined to comment, as did the lawyer for the two plaintiffs, Edward executives Pamela Meyer Davis and William G. Kottmann.

The lawsuit describes an earlier scheme also involving Edward Hospital.

The hospital wound up getting \$189 million in state funding in 2001 after agreeing to work with Bear, Stearns, the lawsuit alleges.

Another scheme was just this year. It involves a proposed hospital in Crystal Lake.

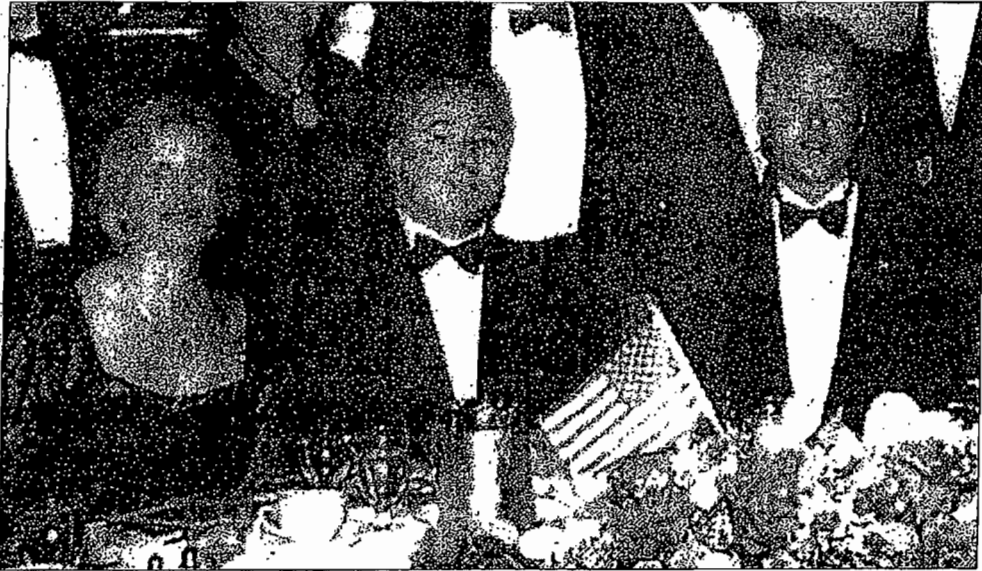
Levine and the board approved the project — that Kiferbaum is building, according to the lawsuit. Bear, Stearns did the work to finance the deal, with \$69 million in state money.

The final deal is the biggest.

The lawsuit, with no details, contends there was a "kickback" scheme involving the \$10 billion deal that Gov. Blagojevich pushed through last year to bail out the state pension plans. Bear, Stearns played a major role in that deal too. No details were given concerning the alleged kickback.

Sometime after the lawsuit was filed on May 24 federal subpoenas were issued to members of the Illinois Health Facilities Planning Board. A criminal investigation is under way into the approval of the Mary Crystal Lake Hospital and Medical Center, the governor's office confirmed Thursday.

"We asked the inspector general's office to step in and investi-

JACOB KIFERBAUM

Kiferbaum, 52, is president and founder of Kiferbaum Construction Corp. in Deerfield. He's one of the top contractors in Illinois and has been involved in the design and construction of more than 220 projects. He's vice president of the American Chamber of Commerce and — along with Stuart Levine — is on the board of trustees of the Rosalind Franklin University of Medicine and Science, formerly known as Finch University of Health Sciences/The Chicago Medical School in North Chicago. Kiferbaum's company has built some multimillion-dollar buildings at the medical school.

STUART P. LEVINE

Levine, a Chicago attorney who made a fortune through HMOs, is a major political power player in Illinois, contributing more than \$1.5 million to politicians since 1994.

More than half that money went to former Illinois Attorney General James Ryan, who unsuccessfully ran for governor in 2002. More than \$340,000 went to Lee Daniels, who stepped down as House Minority leader in 2002 and is under federal investigation because his staffers allegedly did political work on the taxpayers' dime.

Levine, 58, of Highland Park, received his law degree from Chicago-Kent College of Law and is chairman of the board of trustees of Rosalind Franklin

University of Medicine and Science. He was also knighted by the King of Sweden in 1994 for promoting economic ties between the United States and that country.

Wall Street to Springfield

The various allegations in the lawsuit, if proven, could touch Wall Street, Springfield and even President Bush's campaign.

The campaign is headed in the Midwest by a Bear, Stearns consultant whose firm received an \$809,133 commission on the \$10 billion bond deal. That consultant is Robert Kjellander, the Illinois National Republican Committee chairman. He is not named anywhere in the suit.

Whistleblower lawsuits such as the one in the Bear, Stearns case are filed under seal and given to the U.S. Attorney's office but the defendants do not immediately receive a copy. Such cases are assigned to the chief judge of the U.S. District Court.

The U.S. attorney's office has 60 days by law to investigate the claims in the lawsuit and decide whether or not it wants to intervene in the law-

BEAR, STEARNS & CO.

Bear, Stearns has a long history of helping Illinois governments raise money by issuing bonds.

The firm helped sell bonds for McCormick Place's latest expansion and Gov. Blagojevich's \$10 billion deal to bail out the state pension systems. The company's Chicago office is run by P. Nicholas Hurtgen, 41, of Glenview, once a top aide to former Wisconsin Gov. Tommy Thompson.

The hospital did, and the state approved the deal.

But in another deal, Edward Hospital didn't go along with the program, the lawsuit says.

When Edward approached the board to build a new hospital in nearby Plainfield, Edward wouldn't cave into pressure to hire Kiferbaum Construction Corp.

Kiferbaum and Levine are friends. Both serve on the board of the Rosalind Franklin University of Medicine and Science, formerly known as Finch University of Health Sciences/The Chicago Medical School in North Chicago. Kiferbaum's company has received tens of millions of dollars to build several projects at the school.

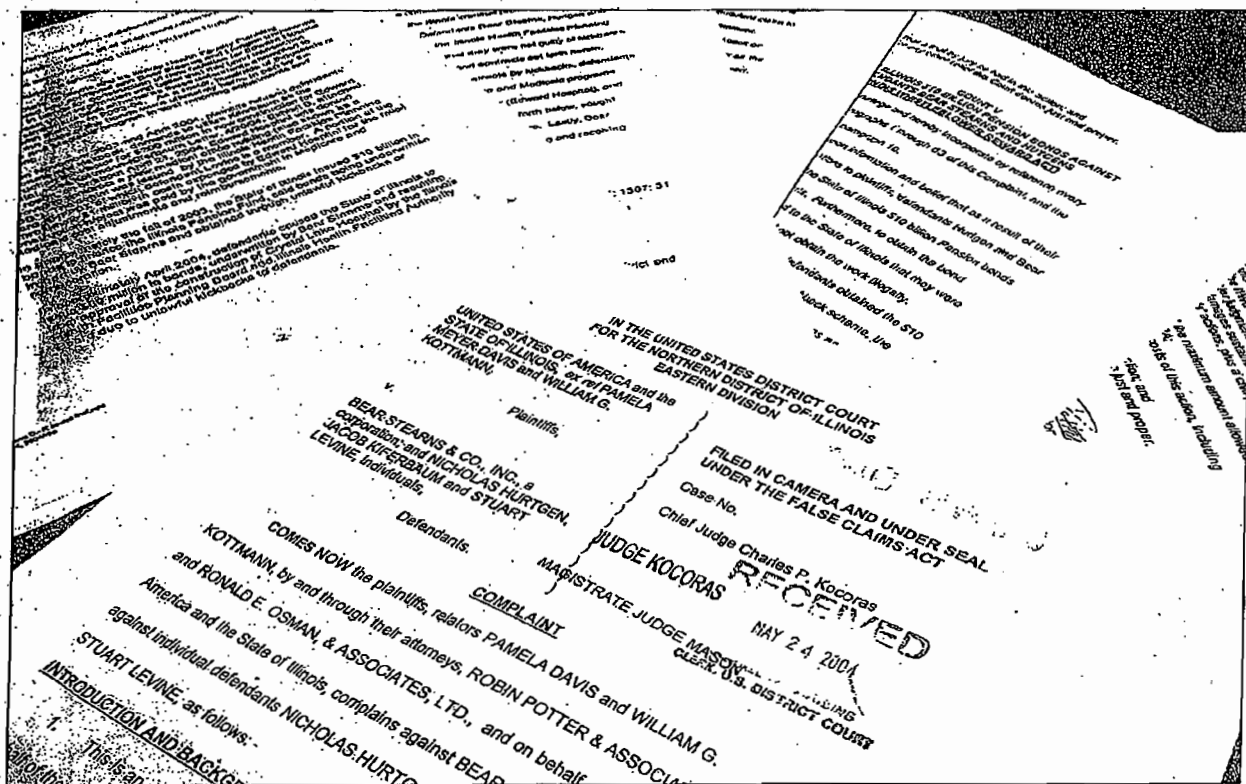
In a Jan. 6, 2004, meeting with Edward officials, Bear Stearns' Hurtgen told them "he was politically connected to the Illinois state government administration and can get things done." The suit reads

suit. But the U.S. attorney's office can ask the chief judge for extensions to that deadline and often receives them for further investigation. A U.S. attorney's spokesman declined to comment on the whistleblower lawsuit.

The scheme outlined in that lawsuit begins in 2001. That's when Hurtgen was introduced to Edward Hospital officials by Donald Udstuen. Udstuen was a former close advisor to Gov. Ryan. Udstuen has pleaded guilty to corruption charges. Udstuen, a former chief operating officer of the Illinois State Medical Society, has since cooperated with the feds. Ryan has also been charged and is awaiting trial.

Initially, Edward Hospital wanted to use Morgan Stanley for financing their 2001 project, but Udstuen insisted that it was "important" for the hospital to give the deal to Hurtgen at Bear, Stearns.

Hurtgen told the Edward officials that Levine said Beck would decide the fate of Edward's plans.

Edward officials pressed Kiferbaum to prove that he had influence with state regulators.

They got their proof during a meeting at the Big Shell Cafe in Deerfield, the lawsuit alleges.

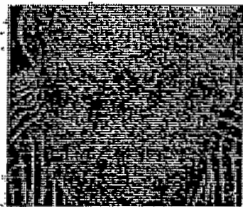
Kiferbaum met the Edward Hospital officials there, telling them he was "good friends" with Levine and a majority of the nine-member state board. Kiferbaum told them if his company wasn't used, Edward's plans would not be approved.

Also at the restaurant, at the same time, was Levine and Hurtgen, but they were sitting somewhere else.

Levine walked over to the table and told the Edward officials that they could "trust" Kiferbaum and "that his word was good," the lawsuit says.

Shortly before the board meeting, Edward officials told Kiferbaum that he wouldn't be getting the contract because his fees were too high, and he lacked experience in building hospitals.

On April 21, the state board indicated its intentions to deny Edward's plans for a new hospital in nearby Plainfield and a delayed financial review on Edward's medical office building, also in Plainfield.

Pension questions

Another alleged kickback scheme doesn't involve hospitals but pensions. The lawsuit contends that a \$10 billion deal to bail out state pension plans was "underwritten in part by Bear Stearns and obtained through unlawful kickbacks or remuneration."

"Had the State of Illinois known that defendants obtained the \$10 billion Pension Bond underwriting as part of a criminal kickback scheme, the State of Illinois would not have issued or approved Bear Stearns as an underwriter," the suit claims. As a result, the state is entitled to at least \$8 million to \$10 million in damages, the amount paid to

Bear Stearns, the suit alleges.

The lawsuit, however, does not provide specifics nor does it say who paid or received the "kickbacks."

Budget plugged

Bear Stearns was handpicked by Blagojevich's budget office as the lead underwriter for the administration's \$10 billion pension borrowing program last year, a deal designed to shore up the state's poorly funded employee pension systems.

The largest borrowing deal in state history was put on a legislative fast-track last year. It sprang out of the General Assembly in April 2003, only six weeks after the governor proposed the plan as a

key to helping bail Illinois out of a \$5 billion budget hole.

Republicans largely opposed the plan, describing it as fraught with risk. But one of the GOP's most prominent players wound up reaping an unexpected financial bonanza as a result of the deal.

Kjellander, a well-known Republican lobbyist who is the Midwest coordinator for President Bush's re-election campaign, was hired by Bear Stearns as a consultant to secure "state-level business."

In a company filing, Bear Stearns disclosed it had paid Kjellander's firm \$809,183 in fees in 2003 — an amount that stunned Democrats because of its size.

The state GOP's national committeeman and a personal friend of White House senior adviser Karl

Rove, Kjellander's involvement in the bond deal became an issue last May in his successful bid to retain the party post.

