2	MS. SIMMONS: Good afternoon. My name is
3	April Simmons, and I am the general counsel for
4	the Illinois Health Facilities and Services Review
5	Board. This afternoon, we I will also be
6	acting as the hearing officer for today's
7	proceedings. Present with me today and
8	representing the Board are Mike Constantino,
9	George Roate, and Mike Mitchell.
10	On behalf of the State Board, thank you
11	for attending this public hearing for the
12	discontinuation of a 70-bed medical/surgical
13	category of service at Javon Bea Hospital.
14	As per the rules of the Illinois Health
15	Facilities and Services Review Board, I would like
16	to read the previously published legal notice into
17	the record.
18	Notice of public hearing and written
19	comment. Legal notice of public hearing and
20	opportunity for written comment. Notice of an
21	opportunity for public hearing and opportunity for
22	public comment.
23	In accordance with the requirements of the
24	Illinois Health Facilities Planning Act, notice is

1	given of the receipt of an application for
2	exemption to discontinue the 70-bed
3	medical/surgical category of service at Javon Bea
4	Hospital-Rockton, 2500 North Rockton Avenue,
5	Rockford, Illinois. And that's Exemption 056-21.
6	The applicants are Javon Bea Hospital and Mercy
7	Health Corporation.
8	A safety net impact statement and charity
9	care information have been provided as required.
10	Impact letters were sent to the health facilities
11	that maintain a medical/surgical category of
12	service within a geographic service area. There
13	is no cost to this project. The expected
14	completion date is upon State Board approval.
15	This exemption application was called
16	substantially complete on November 29th, 2021.
17	This discontinuation is tentatively scheduled to
18	be heard at the March 15, 2022, State Board
19	meeting. Written public comments on this
20	exemption application will be accepted by the
21	State Board no later than February 23rd, 2022.
22	Information regarding this hearing or any
23	other activity of the Illinois Health Facilities
24	and Services Review Board can be obtained at the

1	State Board's website. And that's
2	www2.illinois.gov/sites/hfsrb. As previously
3	stated, this public hearing is conducted by staff
4	of the Illinois Health Facilities and Services
5	Review Board pursuant to the Illinois Health
6	Facilities Planning Act.
7	The hearing is open to the public and
8	affords an opportunity for parties with interest
9	in the project to present written and/or verbal
10	comment relevant to the project. All allegations
11	or assertions should be relevant to the need for
12	the proposed project and be supported with copies
13	of documentation or materials that are printed or
14	typed on paper.
15	Please note that in order to ensure that
16	the Health Facilities and Services Review Board's
17	public hearings protect the privacy and maintain
18	the confidentiality of an individual's health
19	information, covered entities, as defined by the
20	Health Insurance Portability and Accountability
21	Acts of 1996, such as hospital providers, health
22	plans, and health care clearinghouses submitting

oral or written testimony that disclose protected

health information of individuals shall have a

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1	valid written authorization from that individual.
2	The authorization shall allow the covered entity
3	to share the individual's protected health
4	information at this hearing.
5	I ask that you please limit your testimony
6	to two minutes. Prior to beginning your remarks,
7	please clearly state and spell your first and last
8	name. The applicant shall be afforded an
9	opportunity to provide a summary of the changes
10	requested within Exemption Application E-056-21.
11	Today's proceedings will begin with
12	representatives from Javon Bea Hospital.
13	Mitch okay. Mr. Bea, I believe you are
14	about to be unmuted. Mitch, can you unmute him,
15	please? You are unmuted, sir.
16	MR. BEA: Okay. I'll go ahead and get
17	started. Thank you, Ms. Simmons.
18	Good afternoon. My name is Javon Bea, and
19	I'm the president and CEO of Mercy Health. The
20	opening presentation today will include two parts.
21	Please note that the opening presentation is not
22	limited to two minutes, per the Board rules. I'll
23	begin with the nonclinical portion, and Dr. John
24	Dorsey will address the clinical aspects related

