Twenty one percent of rural hospitals are at risk of closing. Opening an additional hospital, during this time, is an unnecessary gamble in a region that does not have a demonstrable need for additional hospital beds. Our community is already over bedded by at least 75 beds. A second hospital, would not increase choice or quality of care, instead it would strain an already limited talent pool and resources, diminishing our ability to receive consistent, high quality care.

Blessing serves everyone, regardless of their income and ability to pay. They don't turn anyone away, they never have and never will. They combine the latest technology with a personal touch to deliver high quality, patient centered care, close to home, with outside accountability and with a true sense of duty to treat charity and Medicaid patients. The proposed second hospital lacks community governance. This will allow QMG to operate without outside accountability and no true sense of duty to treat charity and Medicaid patients.

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I am concerned that a second, unnecessary hospital will have an adverse impact on the over 17,000 people in Adams County who rely on Medicaid for their healthcare. Blessing serves everyone, regardless of their income and ability to pay. They don't turn anyone away, they never have and never will. The second hospital does not guarantee that those in need will receive care.

Many people already believe the city of Quincy is inundated with medical establishments, and the majority of people I've spoken to see the new hospital as a money grab. I believe a hospital with as few as 28 beds will lead to patients being turned away from urgently needed care due to no room for them at the smaller facility. This would ultimately cause longer wait times, a potential to receive no care at all, and a high potential for those patients to be rerouted to Blessing anyway. To me, this represents a lower standard of care. 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Blessing Health System has been a strong leader in our community and was on the frontlines in battle against the COVID-19 pandemic. Blessing has worked tirelessly over the past 11 months to keep all of our communities safe and healthy. Because of their deep connections to the community and relying on their first in class experts, Blessing acted quickly and smartly. They renovated their facility to create 87 rooms with the ability to care for up to 130 patients requiring negative pressure isolation, they also set up a hotline staffed by registered nurses who help callers with questions about COVID-19, including discussing any symptoms they might be experiencing and they also stood up a drive-thru facility for COVID-19 testing.

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We have already seen a 1% sales tax increase implemented for this TIF district of Quincy, implemented this week by our city council, and I'm not sure whether or not this is just the beginning. While I am not 100% positive this is meant to benefit this small community hospital, it is my opinion that this would not have occurred other-wise. I am concerned that if this skims enough of the profitable hospital services that Blessing Hospital may not have the resources available to provide necessary medical services for the low profit, loss leader services, or to provide necessary community services and education.