Conservative critics accused Kjellander of putting personal gain above party loyalty but could not block him from winning re-election to a four-year term as Republican national committeeman, a post he has held since 1995.

Kjellander said his consulting firm did not represent Bear Stearns before the Health Facilities Planning Board in any capacity. As for the questions about the pension bond deal he said, "I'm not a lawyer so I can't begin to respond to that. All I know is the bond deal was scrutinized every which way possible, and there was nothing wrong with it."

Lawsuit spurs questions on how hospitals get OK'd

**Whistleblowers allege
shakedown by state
health planning board**

When a state board recently approved a new hospital for Crystal Lake, some members of the audience reportedly gasped in disbelief.

After all, the hospital plan appeared doomed. Staff had clearly recommended against it. The board itself had initially panned it. The only thing that saved it was a last-minute vote switch by a board member.

Mysterious? You bet.

Now, answers to the mystery may be surfacing in a federal whistleblower lawsuit alleging kickbacks and shakedowns in the way new hospitals get approved in Illinois.

The lawsuit alleges that the Illinois Health Facilities Planning Board approved Mercy Health System's plans for the McHenry County hospital because it would be built by politically connected contractor Jacob Kiferbaum.

The civil suit, which is under seal but was obtained last week by

the Chicago Sun-Times, got the feds' attention. The governor's office has confirmed that a criminal investigation is under way.

Mercy officials released a written statement Friday saying it intends "to cooperate with the inquiry" but believes "we have acted properly."

Shortly after the whistleblower suit was filed, the U.S. attorney's office issued subpoenas to members of the planning board, a little-known panel that decides whether new hospitals and other major health-related projects get the go-ahead.

At the heart of both the lawsuit and the criminal investigation is whether the board's decisions are being made for the public good or to line the pockets of a few politically plugged-in power brokers.

The suit was filed last month by administrators of Naperville's Edward Hospital, who wanted the board to approve a new hospital and medical office building in Plainfield.

Edward officials claim they were told they'd get board approval if they hired Kiferbaum Construction Corp. of Deerfield to build it.

The Edward administrators describe a March meeting with two lobbyists who had represented

the board of trustees of a North Chicago medical school, where Kiferbaum's firm has done tens of millions of dollars worth of construction work. Levine has pumped well over \$1 million into candidates' coffers.

The lawsuit alleges that Kiferbaum and Levine were joined by financial heavyweight Nicholas Hurlgen in pressuring Edward of Kiferbaum or else their business shot down. Hurlgen heads the Chicago office of Bear, Stearns & Co. Inc., which stood to benefit by providing the financing for the projects, the suit claims.

Edward officials refused to hire Kiferbaum. The state board in April indicated it planned to deny Edward's Plainfield hospital request.

At that same April meeting, the board went against staff recommendation and narrowly approved Mercy Crystal Lake Hospital and Medical Center. The 70-bed, \$81 million hospital is to be built by Kiferbaum, according to the lawsuit. And it's being financed through \$69 million in state-issued bonds, which the suit says are being underwritten by Bear, Stearns.

When it appeared Mercy might not muster the five votes needed for approval, Levine whispered in the ear of fellow board member Dr.

Mercy's Crystal Lake hospital project. Mike Noonan, with the firm Greenberg Traurig, which includes Chicago power broker Victor Reyes, and Herb Franks, a McHenry County lawyer and father of state Rep. Jack Franks (D-Woodstock).

State records show that Kiferbaum contributed \$1,500 to Jack Franks' campaign. Both Noonan and Herb Franks declined to comment for this story.

Edward officials claim the lobbyists told them they should hire Kiferbaum because the firm wielded influence on the state board. To back up their claims, they noted that board Vice Chairman Stuart Levine had personally assured Mercy's CEO that Kiferbaum could "get things done."

Levine and Kiferbaum serve on

Imad Almanaseer, who then changed his vote from a "pass" to a "yes," giving Mercy the go-ahead.

Shortly afterward, two McHenry County hospitals owned by Centegra Health System filed a lawsuit seeking to overturn the board's ruling, calling the decision "arbitrary and capricious."

State Sen. Pamela Althoff (R-Crystal Lake) called for the state to investigate the board's action.

Levine abruptly resigned from the board earlier this month. Almanaseer was a no-show for the board's June meeting. His term expires July 1.

Four new hospital proposals — including Edward's — still stand before the beleaguered board, which meets again in August. Officials at each of the hospitals except Edward said they were not being pressured to go with Kiferbaum for their construction or Bear, Stearns for their financing.

Adventist Health System executive Ernie Sadan said in a written statement that his company was "shocked" by the Sun-Times report of the controversy swirling around the planning board.

"We sincerely hope that our application to build a hospital in Bolingbrook will not be unjustly affected by this news."

Feds investigate Mercy hospital permit

The U.S. attorney general's office is conducting a criminal investigation into a decision to approve a permit to build Mercy Crystal Lake Hospital and Medical Center, officials confirmed Friday.

Federal prosecutors have subpoenaed documents from the Illinois Health Facilities Planning Board, said Jeffrey Mark, executive secretary for the board.

Mercy officials said they are cooperating.

"We can tell you that we believe that we have acted properly," Mercy spokeswoman Barb Bortner said in a written statement. "In addition, we have been cooperative and intend to continue to cooperate with the inquiry."

Mercy's proposal to build the \$81 million hospital was approved April 21 in a controversial vote in which one planning board member changed his vote after a whispered conversation with a colleague.

The proposal was approved despite failing to meet most state criteria for building a hospital.

Since the vote, the board members involved in the whispered exchange, Stuart Levine and Imad Almanaseer, have quit. Levine resigned June 7, and Almanaseer asked not to be reappointed when his term expires July 1.

Levine, a wealthy lawyer who has donated more than \$1 million to political candidates since 1994, may be the focus of the investigation. A sealed lawsuit filed by Edward Hospital in Naperville claims that Levine used his influence with the planning board to win contracts for friends in the construction and finance industries, according to a report in the Chicago Sun-Times.

The U.S. attorney general's office declined to comment on the case.

But Cheryl Jackson, spokeswoman for Gov. Rod Blagojevich,

said an independent state inquiry started several weeks ago was halted at the request of federal prosecutors.

"We asked for the Inspector general to investigate," Jackson said. "Soon after the Inspector general began their investigation, the U.S. attorney's office asked for the Inspector general to hold off on their investigation until they had completed their own investigation."

Health facilities planning board members are appointed by Blagojevich, but Jackson said the governor will take no action until the investigation concludes.

Centegra Health System, the largest health-care provider in McHenry County, is suing to invalidate the planning board's decision to allow the 70-bed hospital at Route 31 and Three Oaks Road in Crystal Lake. The lawsuit claims that the board disregarded its own rules when it approved the hospital.

"We raised our concern after the board's approval by filing the appeal with the McHenry County Circuit Court," Centegra spokesman Geoff Huys said. "Others are now having some concerns about the actions of the planning board."

Planning board member Danalynn Rice of Marion voted against the Mercy proposal. She said she was unaware of any wrongdoing by her colleagues on the board.

"It's unfortunate if those people have done anything they shouldn't have done," Rice said. "I'm sorry for that if that's happened. They made their choice."

**MORATORIUM ON ALL BUSINESS OF THE
HEALTH FACILITIES PLANNING BOARD**

Pursuant to its authorizing legislation, "[t]he State [Health Facilities Planning] Board shall meet at least once each quarter, or as often as the Chairman of the State Board deems necessary, or upon the request of a majority of the members." 20 ILCS 3960/4 (West 2004). The Board most recently met on June 15 and June 16, 2004. In light of recent allegations concerning the propriety of certain Board actions, the Governor hereby imposes a moratorium on all meetings and actions of the Board until the Board is reconstituted by law.

AN ACT concerning executive agencies.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Illinois,
represented in the General Assembly:

Section 5. The Illinois Health Facilities Planning Act is amended by changing Sections 4, 4.2, and 19.6 as follows:

(20 ILCS 3960/4) (from Ch. 111 1/2, par. 1154)

(Section scheduled to be repealed on July 1, 2008)

Sec. 4. Health Facilities Planning Board; membership; appointment; term; compensation; quorum. There is created the Health Facilities Planning Board, which shall perform the functions described in this Act.

The State Board shall consist of 5 voting members. Each member shall have a reasonable knowledge of health planning, health finance, or health care at the time of his or her appointment. No person shall be appointed or continue to serve as a member of the State Board who is, or whose spouse, parent, or child is, a member of the Board of Directors of, has a financial interest in, or has a business relationship with a health care facility.

Notwithstanding any provision of this Section to the contrary, the term of office of each member of the State Board is abolished on the effective date of this amendatory Act of the 93rd General Assembly and those members no longer hold office.

~~Notwithstanding any provision of this Section to the contrary, the term of office of each member of the State Board is abolished on the effective date of this amendatory Act of the 93rd General Assembly, but all incumbent members shall continue to exercise all of the powers and be subject to all of the duties of members of the State Board until all new members of the 9-member State Board authorized under this amendatory Act of the 93rd General Assembly are appointed and take office. Beginning on the effective date of this amendatory Act of the 93rd General Assembly, the State Board shall consist of 9 voting members.~~

The State Board shall be appointed by the Governor, with the advice and consent of the Senate. Not more than 3 5 of the appointments shall be of the same political party at the time of the appointment. No person shall be appointed as a State Board member if that person has served, after the effective date of Public Act 93-41 ~~this amendatory Act of the 93rd General Assembly~~, 2 3-year terms as a State Board member, except for ex officio non-voting members.

The Secretary of Human Services, the Director of Public Aid, and the Director of Public Health, or their designated representatives, shall serve as ex-officio, non-voting members of the State Board.

Of those members initially appointed by the Governor under this amendatory Act of the 93rd General Assembly, 2 shall serve

for terms expiring July 1, 2005, 2 shall serve for terms expiring July 1, 2006, and 1 shall serve for a term expiring July 1, 2007. Of those members initially appointed by the Governor under this amendatory Act of the 93rd General Assembly, 3 shall serve for terms expiring July 1, 2004, 3 shall serve for terms expiring July 1, 2005, and 3 shall serve for terms expiring July 1, 2006. Thereafter, each appointed member shall hold office for a term of 3 years, provided that any member appointed to fill a vacancy occurring prior to the expiration of the term for which his or her predecessor was appointed shall be appointed for the remainder of such term and the term of office of each successor shall commence on July 1 of the year in which his predecessor's term expires. Each member appointed after the effective date of this amendatory Act of the 93rd General Assembly shall hold office until his or her successor is appointed and qualified.

State Board members, while serving on business of the State Board, shall receive actual and necessary travel and subsistence expenses while so serving away from their places of residence. A member of the State Board who experiences a significant financial hardship due to the loss of income on days of attendance at meetings or while otherwise engaged in the business of the State Board may be paid a hardship allowance, as determined by and subject to the approval of the Governor's Travel Control Board.

The Governor shall designate one of the members to serve as Chairman and shall name as full-time Executive Secretary of the State Board, a person qualified in health care facility planning and in administration. The Agency shall provide administrative and staff support for the State Board. The State Board shall advise the Director of its budgetary and staff needs and consult with the Director on annual budget preparation.

The State Board shall meet at least once each quarter, or as often as the Chairman of the State Board deems necessary, or upon the request of a majority of the members.

~~Three~~ Five members of the State Board shall constitute a quorum. The affirmative vote of ~~3~~ 5 of the members of the State Board shall be necessary for any action requiring a vote to be taken by the State Board. A vacancy in the membership of the State Board shall not impair the right of a quorum to exercise all the rights and perform all the duties of the State Board as provided by this Act.

A State Board member shall disqualify himself or herself from the consideration of any application for a permit or exemption in which the State Board member or the State Board member's spouse, parent, or child: (i) has an economic interest in the matter; or (ii) is employed by, serves as a consultant for, or is a member of the governing board of the applicant or a party opposing the application.

(a) Except in the disposition of matters that agencies are authorized by law to entertain or dispose of on an ex parte basis including, but not limited to rule making, the State Board, any State Board member, employee, or a hearing officer shall not engage in ex parte communication, ~~after an~~

~~application for a permit is received,~~ in connection with the substance of any pending or impending application for a permit with any person or party or the representative of any party. This subsection (a) applies when the Board, member, employee, or hearing officer knows, or should know upon reasonable inquiry, that the application is pending or impending.

(b) A State Board member or employee may communicate with other members or employees and any State Board member or hearing officer may have the aid and advice of one or more personal assistants.

(c) An ex parte communication received by the State Board, any State Board member, employee, or a hearing officer shall be made a part of the record of the ~~pending~~ matter, including all written communications, all written responses to the communications, and a memorandum stating the substance of all oral communications and all responses made and the identity of each person from whom the ex parte communication was received.