            It is my understanding that Mr. Tom
3
    McNamara, the mayor of Rockford, requested this
4
    public hearing, which I feel is necessary to give
5
    you some background so you are aware of things
6
    that might be brought up today.
            Just as a little way of my background, I
7
8
    grew up on the west side of Rockford with my 11
9
    brothers and sisters. I graduated from Auburn
10
    High School on the west side of Rockford and began
11
    my career in health care at age 16 at Rockford
12
    Memorial Hospital and now Javon Bea Hospital
13
    Rockton.
14
            The west side of Rockford holds a special
15
    place in my heart, and I deeply care about that
16
    hospital and the residents of the west side, as I
17
    still have many relatives that live on the west
18
           In fact, it's one of our reasons why Mercy
19
    Health -- I've made sure, through my efforts, to
20
    double our investment commitment in capital
2.1
     improvements to the Rockford Campus site.
22
            To date, we have invested over
23
     $100,650,000 in just six years. We had originally
2.4
    committed -- Mercy Health did -- to invest
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1	50 million in the campus over ten years. So we've
2	more than doubled that original commitment in six
3	years.
4	In June of 2018, however, our Rockton
5	Avenue Hospital suffered devastating flooding and
6	a ground floor laboratory, pharmacy, cancer
7	center, and many other clinical services were
8	completely destroyed. The water was waist high in
9	areas and caused over \$30 million in damage.
10	We were blessed by the fact that we were
11	building a new hospital in Riverside off I-90 and,
12	at that time, we were able to rush 200
13	construction tradesmen to the Rockton Avenue
14	Campus. They quickly built an alternative
15	temporary heating ventilation air conditioning
16	system, HVAC system, to keep bacteria, mold, and
17	other contaminants in the storm sewer water from
18	polluting the entire hospital and endangering our
19	inpatients through our normal HVAC system.
20	Having those 200 workers at the ready
21	saved the hospital from being shut down and,
22	ultimately, condemned by the State because these
23	contaminants would have gotten into the sheetrock.

ceiling tile, and all other materials throughout

1 the entire hospital. 2 That \$30 million on just the bottom level alone required carrying everything out down to the 3 4 metal studs and totally disinfecting the metal 5 studs, tearing up all the flooring tile, ceiling 6 tile. It was totally down to the concrete walls 7 and the studs, which had to be decontaminated and 8 then totally built back new. 9 But the next time we have major flooding, 10 we will not be able to have these 200 workers at a 11 moment's notice. It's not a matter of if the 12 building will flood again but when. And at that point, the hospital and Mercy's \$100 million 13 investment in the hospital building will be lost 14 15 to contamination. 16 After the 2018 flood, Mercy spent over 17 \$2 million to install flood doors in front of 18 various entrances to the hospital where the water 19 had come through and blocked up and bricked up 20 windows where the water had also poured in. 2.1 But last August, 2021, with another heavy 22 rainfall, the water came right up to the top of

the flood doors. And if it rained a little harder

or if another storm came in that night, the

1	hospital would have flooded, and the dirty storm
2	sewer water would have contaminated the hospital.
3	We have tried since 2018 to work
4	cooperatively with Mayor McNamara. The Rockford
5	engineering firm that also does the City of
6	Rockford's work consulted on the flooding project
7	and said that the Mayor needs to install a sewer
8	box culvert under Garfield Avenue from the west
9	edge of that Rockton Campus to Kent Creek to
10	handle the massive amount of water that drains to
11	the bottom of the bowl of 250 acres. The
12	hospital, unfortunately, happens to be at the
13	bottom of the bowl, and all the water from 250
14	acres surrounding the campus pours right to the
15	hospital.
16	The box culvert would be a \$6 million
17	project, but the Rockford engineering firm also
18	stated the City can invest a small amount of money
19	to finance a 30-year tax-exempt bond to pay for it
20	over 30 years. Mayor McNamara has refused to do
21	it, and, yet, he's spending 27 million to redesign
22	Wyman Street as part of their capital plan and
23	putting money into hotels and other nice-to-have

wants instead of needs.

