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I worked for 13 years at St. Mary Hospital in Quincy before it was purchased by Blessing Hospital in 1993. I saw first hand the duplication of services. From CT scanning equipment to surgery suites. I was the nurse manager of the Emergency Department at St. Mary Hospital and the constant competition for providers to bring their patients to a designated hospital was enormous, except for the Medicaid population and particularly the psychiatric population. Blessing stood up and took on these two categories of socially disadvantaged populations and has never waivered to provide the needed care. Blessing also absorbed all the staff of St. Mary without laying them off and incorporated them equitably into their wage and salary program and dates of service for retention recognition. In addition, I was instrumental in working with physician call schedules and trying to have physician providers available for two hospitals for large trauma's and specialty call was difficult. Often times both facilities calling the same providers. While that may have changed over the years with the advent of hospitalists I do still see the possibility of physicians not being at the right facility at the right time. This new hospital is planned to be even further away then the previous St. Mary hospital. This new hospital will set our county healthcare back in time to the 1980's where duplication of services was the norm. Our population in Adams County has not grown, and the number of services that need an in-patient bed has declined.

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I am writing in opposition of Quincy Medical Group Hospital. The middle of a pandemic is not the time to disrupt an already fragile healthcare system in this region or to put additional strain on the healthcare safety net.

Twenty one percent of rural hospitals are at risk of closing. Opening an additional hospital, during this time, is an unnecessary gamble in a region that does not have a demonstrable need for additional hospital beds. Our community is already over bedded by at least 75 beds. A small-format hospital, would not increase choice or quality of care, instead it would strain an already limited talented pool and resources, diminishing our ability to receive consistent, high quality care.

Blessing Health System has been a strong leader in our community and was on the frontlines in battle against the COVID-19 pandemic. Blessing has worked tirelessly over the past 11 months to keep all of our communities safe and healthy. Because of their deep connections to the community and relying on their first in class experts, Blessing acted quickly and smartly. They renovated their facility to create 87 rooms with the ability to care for up to 130 patients requiring negative pressure isolation, they also set up a hotline staffed by registered nurses who help callers with questions about COVID-19, including discussing any symptoms they might be experiencing and they also stood up a drive-thru facility for COVID-19 testing.

I do not believe our region has the demand to support an additional hospital. As Manager of Data Analytics for Crossriver Quality Health Partners, a Clinically Integrated Network in which Blessing is the founding member, our overall mission is to improve the health of the community. CQHP is moving the CIN's participating providers away from a fee for service mindset to one of value. Focusing on caring for the patient while they are well to prevent Emergency room visits as well as inpatient and observation admits. Numerous population health and wellness strategies are in the works as well as bringing technology into the home to care for patients in a less expensive setting. With the county moving away from a fee for service strategy to a strategy centered on value the entire country will continue to see a reduction in hospital visits, this will not be isolated to our community. I do believe this is the correct investment of funds to benefit our community. There are many other programs focused on health, wellness and social inequalities that would be a greater benefit for our region.