(d) "Ex parte communication" means a communication between a person who is not a State Board member or employee and a State Board member or employee that reflects on the substance of a pending or impending State Board proceeding and that takes place outside the record of the proceeding. Communications regarding matters of procedure and practice, such as the format of pleading, number of copies required, manner of service, and status of proceedings, are not considered ex parte communications. Technical assistance with respect to an application, not intended to influence any decision on the application, may be provided by employees to the applicant. Any assistance shall be documented in writing by the applicant and employees within 10 business days after the assistance is provided.

(e) For purposes of this Section, "employee" means a person the State Board or the Agency employs on a full-time, part-time, contract, or intern basis.

(f) The State Board, State Board member, or hearing examiner presiding over the proceeding, in the event of a violation of this Section, must take whatever action is necessary to ensure that the violation does not prejudice any party or adversely affect the fairness of the proceedings.

(g) Nothing in this Section shall be construed to prevent the State Board or any member of the State Board from consulting with the attorney for the State Board.

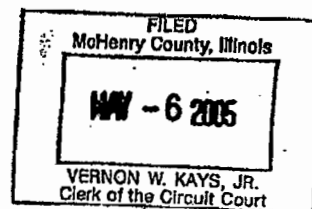

MEMORANDUM OPINION AND ORDER

This cause came before the Court on Count I of the Complaint filed by the Plaintiffs' Northern Illinois Medical Center, Memorial Medical Center and Centegra Health System for Administrative Review of the Decision of Illinois Health Facilities Planning Board ("State Board") pursuant to 735 ILCS 5/3-110, 5/3-111 20 ILCS 3960/11. Plaintiffs seek reversal of the Administrative Decision of the State Board which granted a permit to the Mercy Crystal Lake Hospital and Medical Center, Inc. ("Mercy Hospital") to construct a new hospital in Crystal Lake. Plaintiffs contend that the State Board's actions in approving the issuance of the permit were against the manifest weight of the evidence and arbitrary and capricious, particularly in light of the negative reports of the Illinois Department of Public Health ("State Agency").

The Court has reviewed all the relevant pleadings, including Count I of the Complaint for Administrative Review, Plaintiffs' Motion to Reverse Administrative Decision, the Memorandum in support of said Motion, the Response of Mercy Hospital and Mercy Health System Corporation and Reply of Plaintiffs thereto. The Court has further reviewed the entire certified record of administrative proceedings which includes the Application for Permit, documents in support of the application, the State Agency reports, the Record of Public Hearing on September 29, 2003 and the transcripts of hearings before the State Board on December 17, 2003 and April 21, 2004, with corrections made at the June 15, 2004 State Board meeting. The Court has reviewed the case law cited by the parties in their written submissions and has had the benefit of the oral arguments of the attorneys for the Plaintiffs and Defendants.

BACKGROUND

The Illinois Health Facilities Planning Act was instituted "to establish a procedure designed to reverse the trends of increasing in costs of health care resulting from unnecessary construction or modification of health care facilities ... and to improve the financial ability of the public to obtain necessary health services and to establish an orderly and comprehensive health care delivery system which will guarantee the availability of quality health care to the general public". 20 ILCS 3960/2 To that end, the Planning Act provided for the creation of a Board and defined its duties and functions. The powers and duties of the State Board include the prescribing of rules, regulations, standards, criteria and procedures to carry out the provisions of the Act. 20 ILCS 3960/12 The regulations and criteria are contained in Sections 1110 through 1260 of Title 77 of the Illinois Administrative Code. A health care facility cannot be modified or constructed unless the Board issues a permit. 20 ILCS 3060/5.1 In evaluating an application for

permit or Certificate of Need, the Board is assisted by Illinois Department of Public Health which serves as administrative and staff support for the Board. 20 ILCS 3960/4

On July 11, 2003, Mercy Hospital filed an Application for Certificate of Need (CON) with the Illinois Health Facilities Planning Board. The application requests a permit for establishment and construction of a new 70 bed hospital with adjacent office facilities for 45 physicians in Crystal Lake, Illinois. The proposed hospital would have 56 medical/surgical beds; 10 obstetrics beds and 4 intensive care beds. The hospital site is located within a MSA, known as area A-10. The initial application was deemed incomplete on July 24, 2003 and by letter of that date, additional information was requested. That information was provided on July 30, 2003, which included a listing of all hospitals within 45 minutes of the proposed facility.

A public hearing was conducted on September 29, 2003 in Crystal Lake, Illinois. In addition to persons associated with Mercy Hospital and its parent corporation, Mercy Health System, hundreds of interested persons testified or offered written submissions both in favor of and in opposition of the proposed project.

The Illinois Department of Public Health issued its initial report evaluating Mercy Hospital's application. The report found that overall, Mercy Hospital did not meet the review criteria of Illinois Administrative Code, Sections 1110 and 1120. The State Agency submitted its report to the Board on December 17, 2003 and the Board conducted a hearing on that same date. At the meeting the Board denied the application.

Thereafter, Mercy Hospital submitted additional information for the project to the State Agency and requested another hearing date before the State Board. A Supplemental Agency Report was prepared based on the new materials and submitted to the State Board at its April 21, 2004 meeting. The report did change some of its findings in the supplemental report dealing

with financial and economic considerations under Section 1120 of the Illinois Administrative Code. The evaluations pertaining to Section 1110 remained unchanged. At the Board meeting on April 21, 2004, the Board approved Mercy Hospital's application. The State Agency issued a letter on May 15, 2004 informing the applicant of the State Board's approval of the project.

On May 26, 2004, the Plaintiffs filed its Complaint for Administrative Review of the State Board's decision to grant the CON to Mercy Hospital. The Plaintiffs assert that the decision of the State Board should be reversed because (a) it is against the manifest weight of the evidence; (b) the issuance of the permit was arbitrary and capricious; (c) the vote of the Board on April 21st did not specify the action proposed and the Board did not make any findings; and, (d) the voting process was improper and evidence of arbitrary conduct.

REVIEW OF THE BOARD'S DECISION

A. MANIFEST WEIGHT OF THE EVIDENCE:

The Plaintiffs contend that the Decision of the Board to issue the permit to Mercy Hospital for the establishment and construction of a new hospital in Crystal Lake, Illinois was against the manifest weight of the evidence.

If factual findings are made by an administrative agency, they are viewed as prima facie correct and a reviewing court will not disturb those findings, unless they are contrary to the manifest weight of the evidence. BRIDGESTONE/FIRESTONE, INC. vs. DOHERTY, 305 Ill. App. 3d 141 (1999).

At the administrative hearing on April 21, 2004, no factual findings were made by the State Board. On May 14, 2004, the executive secretary of the Board issued a letter notifying Mercy Hospital that the State Board had approved the Application for Permit. That letter

indicated that Board based its approval upon the project's substantial conformance with the applicable standards and criteria of Part 1110 and 1120. It further stated that, "In arriving at a decision, the State Board considered the findings contained in the State Agency Report, the application material, the State Agency's Report of Public Hearing held on September 29, 2003 and any testimony made before the State Board".

The aforesaid letter does not set forth specific findings of fact. It does state the Board's conclusions and the basis therefore. Section 10 of the Planning Act does not require the Board to specify its findings of facts and conclusions unless negative action on an Application is taken. 20 ILCS 3960/10 In addition, Section 1130.680 of the Administrative Code requires the Board to specify its "finding of fact and conclusions of law" only when the Board denies an application.

ACCESS CENTER FOR HEALTH, LTD. Vs. HEALTH FACILITIES PLANNING BOARD,

283 Ill App 3d 227 (1996).

In the case at bar, the State Board did not deny Mercy Hospital's Application for Permit or CON. Even if findings were necessary, that may not be enough for the trial court to reverse the Board's decision. If the record contains competent and sufficient evidence that supports the agency's decision, the decision should be affirmed. CATHEDRAL ROCK OF GRANITE CITY, INC. vs. ILLINOIS HEALTH FACILITIES PLANNING BOARD. 308 Ill App 3d 529 (1999).

An administrative agency's decision is against the weight of the evidence only if the opposite conclusion is clearly evident. The mere fact that the opposite conclusion is reasonable or that the reviewing court may have ruled differently does not justify reversal of an administrative decision. A trial court may not reweigh the evidence or make an independent

determination of the facts. ABRAHAMSON vs. ILLINOIS DEPARTMENT OF PROFESSIONAL REGULATION, 153 Ill. App 2d 76 (1992)

In order to approve and authorize the issuance of a permit if it finds the State Board must find that the proposed project is consistent with the orderly and economic development of such facilities and is in accord with standards, criteria or plans of need adopted and approved pursuant to provisions of Section 12 of 20 ILCS 3960.

Section 12 of the Illinois Health Facilities Planning Act authorizes the State Board to prescribe rules, regulations, criteria and procedures to carry out the purposes of the Act. That section further enumerates certain factors the Board shall consider in developing health care facility plans. Those factors include the number of existing and planned facilities offering similar programs, the extent of utilization of existing facilities, the availability of facilities which may serve as alternatives or substitutes and the availability of personnel necessary to operate the facility. 20 ILCS 3960/12(1) and (4).

Acting as an administrative and support arm of the State Board, the State Agency prepared two reports for the Board's review and consideration. Those reports consider the application and supporting documentation submitted. The State Agency evaluated Mercy Hospital's application with respect to financial and economic criteria set forth in Section 1120 of Title 77 of the Illinois Administrative Code and the general review criteria and needed related criteria set forth in Section 1110 of the Illinois Administrative Code 77 Illinois Adm. Code. The Administrative Code has the force and effect of law. MEDCAT LEASING CO. vs. WHITLEY, 253 Ill App 3rd 801 (1993).

The Agency report completed for submission to the State Board Hearing on December 17, 2003 found that the Mercy Hospital Application, was in conformity with three of the four

applicable economic feasibility criteria and that the financial feasibility criteria were not applicable. The Agency report found that aside from meeting the background of applicant criterion (1110.230), that Mercy Hospital met none of the other criteria under Section 1110, the general or need related criteria, including the criteria for a variance to bed need.

At the December 17, 2003 State Board Hearing, Mercy Hospital had various representatives present who presented testimony regarding the application and in response to questioning by Board members. Those present for Mercy were Javon Bea, President of Mercy Hospital; Richard Gruber, Vice President of Mercy Hospital; Dan Colby, President of mercy Harvard Hospital and three attorneys representing Mercy. The Board addressed concerns regarding the bed variance, the shortage of obstetrical beds in the M.S.A., the additional physicians that Mercy would bring to staff its proposed hospital and the impact of the hospital on staffing in other area hospitals. At the conclusion of the hearing, the State Board denied Mercy Hospital's application. No findings were made. However, before the Notice of Intent to Deny was sent on January 27, 2004, Mercy Hospital on January 15, 2004 sent a letter with supplemental information requesting leave to reappear before the Board at the February meeting.

After receipt of the supplemental information from Mercy Hospital, the State Agency issued another report for submission to the Board at its April 21, 2004 meeting. No hearing was held regarding Mercy's application between December 17 and the April 21st meeting. The report of the State Agency for the April hearing contained the same findings regarding the general criteria and needed related criteria; that being that except for applicant meeting the background criteria, Mercy Hospital did not meet the other 1110 criteria. The State Agency found that with the change in cost submitted by Mercy in the supplemental materials, Mercy now met all of the economic feasibility factors.

At the hearing on April 21, 2004 before the Board representatives of Mercy appeared as well as its legal counsel. With respect to bed need, Mercy Hospital had submitted data from the Center for Disease Control which indicated that 76% of the hospitals in the United States have less than 100 beds. Upon questioning, hospital personnel acknowledged that this study was not Illinois or McHenry County based but rather reflected nationwide statistics. Documentation regarding the decrease in average patient stays was discussed using 980 figures versus today. Testimony was received regarding the 45 new physicians Mercy would bring to the proposed hospital, which physicians would be in their employ. Mercy representatives opined that with these new doctors in place, patients who resided in the M.S.A. who sought treatment outside of the M.S.A. would return for care. There was discussion concerning the findings by the State Agency on the general criteria and need criteria not being met. Board member Levine believed that the rules were outdated and needed to be revised to reflect current data. He was particularly impressed with the 45 physicians who would be moving to McHenry County to staff the proposed hospital. At the conclusion of the hearing, the Board voted to approve the application and the motion passed. On May 14, 2003, a letter advising of the approval of the application for permit was sent to Mercy Hospital.