If the Mayor continues to refuse to spend

-
a small amount of money for a tax-exempt bond to
prevent the Mercy Rockton Hospital from flooding,
this will cause the hospital to close to dozens of
medical services and 800 jobs on this Rockton
Avenue campus. Mercy Health has been in
litigation with the City and the Mayor to install
the box culvert, but the lack of action continues
to put the Rockton Avenue Hospital at risk, like
we saw just this past August.
Because our hospital is at the bottom of a
bowl, as I stated, when it rains, all of the 250
acres of neighborhoods around the hospital campus
pours to the hospital. Mercy Health installed a
retention pond on the campus that handles the rain
that falls directly onto the campus, but the
engineers state we cannot build a retention pond
large enough to handle the floodwater and storm

Because the Mayor has refused to put a box culvert in to handle the water flowing onto our campus, we cannot even buy adequate casualty insurance to deal with any major future damage to the hospital. No insurance company will

sewer water from 250 surrounding acres.

1	adequately insure Mercy, because Mercy Rockford
2	experienced this \$30 million in damage in 2018,
3	and the solution to keep it from happening again,
4	a box culvert by the City, is not in place.
5	Mercy's previous insurance company not
6	Mercy is also suing the City to recover their
7	\$27 million or the \$30 million of damage that they
8	paid, because the insurance company's legal
9	position is it was not an act of God that the
10	hospital flooded in 2018, but it was because the
11	City did not keep up its stormwater sewer
12	capacity, as the City allowed the 250 acres of
13	bare land around the hospital to be built and
14	developed over without a proper size stormwater
15	sewer. Again, it is not a matter of if the
16	hospital will flood again but when.
17	Unlike the 2011 agreement between the
18	Boards of OSF and Rockford Memorial Hospital in
19	2011, if their merger had been approved by the
20	FTC, the RMH board had approved OSF closing
21	Rockford Memorial Hospital completely in 2016.
22	Mercy Health, however, is committed to
23	keeping the campus and the hospital building open
24	for a vast array of medical and outpatient

1	surgical and doctor services indefinitely. The
2	only thing that would ever cause the closure of
3	our Rockton Avenue Campus hospital building is the
4	flooding contamination of the hospital building as
5	a result of Mayor McNamara continuing to refuse to
6	install a box culvert from our campus to Kent
7	Creek to remove the floodwater from the campus
8	that pours from 250 surrounding acres.
9	You may hear today that our certificate of
10	exemption for discontinuing our medical/surgical
11	beds is a step towards closing the Rockton Avenue
12	Hospital Campus, but nothing could be further from
13	the truth.
14	In 2021, we had 141,810 patient visits on
15	the Rockton Avenue Campus. This year, in 2022, we
16	project to have 141,619 visits, which is only 191
17	less patients after this exemption is issued. We
18	can easily care for these 191 inpatient visits at
19	our Riverside campus.

This Rockton Avenue Campus is vital to our operations and together with the Riverside facility makes one complete hospital with the hospital-based outpatient services located in the Rockton Avenue Hospital building.

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1	Mercy desperately needs the Rockton Avenue
2	location to stay open, because we cannot offer all
3	of the hospital-based outpatient services at the
4	Riverside location. However, the constant risk of
5	severe flooding because of the Mayor's lack of
6	support is a looming threat that we need to keep
7	in mind as we evaluate appropriate levels of care
8	at both of our campus locations.
9	In the case of a flood, outpatients can
10	walk out of a hospital building, but it is
11	extremely difficult to remove seriously ill
12	inpatients that are in beds, many on ventilators,
13	to prevent these patients and beds from being
14	harmed by breathing in the dangerous contaminants
15	from the dirty sewer water flowing through the
16	heating ventilation and HVAC system.
17	Now, I'd like to turn the opening the
18	rest of the opening presentation over to Dr. John
19	Dorsey, our chief medical officer, to provide the
20	clinical portion of our opening presentation.
21	Thank you. Dr. Dorsey.
22	MS. SIMMONS: Mr. Dorsey, you're unmuted.
23	Please proceed.
24	DR. DORSEY: Thank you so very much.

