Dear Ms. Avery,

I am writing in opposition of the proposed Quincy Medical Group Hospital. While I believe the Quincy Medical Group is a good provider in our area, I don't believe the expanded community, which is already serviced by the Blessing Health System, demands a second hospital in the area. I fear that the introduction of a second hospital will weaken the hospital services provided in the area. Even if some believe it could be beneficial, I would contend that taking that risk in the middle of a pandemic is not the time to disrupt the health care system in this region or put additional strain on our healthcare safety net.

I am a superintendent of a public school district in Northeast Missouri. Most of my community is serviced by the Blessing Health System. In fact, our school district partners with Blessing to provide our employees with a unique and complete Wellness Program that is designed to manage health care costs and improve the health of our employees. I know how difficult it can be for our rural school to find quality employees and teachers. Throughout our partnership with Blessing, I have witnessed their struggle to employ quality nurse and doctor candidates also. Adding a second hospital would only cause the impacts of such a shortage to be magnified. Again, with the COVID-19 pandemic still a threat, it would be horrible timing to consider such expansion.

I know that the Blessing Health System has been a leader in the community and has been on the frontlines in the battle against the COVID-19 pandemic. Blessing responded quickly to the pandemic by renovating their facility to handle the demands associated with COVID-19. They were able to create 87 rooms with the ability to care for up to 130 patients who needed negative pressure isolation. They formed hotline numbers staffed by their registered nurses to provide information, advice, and direction to community members who called with questions about COVID-19. They were also able to create a drive-through testing site in their parking lot to service the surrounding community during the pandemic.

It is my understanding that proposed expansion in project #20-044 by the Quincy Medical Group is to create a fairly small facility with limited ability to serve the community. The sickest and most vulnerable patients will still need Blessing to receive the services they need, as QMG will not be equipped to treat those patients. Quincy is not a large metropolitan area that can sustain a secondary hospital as proposed.

For these reasons, I strongly encourage you to oppose the Quincy Medical Group Hospital, project #20-044.

I am writing in opposition of Quincy Medical Group Hospital. The middle of a pandemic is not the time to disrupt an already fragile healthcare system in this region or to put additional strain on the healthcare safety net.

I am concerned that a second, unnecessary hospital will have an adverse impact on the over 17,000 people in Adams County who rely on Medicaid for their healthcare. Blessing serves everyone, regardless of their income and ability to pay. They don't turn anyone away, they never have and never will. The second hospital does not guarantee that those in need will receive care.

We have very precious resources in this area from nurses, radiology staff and machines, respiratory therapists, pharmacists, and so many other specialized professionals that are so very hard to come by. Adding this second hospital makes these resources even more scarce than they already are. Are we going to support duplicate therapy services, physicians, dietitians and so many others. How much work will be there for them? What about the technical aspects of maintenance, biomed specially trained staff, all the quality control and infection control experts? This seems quite impractical for a 28 bed facility in my opinion. I remember in two local cities-Hannibal and Quincy when the need to consolidate to one hospital occurred, although painful, so much good came out of it so why seek to divide the health care in our area again? I know there is downright animosity between the two entities (QMG and Blessing) that has been there for years and it seems we are going to support it in some respects if this is approved. As employees we also are divided having to go out of network at times and this may cause us to pay for out of network hospital and diagnostic services if our provider does not respect our wishes. With our large employee group, this seems out of reach and unnecessary for so many employees. Lastly I am concerned about the welfare of the patients who are served there with so little support, for example, what if my provider performed my colonoscopy there and I needed resuscitation unexpectedly, I would have to wait to be treated as a community arrest and that survival rate is very low? More complex patients at Blessing cannot go back and forth for fragmented care which again is quite impractical for those we serve. Through all these negotiations, other than cost, I have not been convinced there is any real benefit to our professionals or the patients we serve, it only points out the lack of community cohesiveness to promoting the health and well being of our community. Look how so many agencies came together to deal with the COVID pandemic, we need more of this collaboration. I may be ranting but I have lived and worked in this community, was educated here and love this community in my 40 years of nursing, working at both St. Mary's Hospital and Blessing and know the times are only good when we all come together for the best for all.

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Based on a personal experience with QMG they are not willing to go above and beyond for their patients. When my husband needed his Humira injections weekly instead of bi-weekly his insurance would not cover it. The only attempt that the QMG physician's office made to get them approved was to fax his medical records and the insurance denied the injections based on the medical records. We asked the doctor's office to call his insurance company to talk to them and they refused to call the insurance or put forth any extra effort in getting them approved. They lack empathy for their patients. On my husband's first visit to Blessing Physician Services the physician told us that he felt confident that they could get the injections approved weekly. Not only did the Blessing physician's office fax the medical records, they faxed a medical necessity letter, the physician called the insurance company, and his office contacted the drug representative for additional documentation to justify the weekly injections. Because the Blessing physician went above and beyond for my husband his insurance company approved his weekly injections. He is getting the medical treatment that he needed. This is the type of care that the Blessing Health System is providing every day by going above and beyond for their patients. QMG had all of these resources available to them too but chose not to go above and beyond for a patient that had been seeing this physician for 25 years. This type of care is not given now at QMG so the community cannot expect to get it from a hospital ran by QMG physicians.