Plaintiffs assert that the decision of the State Board is against the manifest weight of the evidence because the proposed project was not in accordance with the standards, criteria or plans of need adopted and approved pursuant to the provisions of the Illinois Health Facilities Planning Act. In particular, the Plaintiffs direct the Court to the State Agency reports wherein it was noted that Mercy Hospital's proposed project was not in conformity with the general review criteria and need related criteria under Sections 1110 of the Illinois Administrative Code.

The Defendants counter Plaintiffs assertions by directing the Court to the standard of review and the discretionary authority the State Board has under 1130.660 of the Illinois Administrative Code. That provision states in pertinent part the follows:

"The State Board shall consider the application and any supplemental information or modification submitted by the applicant, IDPH report(s), the public hearing testimony, if any and other information coming before it in making its determination whether to approve the project. The applications are reviewed to determine compliance with review criteria enumerated in 77 Ill. Adm. Code 1110 and 1120. The failure of a project to meet one or more review criteria, as set forth in 77 Ill. Adm. Code 1110 and 1120 shall not prohibit the issuance of a permit."

The applicability of Section 1130.660 has been addressed in a number of cases, which cases have been cited by the parties herein. With the exception of the Court in SPRINGBOARD, the Courts have recognized that the State Board does have the authority to approve an application where one or more of the review criteria were not met. DIMENSIONS MEDICAL CENTER, LTD. Vs. SUBURBAN ENDOSCOPY CENTER, 298 Ill App 3d 93 (1998). ACCESS CENTER FOR HEALTH LTD. vs. HEALTH FACILITIES PLANNING BOARD, 283 Ill App 3d 227 (1996), CATHEDRAL ROCK OF GRANITE CITY vs. ILLINOIS HEALTH FACILITIES PLANNING BOARD, 308 Ill. App 3d 529 (1999) and MARION HOSPITAL CORPORATION vs. ILLINOIS HEALTH PLANNING BOARD, FACILITIES SPRINGWOOD is distinguishable from the aforementioned cases because the Court did not consider the applicability of 1130.660 in that case. SPRINGWOOD ASSOCIATES vs. HEALTH FACILITIES PLANNING BOARD, 269 Ill App 3d 944 (1995).

However, in each of the cases where the Courts upheld the Board's decision to exercise its discretionary authority, the courts looked to the record to determine if there was adequate evidence to support the Board's decision. None of the cases cited by the Defendants have State

Agency Reports that found lack of conformity with essentially all of the need related and general criteria as in the case at bar.

The letter of May 14, 2004, issued on behalf of the State Board found substantial conformance with the applicable standards and criteria of part 1110 and 1120 based on its consideration of the findings contained in the State Agency reports, the application material, the report of public hearing on September 29, 2003 and any testimony made before the State Board.

At the public hearing the majority of those who testified were in opposition to the proposed project. Almost 2000 letters were submitted both in support of and in opposition to Mercy Hospital. More letters were in opposition. Many of the letters submitted were form letters used by supporters of Plaintiffs' and Defendants' respective positions. Some of the letters were from Mercy's website, which did not allow negative input.

The State Agency Reports submitted to the State Board for hearings on December 17, 2003 and April 21, 2004 found that the proposed project was not in conformity with the following general review and need related criteria: 110.320(a): Establishment of Additional Hospitals, 110.320(b); Allocation of Additional Beds, 1110.520(a); Unit Size; 1110.520(b); Variances to Bed Needs, 110.520(b)(2); Medically Underserved Variance, 1110.230(a); Location, 1110.230(c); Alternatives, 1110.230(d); Need for the Project, 1110.230(e); and Size of the Project. The project was in conformity with 1110.230(b), Background of Applicant, which provided that the applicants complied with the necessary licensure and certification information required and are fit, willing, able and have the necessary background to provide a proper standard of healthcare service for the community.

In response to the adverse reports of the State Agency, Mercy Hospital addressed the growing population trends in McHenry County, the shortage of physicians in McHenry County

and the changes in the practice of medicine that have reduced the average length of patient stays in hospitals. Mercy Hospital asserts that as a result of the decline in the patient length of stays, there is no longer a need for the requirement of 100 medical/surgical beds as established in 1980 and that only 67 beds are needed to serve the same number of patients.

Section 1110.320(2) of the Illinois Administrative Code requires that hospitals within a M.S.A. must have a minimum of 100 medical/surgical beds. Hospitals situated outside a M.S.A. do not have such a limitation. Mercy Hospital proposes 56 med/surg. beds with initially 32 of the entire 70 beds being built out and the remaining 38 being shells for later construction. The Defendant hospital did not identify how the 32 beds would be allocated. At the Board hearing of April 21, 2004, Mr. Glaser, on behalf of Mercy Hospital stated that all 70 beds would immediately be built out, contrary to the data in the application and earlier testimony. (R3541) (R.14) Section 1110.230.530(a)(1)(A) provides that a new obstetric unit with a M.S.A. must have 20 beds. Mercy proposal is for 10 obstetric beds.

Mercy Hospital submitted material based on average length of patient stays in 1980 to the present, claiming that 67 beds would now provide care for the same number of patients in a 100 bed facility in 1980. The documentation presented gives nationwide figures with no specific data for Illinois.

The 100 bed standard was established in 1992 and not 1980 and is applicable only to hospitals within a Metropolitan Statistical Area, such as the proposed location. Furthermore, according to the bed inventory data, the A-10 planning area (M.S.A.), where the proposed facility would be located, has 35 excess medical surgical beds and 7 excess ICU beds. Assuming that the present average length of patient stays reduces the need for beds, then the proposed additional beds at Mercy Hospital would only increase the surplus but also affect the target

utilization rates at neighboring hospitals, which is also taken into account under the need related criteria. Presently the hospitals in proximity to the proposed project are generally not operating at the State's target utilization rates.

The only shortage of beds in the M.S.A. is obstetrical beds, which shortage is 20 beds. Mercy's application proposes 10 obstetrical beds. Mercy Health System Corporation operates Mercy Harvard Hospital, which is within M.S.A. 10. Mercy Harvard Hospital closed its obstetrical unit approximately three years ago and has not reopened since Mercy acquired the hospital approximately two years ago.

There are located within planning Area 10 three hospitals which offer the same services as the proposed project. Two of these three hospitals are within 30 minutes of the proposed facility. These are Northern Illinois Medical Center in McHenry and Memorial Medical Center in Woodstock. The third hospital, Mercy Harvard is within 45 minutes of the proposed facility. Additionally, there are four other hospitals not within the planning area, but within 30 minutes of the site of Mercy Hospital. They are Advocate Good Shepherd, Barrington, St. Alexius Medical Center, Hoffman Estates, Sherman Hospital, Elgin and Provena St. Joseph Hospital in Elgin. Each of these health facilities offer the same services as the proposed hospital.

Defendant acknowledges the presence of these other hospitals and that Mercy will offer no services not already provided by these facilities. However, Mercy contends that with the growth of population within the county, the travel times will increase in the future and thereby increasing the travel times in excess of 30 minutes to those hospitals. The estimates of future travel times do not take in account road expansion projects which might be undertaken. The evidence on the travel times and future projections offered by the Defendant are in some instances inaccurate and other instances speculative.

Mercy opines that a significant percentage of patients are leaving the planning area for health care and that with the establishment of a new hospital, a good percentage of those patients will return to the area for treatment. Competent evidence is lacking to support this opinion. Evidence at the public hearing and elsewhere in the record shows that approximately 75% of the residents within zip code targeted area received care at existing hospitals and that other patients leaving the target area are doing so for specialized or tertiary care. It is also unclear if Mercy's opinion takes into account the services received at the hospitals located within 30 minutes but outside of area A-10.

The review criteria does provide for variance for bed need. 77 Ill. Adm. Code 1110.530(b)(2). In order to satisfy the variance to bed need requirements, Mercy Hospital had to document that access to the proposed service is restricted in the planning area by documenting at least one of the following: (i) the absence of service within the planning area; (ii) limitations on government funded or charity patients; (iii) restrictive admissions policies of existing providers; (iv) the area population and existing care system exhibits indicators of median care problems such as an average family income level below the state poverty level, high infant mortality or designation as a "Health Manpower Shortage Area; or (v) the project will provide for a portion of the population who must currently travel over 45 minutes to receive service. Mercy Hospital was found to have documented none of the aforesaid criteria in order to receive a variance. Evidence presented showed that seven hospitals are within 45 minutes and all offer the same services Mercy will offer, if not more. Travel studies submitted by mercy were in some ways misleading as they included round trip travel times which is not the standard for review or were based on future projections. No evidence whatsoever was submitted to document items (i) through (iv).

Much was made by the Board at the April 21, 2003 hearing about the 45 physicians Mercy Hospital would bring to staff its hospital and adjacent offices. It is unclear from the evidence where these physicians will come from. However, Mercy did indicate that with the opening a new hospital, it would close three of its physician staffed facilities now located in and Cary and Crystal Lake. Board member, Mr. Levine, commented at the April 21st meeting how impressed he was that these new physicians would help make a dent in the shortage of physicians in the area. There was a chart provided showing a physician shortage in McHenry County. The underlying data for the information in the chart is unknown. While the Board addressed the shortage of physicians in the area, it appears not to have adequately considered the shortage of healthcare support staff. The evidence in the record reflects that there is a shortage of health care personnel needed to staff hospitals. There are not enough nurses, medical technicians and laboratory technicians to staff hospitals nationwide and in McHenry County. Testimony at the public hearing expressed a concern that the new hospital would not be able to adequately staff its facility and would have to recruit medical personnel from other area hospitals, thereby causing shortages of necessary and required staff in those facilities. Area hospitals have experienced staffing problems which have resulted in their not being able to maximize the use of their facilities.

The record further documents that the proposed hospital would adversely impact the utilization rates at hospitals within the M.S.A. and nearby. Mr. Ryder, of Advocate Health Care in Barrington testified at the public hearing that more than 25% of its patients are from the towns targeted by Mercy Hospital. A study submitted at the public hearing by Plaintiffs and prepared by Deloitte and Touche, at Plaintiff's instance concluded that Northern Illinois Medical Center and Memorial Medical Center, both in A-10 would lose approximately 9,500 cases annually.

Upon a review of the record, there is not sufficient and competent evidence supporting the State Board's decision to grant the issuance of the permit to Mercy Hospital. While the Board has the authority to issue a permit when all of the criteria under 1110 are not met, there needs to be some rationale basis to excuse compliance with the criteria. The record does not reflect that Mercy Hospital presented sufficient evidence showing that the proposed hospital facility was needed, was the most effective or least costly alternative and was in a medically underserved planning area. Sufficient evidence did not establish that the project warranted a variance to bed need.

Mercy Hospital's application did not meet the necessary general review and need related criteria and the factors set forth in 20 ILCS 3960/12. The written submissions and oral testimony did not rebut the Agency's findings that Mercy Hospital's application was not in conformity with the criteria set forth in 77 Ill. Adm. Code 1110. This Court finds that the State Board's decision is against the manifest weight of the evidence.

B. ARBITRARY AND CAPRICIOUS

The Plaintiffs also contend that the Board's decision was arbitrary and capricious. The Illinois Supreme Court in GREER vs. ILLINOIS HOUSING DEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY, 122 Ill 2d 462 (1988) set forth guidelines to be applied by the Court in determining whether the decision of an Agency is arbitrary and capricious. Those guidelines direct the Court to consider: 1. Did the Agency rely on factors the legislature did not intend the agency to consider; 2. Did the Agency fail to consider an important aspect of the problem, or 3. Did the Agency offer an explanation for its decision which runs counter to the evidence before the agency or which is so

implausible that it could not be ascribed to a difference in view or the product of agency expertise.

The State Board in the case at bar excused the mercy Hospital's failure to comply with essentially all of the general and need related criteria. The only rationale for the Board's actions capable of being gleaned from the hearing on April 21st was that the rules and review criteria are outdated and that this new facility will help fill the shortage of physicians in the service area.

At that April Board meeting, Board members expressed concern about the Board's decision being termed "arbitrary and capricious" if it approved the Mercy Hospital Application for Permit in light of the State Agency's two reports showing non conformity with the 1110 criteria. In response thereto, Board member Stuart Levine stated that the rules and criteria are "woefully out of date". He further stated that he has participated in "a lot of applications that were granted that had complete negative findings. And those occurred in instances where there were valid reasons and justifications given in each of the areas that, of course, are in the Board's discretion to do". R 3264. Yet, Mr. Levine did not offer any explanation or justification for the Board's approval in the instant case, other than he was impressed with the 45 new physicians who would be coming to McHenry County and who would make a dent in the physician shortage.