1	Hi. My name is John Dorsey. J-O-H-N.
2	D-O-R-S-E-Y. And I'm the CMO of Mercy Health in
3	Rockford and speaking, obviously, in support of
4	this application. But I want to focus on the
5	clinical reasons behind the application.
6	So prior to the opening of our of
7	Riverside campus in which occurred in January
8	of '19, I spent many hours with my fellow
9	physicians determining the specific types of
10	patients that could be safely clinically treated
11	and managed at the Rockton Avenue Campus and which
12	patients had to be treated at Riverside.
13	It was always understood, both internally
14	and externally, that Riverside was the hospital
15	location for the sickest patients, as we had the
16	greater depth of services there. By that, I mean,
17	physical specialties and also the more extensive
18	state-of-the-art surgical and technological
19	capabilities.
20	For example, our cardiac interventional
21	labs are only on the Riverside campus. So we
22	planned, during those planning sessions, for those
23	patients needing hospital care but unlikely to
24	need advanced complex care to be hospitalized in

1 Rockton. 2 Well, despite these Riverside Hospital 3 preopening efforts, the operational realities were 4 much more complex. And it turned out patients' 5 clinical courses could not easily be predicted. 6 And as a result, we found ourselves frequently 7 having to transfer patients from the Rockton 8 Campus to the Riverside Campus if they wound up 9 needing more complex medical or technical skills. 10 And having to transfer these patients who are 11 getting sicker from one location to another was 12 obviously not good for patient care or for safety. 13 So as time progressed, physicians admitted 14 fewer and fewer patients to the Rockton Avenue 15 Hospital. And it has now gotten to the point 16 where the average number of patients admitted to 17 the Rockton Hospital is two to three. This is 18 clearly not the optimal way to deliver patient 19 care. 20 Please remember, we have never had two 2.1 complete hospitals. We only have one hospital 22 licensed between the two campuses, and, thus, it 23 is better patient care for Mercy Health to

consolidate its inpatients at the Riverside Campus

24

1	where there is, as I mentioned, that wide array of
2	specialty physicians and technical capabilities
3	and to consolidate its hospital-based and
4	clinic-based outpatient services on the Rockton
5	Hospital Campus.
6	Over the last few years, because of
7	factors that we all know, doctor shortages,
8	nursing shortages, folks leaving the health care
9	industry, COVID, market constraints, all health
10	care systems nationally have had to reanalyze what
11	services they can safely provide and in what
12	geographic locations in order to remain viable to
13	the larger community that they serve. Mercy
14	Health is no exception. Visions have to change to
15	meet reality.
16	Out of 200 hospitals in the state of
17	Illinois, Mercy Health historically had the second
18	largest amount of charity care and Medicaid
19	patient services, and our inpatient Medicaid
20	utilization reached 58 percent. This was
21	occurring simultaneously to the State's
22	implementation of managed Medicaid care
23	organizations or MCOs that delayed and refused to
24	pay services given to our patients.

1	In 2020, Mercy Health lost over
2	\$70 million at its Rockford hospital. Why?
3	Expenses exceeded revenues. No entity can sustain
4	itself if losses of this magnitude continue. I
5	think some people think that hospitals can't
6	close. Well, that's not true. In the last couple
7	years, three Chicago hospitals alone have closed
8	due to financial losses.
9	Did we have to change our vision and
10	operations to stay viable? Yes, we did. And I
11	would say now we have a clearer vision of the
12	long-term complementary nature of our one hospital
13	located on two campuses. Rockton campus will
14	focus on hospital-based outpatient services and
15	Riverside on inpatient.
16	As Mr. Bea said, the Rockton Hospital
17	building has many unique clinical services not
18	offered at any of our other Mercy Health
19	facilities. Such examples are included but not
20	limited to radiation oncology, medical oncology,
21	pain management, outpatient ORs, and our primary
22	endoscopy suites.
23	In addition, we have numerous clinical
24	services that will remain; family medicine, family

1 medicine residents, pediatrics, medical adult 2 subspecialties, cardiac and pulmonary rehab, orthopedics, podiatry, and numerous others. 3 4 Well over 50 physicians will remain on the 5 Rockton Campus. And to repeat again, even after 6 the bed closures, we anticipate no net change in 7 the number of patients that we will be seeing 8 overall. With a decrease of 191 patients on 9 Rockton, those are the inpatients that will be treated out of Riverside. 10 11 The Rockton Campus is critical for Mercy 12 Health. As Mr. Bea said, Riverside can't accommodate the unique services just mentioned. 13 14 Really, Rockton and Riverside together make one 15 complete hospital, and that's why we have one 16 hospital license. 17 It's also important to know that there are 18 internal operational support services for Mercy Health that are housed at Rockton that are vital 19 20 to our everyday operations. Our main laboratory 2.1 is in Rockton, our billing department and accounts 22 receivable is in Rockton, and there are many more 23 examples. These two campuses complement each 2.4 other.