The Board hearing on April 21 focused in large part on the new physicians who would be employed by Mercy Hospital. However, the rules governing the Board's decisions do not provide for criteria which address physician shortages. The documentation provided by Mercy regarding physician shortages was done by Solucient and is in the record at page 2913. The chart shows that Crystal Lake, the location of the proposed hospital, has no physician shortage. Lake in the Hills, Cary and Algonquin are the other target service areas. No data is provided for

physicians in Lake in the Hills. On Solucient's documentation, Cary and Algonquin do show physician shortages. The source for the data is not disclosed. Even with these claimed shortages, Mercy System Corporation is going to close its two physician offices in Crystal Lake and one in Cary.

Furthermore, while there may be a shortage of physicians in the area, the Board did not discuss and apparently did not consider the evidence in the record of the shortages of registered nurses, laboratory technicians and medical technologists in the area. The public hearing record is replete with testimony of medical personal on the shortage of such personnel. These personnel are needed to staff a hospital. Mercy Hospital offered no evidence where this staff would come from other than stating they would recruit medical personnel who worked outside of the area. Nothing in the record indicates a surplus of such personnel in other areas of the state. No evidence was presented on the number of resident medical personnel who worked outside of the M.S.A. or beyond the 30 minute travel time. Testimony at the public hearing showed a concern among McHenry County health care workers that Mercy would recruit staff from area facilities thereby affecting the viability of those hospitals.

Upon a review of the record, the Court finds that State Board relied on factors not intended by the legislature and that they failed to consider important aspects of the problem concerning the shortage of medical support staff and the impact the proposed hospital would have on the hospitals within the M.S.A. and within 30 minutes travel time. When the Board first denied the Mercy Hospital's application, it had information on the 45 new employee-physicians who would be at the physician offices adjacent to the hospital. Yet, at the April 21st meeting, the new physicians appeared to be the primary basis for the affirmative vote.

The Court finds that the actions of the State Board, in approving the application for permit for the Mercy Hospital project, was arbitrary and capricious.

C. NECESSARY PARTIES

Plaintiffs contend that the decision should be reversed because the proper party was not joined as a party to the application. Particularly, Plaintiffs claim that Section 1130.220(b) of the Illinois Administrative Code requires that Mercy Health Systems Corporation be a co-applicant.

Section 1130.220 provides in pertinent part as follows:

"The following person(s) must be the applicant(s) for permit or exemption, as applicable:

(b)(3) any related person who is or will be financially responsible for guaranteeing or making payments on any debt related to the project."

It is undisputed that Mercy Health System falls within that classification and that they were not parties to the application. The State Agency Report, however, reflects that is considered that entity to be a co-applicant even though it wasn't. Documentation was submitted verifying the bond rating of Mercy Health System Corporation and other data was provided regarding its corporate structure and related entities.

The non inclusion of Mercy Health System as an applicant may have affected the economic review criteria under 1120.310(a). The State Agency found that Criterion 1120.310(a) was "not applicable as the applicant's document proof of an "A "bond rating". Mercy Health System should have been a party to the application for permit. However, the failure to include Mercy Health System Corporation as a co-applicant, standing alone, would not be a basis for a finding of the State Board's decision being against the manifest weight of the evidence.

D. THE VOTING PROCESS

The Plaintiffs claim that the voting process was improper by the Board not specifying the nature of the motion voted on and Board members engaging in off the record discussions. It is apparent from the record that the Board on motion knew that it was voting to approve the permit. While formality is lacking, the record reflects that in the other proceedings that day, which are part of the record the Board used the same methodology in voting.

While the off record comments by Board members may be irregular, they do not constitute ex parte communications. The Court can not attribute any significance to the off record comments in this review.

Based on a review of the record and for the foregoing reasons, the Court hereby finds that the Decision of the Illinois Health Planning Board to grant the issuance of the permit to Mercy Hospital and Mercy Health Systems was against the manifest weight of the evidence and arbitrary and capricious.

IT IS HEREBY ORDERED that the Decision of the Illinois Health Planning Board to issue a permit in Project No. 03-049 is reversed.

Dear Members of the Illinois Health Facilities and Services Review Board:

My name is Anne M. Hammes. I am a registered nurse with over 45 years of experience. Most of my career has been in Rockford, Ill. and I have worked in all three Rockford hospitals. I have practiced as a bedside critical care nurse, a clinical nurse specialist, a nursing educator and a nurse administrator. I had a good experience in all roles and in all three hospitals. I am sharing my thoughts with you from the patient perspective and particularly as a long-time resident of the west side of Rockford and the need for quality services at the level currently provided by Rockford Memorial Hospital (RMH).

I speak in Opposition to the proposed move of MercyRockford to the new location on Riverside – on the far East Side.

I feel that this move would be very destabilizing for the west side of the city of Rockford and it will have a negative impact on access to care. MercyRockford is proposing moving the Level I Trauma Center to the East Side. There is already a Level I Trauma center at OSF Saint Anthony, which is within 4 miles of the new location. This will leave the west side of the city and the entire west side of Winnebago County without a Level I Trauma Center. When treating trauma, time is critical in getting patients to definitive treatment. Sometimes a patient can be stabilized and transported to another site, but sometimes that is NOT the best option for the patient. There is also a proposal to transfer the cardiac catheterization lab and cardiac surgery to the East side. The same situation is true; for some patients the sooner a cardiac artery can be opened and stented,

the better it is for the patient. My understanding is that there will be many fewer hospital beds available and about ½ of the beds remaining on the west side will be for mental health/substance abuse patients. So if a general medical-surgical patient needs hospitalization, the family will need to travel farther to visit their loved one. The remaining emergency department will be reduced in size from 31 treatment stations to 17 treatment stations. This will also reduce access to care. What is the wait time in the emergency department at RMH now? I hear that it is currently long and the reduction in treatment stations will make it even longer. I am sure that the response is that the overall number of beds will be increased by adding beds to the east side facility. But how does that provide increased access to patients on the west side of the city?

A new physicians' office building is proposed for the new location. The current physician office building, the former Rockford Clinic, seems to be significantly underutilized. I was in the clinic last year and was amazed at the empty waiting rooms especially in comparison to the activity level of 10 -15 years ago. I am sure that the clinic could be remodeled to meet today's standards. Again, access to care will be limited for the residents of the west side who need to visit a physician's office.

I have heard that Rockford Memorial is "land locked". The hospital has land that extends west beyond Edgemont St. where a large parking lot is. They also own a number of homes surrounding the hospital. If MercyRockford was committed to the City of Rockford, they could take an approach similar to that of SwedishAmerican and develop their facility and the surrounding area. In the city of Chicago hospitals have built large patient care towers with an innovative design to meet caregiver and patient needs. Rush University Medical Center is an example of how this can be done. Rockford is fortunate to have three great hospitals who serve the community in a balanced geographic approach. This proposed move will upset the balance.

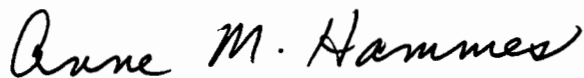
The opportunity for new construction jobs has been touted as a reason to approve this proposal. Those jobs would be created if a new facility was built on the west side property or if the current facility underwent major upgrades. And the construction jobs would be gone once the project was completed. But the impact of diminished services or closed hospital on the west side and the surrounding neighborhoods would be long term and devastating.

MercyRockford says that it is losing money on the west side facility. However, they are proposing to spend over \$400 million on a brand new facility. Why not spend the money to upgrade and remodel the west side facility? It has been stated in the newspaper that if MercyRockford does NOT get approval for the certificate of need it will either abandon the west side and only build the east side hospital without a Level I Trauma Center or it will move the entire project, new hospital, Trauma Center and physician offices to Beloit, Wisconsin. I find this threat extremely offensive.

The Rockford community has embarked on an aggressive improvement project called "Transform Rockford". All of the work is designed to transform from within to be a top 25 community. All of the impact statements speak to a "unified" community with vibrant neighborhoods where "residents have access to excellent, comprehensive services for health". I feel that the move of MercyRockford to the east side does NOT fit into the Community Vision.

As a Health Facilities and Services review board, I would hope that the board would focus on the concept of service. Rockford Memorial Hospital has been a tremendous asset to the Rockford community for many years. The hospital and its caregivers have provided quality service to patients and families for generations. I believe this service is best provided closest to the people they serve, which is on the west side of Winnebago County.

Dear Ms. Avery,

I'm writing to voice my strong opposition to MercyRockford's Certificate of Need (CON) applications, specifically Projects #15-038 and #15-039.

I oppose these projects for three main reasons:

1. I believe everyone deserves **access to health care**. MercyRockford's plans will move vital health care services such as Level I trauma care, cardiac services, pediatrics and obstetrics away from those who need it most on the West Side.
2. I believe MercyRockford can **invest** the money it has designated for these plans **into its current campus**, or into a new campus on the West Side to avoid costly and wasteful duplication of services.
3. There has been **insufficient time to organize opposition**.

Access to Health Care

I know access to health care is important to you and members of the Illinois Health Facilities and Services Review Board (IHFSRB). It's the primary reason you exist. The Health Facilities Planning Act (20 ILCS 3960/2) "promotes the development of a comprehensive health care delivery system that assures the availability of quality facilities, related services, and equipment to the public, while simultaneously addressing the issues of community need, accessibility and financing."

If this plan is approved, it will dramatically alter the availability of quality health care facilities, related services and equipment to residents of the West Side of Rockford, who already have difficulty accessing health care services. Most of Rockford's medically underserved and indigent residents – more than 7,300 people – live in my ward, the 5th ward, and other West Side wards served by my fellow aldermen.

I have included for your reference several maps from the January 2008 Rockford Area Transportation Study. These maps indicate the demographic dispersion of Rockford's racial and ethnic populations. I've added the approximate locations of our current hospitals and where MercyRockford is proposing its new hospital. You will quickly see that MercyRockford is moving far away from the medically underserved residents who most need access to Rockford Memorial Hospital services.

Residents on the East Side already have access to these services via OSF Saint Anthony Medical Center and SwedishAmerican. All three of our hospitals are well balanced to serve the health care needs of Rockford residents. There is no need to upset that balance with costly duplicated services.

Additionally, if the Board approves MercyRockford's CONs the City of Rockford will be forced to allocate millions of dollars immediately and perpetually to construct and staff a new fire station, possibly relocate at least one additional fire station, and to add ambulances due to the increased transport time to the new hospital. These unbudgeted expenses come at a time when Rockford already is facing a multi-million dollar budget deficit that is projected to increase over the next several years.

Invest into its Current Campus

The \$400 million plus MercyRockford plans to spend on a new East Side hospital would do a tremendous amount to spur economic development on the West Side. Investing on the West Side also would maintain health care services where they are needed most. Rockford Memorial Hospital has been serving the West Side for more than 100 years. In turn, residents of the West Side have supported the hospital.

MercyRockford should capitalize on the opportunity to upgrade its facilities and recapture its patient base by rebuilding on any of the available large parcels on the West Side or, even better, in its current footprint. SwedishAmerican Hospital, which is far more land-locked than Rockford Memorial, recently completed a major expansion and redevelopment of its urban campus and cemented its commitment to the surrounding community. I have attached the full page "Open Letter to Our Community" that SwedishAmerican recently published in the *Rockford Register Star* regarding its concerns about MercyRockford's CON applications and their own decision to commit to the community where its services are needed.

Insufficient Time to Organize Opposition

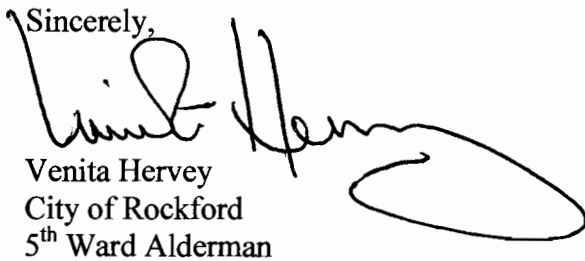
Unlike MercyRockford, the West Side community does not have the resources and communication channels to mount a major marketing campaign and garner visible support for our position. Though you will not see many opposition letters on your website, please know that the petitions and letters in opposition that have been submitted were gathered through grassroots efforts that generally take years to develop. Although we did not have the money to run television commercials, and were not invited to present our position to the newspaper's editorial board, several events illustrate that West Side residents care deeply about maintaining vital services at Rockford Memorial.

For example, I hosted an educational event – "Straight Talk on Trauma" – Oct. 14 in Rockford. I felt that West Side residents needed to better understand what kind of trauma care they have now and how it will be changed if these plans are approved. Eyes were opened that night and residents' voices got louder. I strongly believe that given more time we could have gathered more demonstrative evidence of the community's opposition to MercyRockford's proposed reductions of services at Rockford Memorial Hospital. That said, I am extremely proud of the community for standing up and making its voice heard.

I also have attached examples of media coverage from the past month and a half to demonstrate to the HFSRB that there is strong community opposition to these CON applications and that real people will be affected by these plans.

For all of the above reasons, I respectfully ask the Review Board to deny MercyRockford's CON applications.

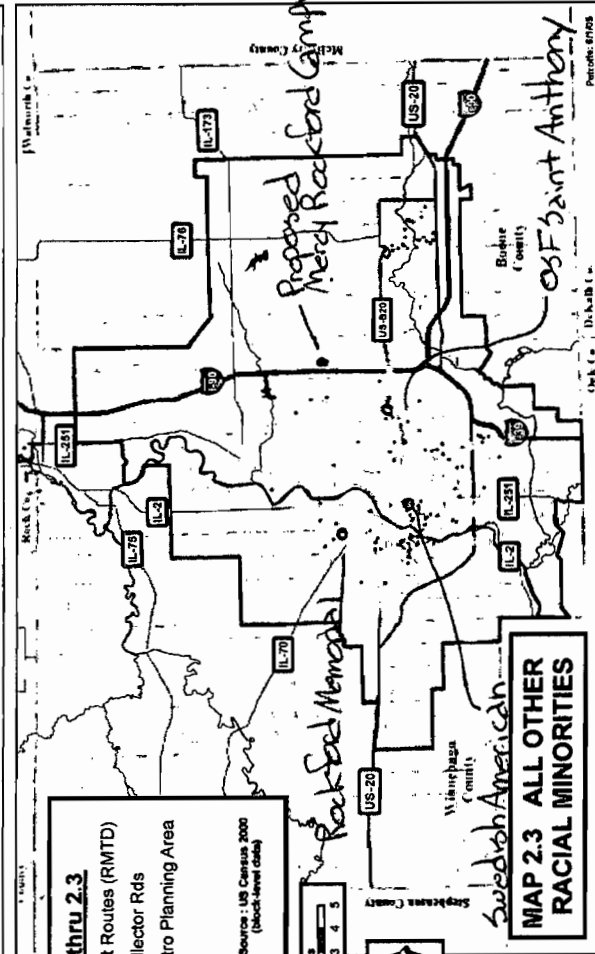
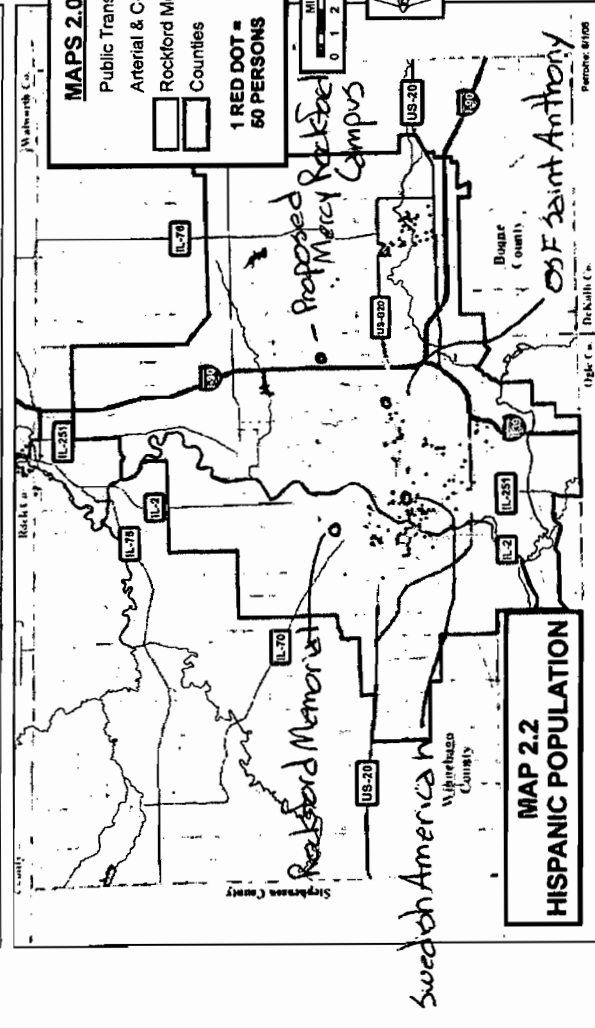
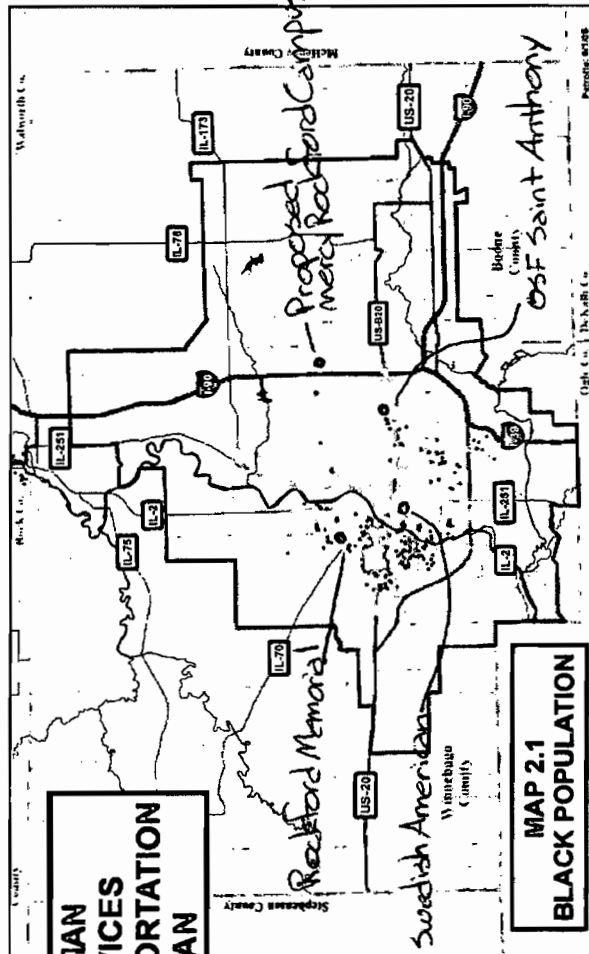
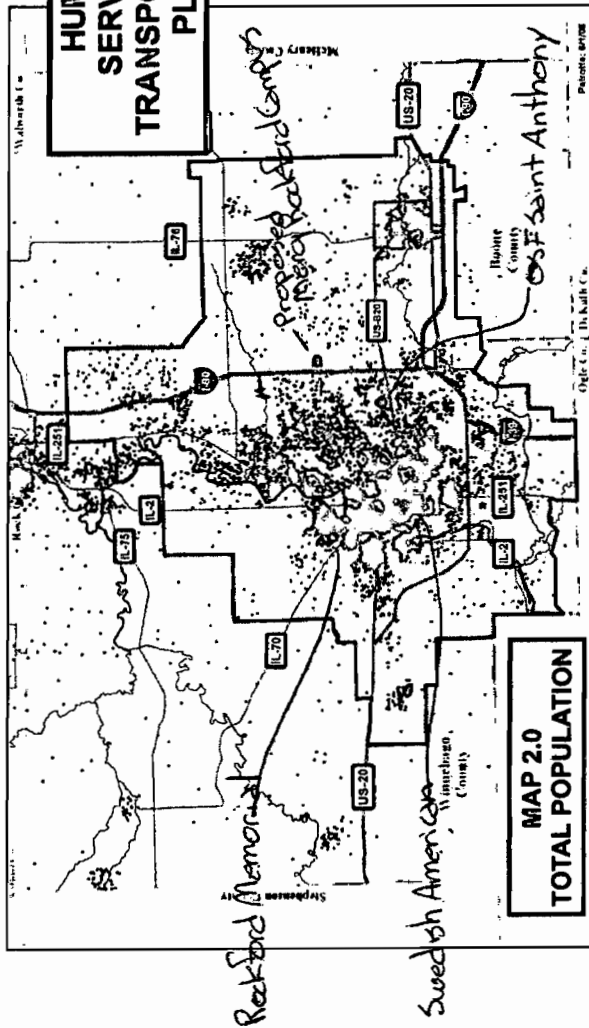

My View: West side needs to keep a healthy hospital system

I live close to MercyRockford Health Systems, located in Winnebago County District 13 that I represent as a Winnebago County Board member. I have listened to the pros and cons of the "One Hospital. Two Campuses." proposal.

The proposal sounded encouraging to me until I questioned what might happen to the Rockton Avenue campus 10 years from now. I know that no one can predict the future. The hype of the merger and the expansion project, as well as the specialty functions of each campus, look and sound promising.

When the dust settles in a few years, the new MRHS may have to merge departments or cut services because of the growing competition of three health care systems located within the same radius and all of the new private clinics and services that are growing in popularity in the same radius. Will the Rockton Avenue campus be part of the dust?

As I pondered this topic, I visualized Winnebago County. The city of Rockford's population is approximately half of the entire county's population and is located on the far-east side of the county, landlocked by Boone County. Looking at the vast area served by MRHS Rockton Avenue Campus, I realized it's the most stable, viable employer and industry on the west side of the Rock River, from the Wisconsin state line on the north to Ogle County on the south to Stephenson County on the western boundary of Winnebago County. MRHS is a pillar of the community that employs people living not only in Winnebago County but also in our surrounding counties.

We talk about economic growth and the jobs it will bring. It's a good thing, if it brings new, additional jobs. Too many times, the new jobs are the ones that are moved from one area to another. Over the years, we have seen many industries become obsolete and buildings become vacant, leaving neighborhoods to suffer blight.

A good example of this is the Amerock building at 4000 Auburn St. It was a thriving industry that employed people from all over the county. Closing it added blight to a once-thriving blue collar neighborhood. When the pillar of a neighborhood begins to slowly leave an area, so do the residents. The question is how many jobs will be sacrificed to produce new jobs?

I am aware that MRHS already owns the land where it will build a new campus. Too bad the new campus won't be built on vacant land west of the Rock River. I just feel that the location is not beneficial to the residents of Rockford and unincorporated Winnebago County. They are the forgotten regional people on the west side of the Rock River from the Wisconsin/Illinois state line to Ogle County. They, too, need economic growth to survive.

I would like to remind the two leaders, Chairman Scott Christiansen and Mayor Larry Morrissey that MRHS has ensured them that the Rockton Avenue campus will remain open to offer medical services. In the near future our elected officials will be coming up for re-elections. If a new administration is elected, will the handshake that MRHS gives our current administrators be valid? The question is, how long is their commitment for and is it in writing?

Trauma expert, west side residents speak out against new MercyRockford campus plan

ROCKFORD — West side residents expressed their disapproval Wednesday night of a MercyRockford proposal that would move trauma services out of their neighborhood.

Ald. Venita Hervey, D-5, who represents residents on Rockford's southwest side, enlisted the help of Dr. Gary Merlotti, chairman of the Surgery Residency program at Mount Sinai Hospital in Chicago. Merlotti addressed a group of about 70 people on the importance of access to trauma care at Klehm Arboretum on the city's southwest side.

MercyRockford is seeking approval from the Illinois Health Facilities and Services Review Board to build a new \$400 million campus at East Riverside Boulevard and Interstate 90. A decision is expected Nov. 17. The new campus would be home to its Level 1 trauma center, currently located at Rockford Memorial Hospital on the city's west side.

Hervey is opposed to the plan because she doesn't want the trauma center to leave the west side, where residents would potentially have to travel an additional 15 to 20 minutes to receive care at the new campus. She believes MercyRockford could rebuild on Rockford Memorial's current site or construct a new facility farther west, where there's more land.

"There's huge, open areas of land on the west side of Rockford that would serve their purposes just as well," Hervey said. "I don't think they need to abandon the entire campus."

Merlotti, an advocate for greater access to trauma care, said there's no conclusive data that supports a potential "breaking point," or time at which a lack of access to specialized, Level 1 support would prove deadly for a patient. Even so, he said trauma care is all about "getting the right person to the right place at the right time," and that west side residents would be put at a disadvantage should Rockford Memorial lose its Level 1 trauma designation.

"It makes logical sense," he said. "If you're shot and bleeding to death, and you have to drive 20 minutes to get to a trauma center, your chances of surviving are not going to be as good as if you went two minutes to a trauma center."

There are two Level 1 trauma centers in the nine-county region, which has 14 hospitals. OSF Saint Anthony Medical Center has the other, which also is on Rockford's east side. At a Level 1 center a specialized trauma surgeon must be at the hospital at all times.

MercyRockford has stressed that it will continue to operate a comprehensive emergency department at Rockford Memorial Hospital, and can treat the same conditions at both Rockford Memorial and the proposed east-side campus. That includes gunshot wounds, traffic crash injuries, stroke and illness, according to MercyRockford.