1	From our perspective, any comments about
2	closing Rockton Avenue are unthinkable, especially
3	because of the clinical needs the unique
4	clinical needs and also after investing over
5	100 million in capital improvement. The only
6	thing that worries us about closing the Rockton
7	Hospital would be a future flooding.
8	Changing our 2015 vision of the Rockton
9	Hospital has been challenging, obviously, and
10	necessary. The alternative would have been
11	failure. Our 2022 vision reflects safe and
12	effective patient care, the realities of the
13	workforce, and fiscal stainability.
14	Rockton will remain a vibrant and
15	necessary complement to Riverside as we continue
16	to serve the greater Rockford region. Thank you.
17	MS. SIMMONS: Thank you, Mr. Dorsey.
18	Next, we have Mayor McNamara. You are unmuted.
19	Yes. Please proceed.
20	MAYOR MCNAMARA: First, I want to say
21	thank you to the Illinois Health Facilities and
22	Services Board. I also want to say thank you to
23	the dedicated and compassionate Mercy Health
24	employees.

west side.

1	But we all knew this day was inevitable
2	when Mercy came to our community just seven years
3	ago. Despite his story about being dedicated to
4	the west side, Rockford being dedicated to the
5	west side of Rockford because he grew up here,
6	Javon Bea and the Mercy Health board could not
7	care less about our community. They only care
8	about profits and their bottom line. They have
9	said one thing and done another time and time
10	again.
11	In 2015, Javon said we are committed to
12	maintaining a North Rockton Avenue Campus
13	providing hospital-based services. In 2018, he
14	said abandonment wasn't an option because the
15	hospital's impact on the west side of Rockford.
16	However, in 2020, they closed the area's pediatric
17	intensive care unit and its mental health unit,
18	the units that care for our city's most vulnerable
19	residents. Also, in 2020, they reduced emergency
20	department services, which eliminated a

Despite these closures, Javon declared that the idea that we are trying to close the

much-needed full-service ER for residents of our

1	Rockton Avenue Campus systematically is the
2	furthest thing from the truth. However, just a
3	month ago, we all learned that Mercy announced yet
4	another closure, that it would stop providing
5	inpatient medical and surgical services.
6	So not only is Javon Bea and the board
7	doing exactly what they kept telling us they
8	wouldn't do, they are actually doing it at the
9	worst time possible. We are in the middle of the
10	biggest surge of a once-in-a-lifetime pandemic.
11	Health care services are critical to ending this
12	pandemic, and they can't keep up.
13	But somehow Javon Bea and the board think
14	now is the right time to shut down inpatient
15	services to our residents most in need. They will
16	probably try to blame the pandemic for this
17	closure, but don't let them use two years of an
18	unprecedented community health crisis as an excuse
19	to put an irreplaceable hole in the care for our
20	most vulnerable patients in Rockford.
21	The Mercy board and this Board need to
22	stand up now and stand against putting profits
23	over people. It's never too late to do the right
21	thing And I urge this Board to do the right

1	thing and keep this hospital open. Thank you.
2	MS. SIMMONS: Thank you, Mayor. Next,
3	let's go to Representative Maurice West.
4	REPRESENTATIVE WEST: Thank you so much.
5	Can you hear me?
6	MS. SIMMONS: Yes, we can. Thank you.
7	REPRESENTATIVE WEST: All right. Thank
8	you so much to the Board and to for putting on
9	this public hearing. I'm State Representative
10	Maurice West. M-A-U-R-I-C-E. W-E-S-T.
11	I'm the state representative of the 67th
12	District in Rockford, which is the whole west side
13	and south side of Rockford. I'm a proud resident
14	of Rockford, I'm a product of the Rockford public
15	schools, and I know of the history that has been
16	systemic in our city. The history of our
17	beautiful river essentially serving as a railroad
18	tracks. The east side is the haves, the west
19	sides is the have-nots.
20	One of my main missions as state
21	representative is to ensure that the west side and
22	the south side gets the same resources, the same
23	opportunities, as the east side of Rockford does.
24	Excellence everywhere for everyone. Opportunities

1 everywhere for everyone.