"The vast majority of patients can be managed in the emergency department and/or admitted to the hospital," said Dennis Uehara, chairman of the department of emergency medicine for Rockford Memorial.

One in 500 patients require the level of care that necessitates a Level 1 trauma center, said MercyRockford CEO Javon Bea. In those cases, a patient would be stabilized at Rockford Memorial and transferred to a Level 1 trauma center. A stabilization period is needed because a person often can't be operated on immediately after trauma, Bea said, meaning patients aren't losing critical time for care by being transferred after treatment at a different hospital.

"The most important thing is who's going to be treating the patient when they are first seen. For this emergency department (at Rockford Memorial) it's our current group of board-certified emergency physicians," Uehara said. "It's a group that's very, very experienced and very well trained."

But Merlotti said even if Rockford Memorial were to retain emergency room services, seriously injured patients would be better off driving farther away for better care.

"ER services are great for 15 minutes," he said, "Then you better have a surgeon."

About 30 percent of the trauma cases at Rockford Memorial Hospital are transferred from other hospitals in the region, according to MercyRockford. The initial hospital is responsible for assessing and stabilizing the patients, and then works to transport the patient for specialized or critical care if a trauma surgeon is needed. Rockford Memorial would use the same protocols as the other 12 hospitals in the region without Level 1 trauma centers at its emergency department.

MercyRockford executives said they wanted to be a part of Hervey's forum on Wednesday, but they were not allowed to participate. Bea said most of the community has been supportive despite Hervey's opposition.

"I respect Venita Hervey; she's just totally inaccurate in her information and data," he said. But many of the residents who attended Hervey's forum expressed support for Merlotti during his presentation and peppered him with questions during the following discussion.

Retired social worker Virginia Ware said she feels as though residents on the west side, who are most in need of care, make up a population that "doesn't have their own voice." The area on the less-developed side of town seems to be "just a housing development," she said.

"It seems to be kind of a business thing," Ware said.

Denise Pearson said she's "actually kind of torn," about the MercyRockford proposal.

"I'm of course in favor of economic growth and development," said Pearson, a former Rockford Health System certified medical assistant. "But not at the expense of lives."

Pearson said "the dollar is the bottom line," and that it might be in MercyRockford's best interest to go ahead with the new hospital, but hold off on moving the trauma center.

But Hervey remains committed to making sure MercyRockford's new facility does not become a reality.

"You don't get to come into Rockford and upset our balanced health care network for your own personal gain," Hervey said. "Don't come and threaten my community if we don't give you what you want, and agree to separate and unequal — that you'll close the hospital. I'll fight that tooth and nail."

Chicago doctor weighs in on MercyRockford's proposed split to two campuses

A debate to split MercyRockford Health System into two medical campuses heats up. One alderman against the move hosted an event about it. There were almost no empty seats; about a hundred people filled Klehm Arboretum to hear from a Chicago doctor who specializes in trauma on his take of the move.

Dr. Gary Merlotti works at Mount Sinai Hospital. He oversees trauma and critical care for the University of Illinois College of Medicine program. He came to Rockford to talk about the need for level one trauma care. He says that service should locate where the need for it is greatest. Trauma care is one service that would move from Rockford Memorial Hospital to the new MercyRockford I-90/Riverside campus.

He told the audience that level of care matters if you are having a stroke, heart attack or have been in an accident.

Alderman Venita Hervey says that is one reason she is against MercyRockford splitting services between two areas.

"I think that the strongest thing that he pointed out is that there were two factors. One, you are moving the trauma center away from the highest area of trauma. And number two, time matters.

You know we are hearing from Mercy Rockford that they can administer medicine in the field and stabilize patients and it won't have any impact and every medical person that I have spoken to, outside of Mercy Rockford has simply said that is not that case."

MercyRockford says even though the trauma center and other services will move to their new east campus patient care will not suffer. An emergency department will still remain at RMH. The state has to still approve MercyRockford building a second campus.

Some families on Rockford's west side rally together hoping their voices and signatures can save the place that saves people's lives one alderman is leading the charge.

"It's not a good idea," Gary Merlotti, who is one of the doctors responsible for building Chicago's trauma network said.

"We have people dying all the time who shouldn't die and it's because no one wants to step up and do anything."

Tonight Dr. Merlotti spoke to a concerned crowd of just over 100 west side residents. They're worried about the proposed move of Rockford Memorial's level one trauma center from its current Rockton Ave campus to a more spacious setting on Rockford's east side. Many mothers and fathers will have to travel over ten miles to get to MercyRockford's new \$400 million facility; a facility that will be just steps away from other trauma centers.

"Trauma is like any other highly surgical area, if you don't do a lot of it you won't do it well," Dr. Merlotti said. "Having too many trauma centers means the experience is deluded and the outcomes are worse because of it."

"You really have to peel back the layers of the onion to see the services (being taken away)," Alderman Venita Hervey said.

Hervey says it's not just the trauma center that people in the neighborhoods she represents wants to see stay, "Many people who are of lower income and not as high of an education are often left out of these discussions."

Hervey is going to provide the resources to make sure every family has a dog in the fight. The Illinois Department of Public Health will have to approve the trauma center's move. Hervey will have a letter writing day on Saturday, October 24 at the library downtown.

Other services would remain at Rockford Memorial Hospital.

"Many of my ward residents are questioning what MercyRockford is saying about its plans to move the Level 1 Trauma Center out of the west side and into the east side, which already has a Level 1 Trauma Center," Hervey said in a news release. "I want to help answer their questions and clarify misconceptions about the importance of keeping Level 1 Trauma on the west side."

Hervey invited Dr. Gary Merlotti, chairman of the Department of Surgery Residency Program at Mount Sinai Hospital in Chicago, to present information on Level 1 trauma centers.

My View: MercyRockford's proposal is wrong for the Rockford region

I am firmly opposed to MercyRockford's proposal to build a hospital at Riverside and I-90. The plans are being billed as the largest construction project in Rockford history, bringing with it the promise of jobs, "medical tourism," major money and every imaginable benefit.

On the surface, the project sounds like a great deal for Rockford. Marketed as “One Hospital, Two Campuses,” the new hospital, physicians’ offices, and hotel will, according to MercyRockford leaders, infuse the system with \$25 million in new patients from Wisconsin. These new patients are supposed to provide MercyRockford with the financial resources to continue to operate Rockford Memorial. A closer look reveals a plan that will strip vital medical services from Rockford’s west side, and the entire western region of Winnebago County, and create a significant disruption to Rockford’s well-balanced health care network.

If MercyRockford obtains its Certificates of Need from the Illinois Health Facilities and Services Review Board, it will transfer Rockford Memorial’s Level I Trauma Center, cardiac cath lab, about two-thirds of the inpatient hospital beds, all but four intensive care beds, and all pediatric and obstetrics services to the new hospital. At the same time, 45 percent of the current emergency room beds will be eliminated.

The transfer of Rockford Memorial’s Level I Trauma Center to Riverside will leave the entire western region of Winnebago County bare. That’s an untenable and unjustified duplication of trauma services that creates a shortage of services on the west side while replicating services already available on the east side. Adding insult to injury, Rockford Memorial’s downsized ER will be ill-equipped to handle the same regional volume of traumatic injuries and heart attack, stroke and aneurysm patients. The patients will be there but the services will be a minimum of 20 minutes away. That increased transport time will result in poorer medical outcomes and preventable deaths. During a trauma, time matters. Period.

Rockford is fortunate to have three hospitals and two trauma centers that are perfectly balanced to serve the west, center and east areas of the city and Winnebago County. MercyRockford’s proposal to build a new hospital at Riverside and I-90 upsets that balance at the expense of Rockford’s health care network and its citizens.

Plus, I fail to see how MercyRockford will convince Wisconsin, Chicago, west-suburban or even Rockford residents to spurn proven, high-quality health care they already have near their homes. My major objection to the new hospital is the fiction based on the “One Hospital, Two Campuses” marketing campaign. My analysis reveals something more akin to “separate and unequal.”

I’ve heard MercyRockford threaten to close Rockford Memorial if its plans aren’t approved. I firmly believe MercyRockford will close Rockford Memorial regardless of whether the new hospital is approved. The simple fact is Rockford has struggled for years to support three hospitals and certainly cannot support four when outpatient procedures are the norm for surgeries that used to require inpatient stays. Three are tenable, four is a pipe dream.

If MercyRockford’s plans are approved, Rockford Memorial probably would remain until the new facility is open and maybe for a short while thereafter. But it won’t last. And, even if Rockford Memorial is maintained, does anyone really believe it will have the same level and quality of care provided at the new east side hospital?

It has been disappointing to see how MercyRockford has been trying to convince people in Rockford that this is good for Rockford’s west side. It is not. It will dramatically upset the balance of emergency and trauma services in Rockford. And, it will create a “health care desert” for 58,000 residents — nearly 40 percent of Rockford’s population — who live on Rockford’s west side.

In short, the investment is the right idea, but the wrong place. It needs to be on Rockford's west side.

West Side Families Upset with RMH Move

A health debate cuts much deeper than patient care at a public discussion between some local law makers, families and area hospitals. The Q&A portion of tonight's public hearing became a tale of two cities: East side vs. West side, when an irritated Alderman Venita Hervey, for all intents and purposes, told a Senior Vice President for Rockford Health Systems that he was lying to the faces of the more than 20 in the tense room.

Senior VP Dan Parod defended himself and Rockford Health Systems saying the plan to move Rockford Memorial Hospital's West side level-one trauma center to the new \$400 million medical campus near i-90 and Riverside, is all about upgrading its services and will in fact benefit people on the West side in the long term. Parod said the 60 year-old North Rockton Ave facilities are not meeting standards since the Americans with Disabilities Act was created 25 years ago. According to him, it's also losing an average of \$10 million a year in day-to-day care.

Some opponents say this is just another case of the rich east-side getting richer.

"Make two hospitals," West side mom Dione Baldwin said. "They don't have to be the same but they should be pretty close in terms of equity and what they serve. I honestly would have a hard time staying with your facility as far as my child care and my insurance if you continue with this."

"Rebuild this three-story on Rockton to something similar to the fifteen-story that they have up there in Madison I've watched them build," Carlos, another opponent, said.

Parod says the new campus is expected to bring in an additional \$25 million from patients coming from Wisconsin cities like Janesville. A speaker for OSF St. Anthony says the move will dangerously overload OSF and SwedishAmerican.

ROCKFORD (WIFR) – The excitement over a new MercyRockford Hospital campus near Riverside and I-90 has fizzled for some.

Some homeowners on Rockford's west side believe if Rockford Memorial Hospital's level one trauma center moves to the east side, it could be a matter of life or death.

Dozens addressed those concerns during a packed hearing held by the Illinois Health Facilities and Services Review Board. MercyRockford Health System CEO Javon Bea started the public comment section by assuring the board the \$400 million project will not leave people on Rockford's west side without service.

Bea says the Rockton Avenue location will still have a comprehensive emergency department, surgical services, and a cancer care center. The catheterization lab, where heart attack patients are treated, will be on the new campus. Bea says it takes 30 minutes to prepare the lab and if a heart attack patient is at RMH they'll be to the lab in 10 to 12 minutes. However, other health professionals say the move will leave the west side without services, while creating a duplication of services on the east side.

"\$400 million dollar construction project on the west side would be a huge economic boom for an area that is in so much need of that kind of rejuvenation in their community," says Paula Carynski, President of OSF Saint Anthony Hospital.

“Of all of the conditions treated on an emergency basis, they can be treated the same between the two facilities. Because the patients need to be stabilized and taken care of. For the few people that may need trauma surgery, they stabilize them. Sometimes they stabilize them for hours and our cardiothoracic surgeons have told me that sometimes they stabilize them for a day or two to make sure that all of their systems are stable before they do major surgery,” says Javon Bea, CEO of MercyHealth Rockford.

Both SwedishAmerican and OSF Saint Anthony spoke in opposition, but the board also heard from people who have used RMH’s services, some who again, were for the project and others against it, who say the change is a matter of life and death.

“My name is Michaela Ambrose. I’m 17 and I got osteosarcoma in my knee.”

Born and raised in Rockford, Michaela fought her cancer in Chicago. Her parents say it was the best option for her survival.

Michaela’s dad, Steve Ambrose is one of dozens who spoke to the crowd, explaining to a state board, MercyRockford’s plan to build a new campus, including a children’s hospital at I-90 and East Riverside will save other families, the emotional and financial stress his family endured.

“They don’t have to fight that fight of what to do with their family, what to do with their jobs, finding lodging. We met several families there that upset their entire livelihood and family to go spend this time with their children,” said Ambrose.

Anthony Grier’s 18-year-old daughter Tavia also had a health scare and was saved by the doctors and nurses at RMH. At just three months old, Tavia was airlifted to RMH, suffering from whooping cough.

“If it wasn’t for where it was positioned, she probably would have died because that was the first place we knew of,” said Grier.

Alderman Venita Hervey was born and raised on Rockford’s west side and requested the public meeting. She says not only does moving the level one trauma center leave West Side families without essential services; it would also put a bigger burden on Rockford’s fire department.

“We will have to build an additional fire station and staff it and add two or three ambulances to cover, to make up for the fact that our ambulances are going to be traveling out to the area of Sportscore 2. It’s going to take them longer to get over to west, central, and even east Rockford.

Mercy Rockford says it’s not taking any critical or life-saving services away from the west side. Part of the project also includes upgrades to the Rockton Avenue campus. MercyRockford’s CEO also said doctors will rotate between the two campuses, so patients will receive the same level of care at each facility.

The Illinois Health and Facilities Board will make a decision on November 17th. If approved, construction would start in late 2016.

You may recall, MercyRockford Health Systems wants to spend \$400 million to build a second campus at I-90 and East Riverside. Those buildings will house a state of the art Women's and Children's hospital, level 1 trauma center, plus 188 hospital in-patient units and private rooms.

The downtown campus will continue to provide primary and secondary care, plus the cancer center.

Fact Sheet

Q: What is the definition of a Level I Trauma Center?

A: A Level I Trauma Center provides immediate, comprehensive care for every kind of injury – from prevention through rehabilitation. The Illinois Department of Public Health (IDPH) defines a Level I Trauma Center as a hospital participating in an approved EMS system and designated by IDPH to provide the best care to trauma patients and to provide all essential service in-house, 24 hours per day, including:

- 24-hour in-house staffing by Trauma Surgeon(s), Emergency Medicine Physician(s) and Anesthesiologist(s)
- Prompt availability of care in:
 - Orthopedic surgery
 - Neurosurgery
 - Cardiovascular surgery
 - Critical care
 - Radiology
 - Internal medicine
 - Pediatric
 - Plastic surgery
 - Oral and maxillofacial (jaws and face)
- Resources to treat patients referred by non-Level I Trauma hospitals throughout Northern Illinois or who come directly from nearby communities, such as Winnebago, Seward and Pecatonica.



If you are hurt in a car accident, suffer a gunshot wound, or fall from a ladder on the West Side, you will be rushed to the nearest Level I Trauma Center and the most severe cases will be immediately seen and evaluated by a trauma surgeon. Currently, that Level I Trauma Center is Rockford Memorial Hospital (RMH). If RMH moves its Level I Trauma Center to the East Side, patients with those life-threatening injuries would have to travel up to 25 more minutes to MercyRockford's proposed hospital and Level I Trauma Center.

Q: What is the difference between Level I and Level II Trauma Centers?

A: Level II Trauma Centers are not required to have any trauma specialists in-house on a 24-hour basis, except for the emergency room physician. And, the required response times by these specialists are longer. MercyRockford's proposed West Side "Comprehensive Emergency Department" would have no trauma requirements and less trauma readiness than a Level II Trauma Center. "Comprehensive EDs" do not have specific requirements that specialists be available at the facility or have required response times.

Q: Why do hospitals put cardiac and Level I facilities together?

A: Level I Trauma requires that a Cardiovascular Surgeon be available within 30 minutes (60 minutes for Level II) for trauma-related cases. Because a Cardiovascular Surgeon is necessary for trauma and heart surgery, hospitals typically bring the cardiac and trauma services under the same roof. Emergency rooms, comprehensive or otherwise, are not required to have access to cardiovascular surgeons. Under the proposed plan, MercyRockford will move the cardiac cath lab to the new East Side hospital and Rockford Memorial will not have a cardiovascular surgeon in its emergency room.

Q: How important is time in trauma cases?

A: Every minute matters. In the first half of life, more Americans die from violence and injuries – such as car crashes, falls or homicides – than from any other cause, including cancer, HIV or the flu, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

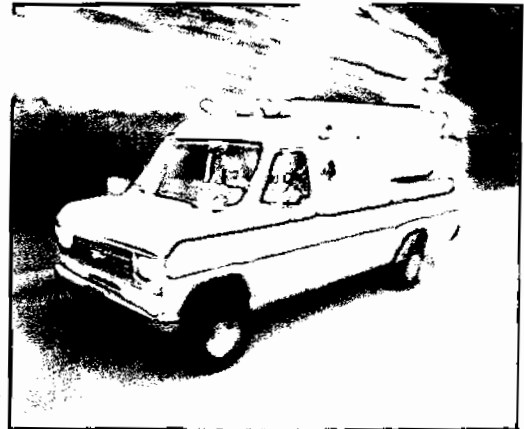
If a person has a life-threatening injury and lives far away from a Trauma Center, it will take that person more time to get to the Trauma Center. The longer it takes to get to the Trauma Center the more likely it is that the person will die. Shorter transport times are associated with improved survival, according to a 2015 IDPH Trauma Feasibility Study.

Q: Where are the trauma centers in Rockford?

A: Right now, the City of Rockford has two Level I Trauma Centers: one on each side of the Rock River. This gives good trauma care to both the West Side and the East Side.

The two Level I Trauma Centers in Rockford are at Rockford Memorial Hospital and OSF Saint Anthony Medical Center. There is one Level II Trauma Center at Swedish American Health System in Rockford and one at Mercy Medical Center in Dubuque, Iowa.

If MercyRockford moves the Level I Trauma Center from Rockford Memorial to the far East Side, it will put two Level I Trauma Centers within four miles of each other on the East Side, while leaving the entire West Side of Rockford and Winnebago County with no Level I Trauma Center.



We need to be sure there is Level I Trauma care on both sides of town.

An Open Letter to Our Community



There has been much news and discussion recently about our community's healthcare. There have been public forums and private meetings about the need, access, location and future of significant healthcare services. It's important and it's complicated. There are pros and cons. And quite frankly there are many unknowns regarding the future impact of the Mercy/Rockford \$485 million proposed project on the community and on SwedishAmerican.

At the recent SwedishAmerican annual Board retreat, there was thoughtful discussion about the proposal and its potential impact. We decided our official position with respect to the Certificate of Need process was to remain neutral with concerns. Those concerns were expressed at the September 17 public hearing conducted by the Illinois Health Facilities and Services Review Board and centered around the concept that healthcare service to the west side of our community may be diminished as a result of this project. That being said, much more time was spent by our Board at its retreat ensuring that SwedishAmerican was focused on its mission:

"Through excellence in healthcare and compassionate service, we care for our community."

This mission was adopted by the Board over a decade ago and has remained the foundation for a strategy we have executed around quality care, service excellence, physician leadership, engaged associates, real partnerships, greater access, regional destination and transformational investment in our flagship campus in downtown Rockford.

That investment totals more than \$340 million since 2001 in new and renovated facilities and technology that have included a Level II Trauma and emergency department, outpatient services, and the Heart Hospital. In addition, two major medical office buildings have been developed which have remained on the tax rolls and helped fund the rerouting of Charles Street and permitted the creative expansion of a 30-acre footprint in the heart of the city.

The SwedishAmerican Foundation has invested an additional \$6 million in a unique neighborhood redevelopment project restoring owner-occupied homes in an 81-block area circling the hospital. We have worked with numerous groups, including Habitat for Humanity, to construct single family homes in our neighborhood. The Foundation has also made matching grants to existing homeowners and has provided down payment financial support to our employees who wish to purchase a home within this neighborhood. In total, nearly 200 home sites have been impacted through the leadership of our Foundation.

At the same time, we have further established ourselves and reinforced this community's presence as a regional destination for healthcare. We regularly serve patients from a 12-county area in northern Illinois and southern Wisconsin and in doing so have become the overall market share and preference leader in the region.

As a division of UW Health, we now have strengthened and expanded nationally recognized academic level healthcare into this local market with more than 50 UW Health specialists and subspecialists having medical staff privileges and seeing patients at SwedishAmerican Hospital. These physicians range from cancer and surgical specialists to advanced pediatric subspecialists. Our system's commitment to our community and region is to increase the numbers of physicians here and complement our medical community in areas that have been underserved. The SwedishAmerican Regional Cancer Center is but one example as more patients than ever forecasted are now receiving treatment here locally rather than travelling out of the community.

We remain committed to strong partnerships. We have a significant and more than 40-year role and relationship with Crusader Community Health, one of the area's key healthcare providers. We provide sole support to the University of Illinois College of Medicine in Rockford for the Family Medicine Residency Program. We have worked closely and contractually with Rosecrance to address crucial behavioral health needs in our community, and we have forged strong ties working together with and providing resources and donations to hundreds of local agencies and not-for-profits. We actively assist and support our partner schools of Lincoln and East as part of our Alignment Rockford commitment. We meet community need as the largest Medicaid provider in our region based on number of patients served, and, in addition, contribute more than \$69 million annually in uncompensated and charity care.

No matter the final state regulatory action regarding the Mercy/Rockford project, our message is we are here today. And we will be here tomorrow and into the future. We are looking at ways to further our campus development, understanding we may be called upon to care for additional patients from all neighborhoods and communities. This is our mission. This is our pledge.

I am Wm. E. Kobler, MD, a family physician who has served the community since coming to Rockford in 1974. I trained at all three hospitals and have concentrated my practice on the east side at OSF, but understand well the demographics of access to care in Rockford. Nearing retirement, I have no personal conflict of interest, and I am very concerned about MercyRockford's proposed new hospital on the east side of Rockford.

I write this letter to you because MercyRockford's plan to open a new hospital on Rockford's east side will decrease access to care for a large portion of the population on the west side of the city. I fear in the long term that access to care for this population will ultimately disappear and leave many Rockfordians without convenient access to medical care. The new facility essentially creates a fourth Rockford hospital and I do not see that one system having two hospitals, with the accompanying duplication of services, will ultimately be a financially sustainable model.

There is no reason to have a new Level I Trauma Center within about 6 miles of a currently existing center serving the same population. While the current Level 1 Trauma Center at MercyRockford is also about 6 miles away, it is positioned to service an entirely different population that would lose immediate access if it were relocated.

Beyond access to trauma care, this change would negatively affect access to all types of medical care. I believe removing a Level I Trauma center from the west side of Rockford violates this sacred tenant of medicine and should not be approved.

According to the 2014 Most Dangerous Neighborhoods study compiled by NeighborhoodScout, Rockford holds two of the most violent areas in the nation. These areas are within just a few miles of Mercy Rockford Memorial and their access to life saving treatment. To remove the Level 1 Trauma center further away means more harm and less benefit to those patients needing life-saving care after a traumatic injury. Not all of these injuries are received by perpetrators of violence. These could be innocent passersby or the men and women of law enforcement who are sworn to keep the peace in these hostile areas.

While I am a proud OSF employee, it is as the wife of a Police Officer assigned to these violent neighborhoods that I am writing you today. Many times I have had to hang up with my husband because he must respond to a shots fired call. My only comforts in these times are my faith and that he is close to Mercy RMH and their Level 1 Trauma services.

I also write to you as a mother who has three times needed to call 9-1-1 and have my children rushed to Mercy RMH via ambulance. I choose Mercy RMH not only because they have pediatric intensive care services, but also because I live in one of the many rural communities on the west side of Winnebago County and Mercy is our closest hospital.

To take these vital services out of their current location would be turning our backs on those who need us the most, and for the worst of all reasons – financial benefit.

I urge you to reconsider this action and invest in the restoration of Rockford's west side. This isn't just a decision of dollars and cents, it is a decision of potential life and death.

My third concern is that MercyRockford wants to be "more convenient" and a "destination center." To accomplish this, they believe they must move some of the services it currently

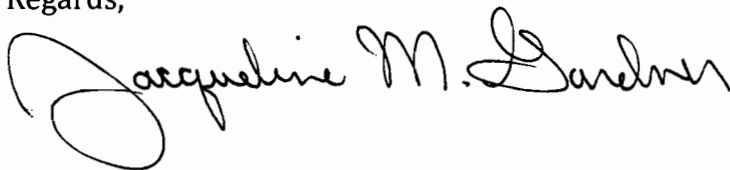

While those changes may sound beneficial to residents at first blush, the money to finance them has to come from somewhere and taxpayers know where that somewhere will be.

The East Side already has a hospital that has been serving the area for more than 100 years, OSF Saint Anthony. Along with SwedishAmerican, which serves central Rockford, OSF Saint Anthony and Rockford Memorial have been part of a perfect balance healthcare distribution in the area.

I ask that the Board maintain that balance and vote against MercyRockford's proposal.