And so it's really hard to grasp that from Javon Bea who says that he's from the west side of town when all the services on the west side of town are leaving. When Javon Bea and Mercy Health showed a desire to come to Rockford and build a hospital off of I-90, every Rockfordian was concerned about what would happen to the west side campus, and we were assured that the one and only hospital on the west side will remain open and provide crucial services, not just stay open, but provide the crucial services as well.

Even in 2020, in a news story with WREX,

Javon Bea addressed rumors that he was getting

ready to close the Rockton Campus. He said,

quote, that's not true. He plans to keep the -
they quoted him saying he plans to keep the

hospital open indefinitely. However, he said,

there is one thing that could shut the hospital

down for good. Flooding.

Personally, I'm thinking that he meant just water, floods from water. But his actions over the past couple of years, in the middle of a pandemic, show me that he also meant a flood of

1	Medicaid patients needing services will cause them
2	to drop Medicaid providers because it was
3	affecting their bottom line
4	MR. ROATE: Two minutes.
5	REPRESENTATIVE WEST: in the middle of
6	a pandemic or a flood of COVID patients from the
7	west side, which caused elective surgeries to take
8	a temporary back seat during this pandemic, and
9	that flood also affected their bottom line.
10	In spite of these actions from Javon Bea
11	Hospital, I secured millions of dollars from the
12	state for the hospital out of good faith, whatever
13	I needed to do to ensure that the Rockton campus
14	stayed open. Yet, here we are.
15	MR. ROATE: Two minutes.
16	REPRESENTATIVE WEST: I'm almost done.
17	So the next question is, where do we go
18	from here? I'm imploring Mercy Health to do the
19	right thing and stand on what you've been telling
20	our community since day one.
21	Excellence everywhere for everyone means
22	that services that are on the east side needs to
23	be on the west side. Because as of right now, a
24	promise made is not a promise kept, and there's

1 still time to fix that. 2 Do not close Rockton Campus. Do not 3 accept the certificate of exemption. Thank you. 4 MS. SIMMONS: Thank you, Representative 5 West. Next, let's go to Representative Dave 6 Vella. 7 REPRESENTATIVE VELLA: Thank you. I am 8 Representative Dave Vella. I'm from the Rockford 9 68th, which is the east side of Rockford. And I've lived in both sides of Rockford for my whole 10 life. I was born in the Rockford Rockton Campus. 11 12 My daughter was born in the Rockford Rockton 13 Campus. It is a historic hospital in a historic neighborhood. And to close it right now would be 14 a horrible idea. 15 16 The Mercy Health Rockton Campus is a 17 critical asset to our residents on the west side of Rockford. Leading up to today, this facility 18 has been gradually stripped away by the Javon Bea 19 20 group, paving the way for an eventual shut down of 2.1 the entire campus. I have constituents who have 22 lived in that area who live there now. If this facility closes, their closest hospital would be 23 2.4 Swedish American, an extra mile away, which could

1 mean the difference between life and death for 2 them. 3 The Rockton facility has resources that 4 are so needed for our community, especially on the 5 west side; the orthopedics, oncology and 6 chemotherapy, radiology, gastroenterology, and a 7 helipad, these things are crucial things for the 8 west side of Rockford. 9 Rockford is, as my colleague, Maurice 10 West, stated, split into two. And to take this 11 away would disenfranchise the west side of 12 Rockford. The Rockford facility is a big employer also for the region. If it were shut down, that 13 would put hundreds of people out of work. This 14 15 process they have already initiated as well by 16 laying off as many staff members as possible 17 during COVID. And to let anyone use COVID as a 18 reason for shutting down this much-needed hospital, I think, would be criminal. 19 20 On Mercy Health's own website, they state, 2.1 Mercy Health is committed to providing exceptional 22 hospital care, no matter where you live, 23 throughout southern Wisconsin and northern 2.4 Illinois. By closing this facility and going back

1	on their commitment, they are actively going
2	against that mission.
3	Javon Bea has publicly stated time and
4	again that he would keep the Rockford facility
5	open, but his actions internally show steps taken
6	to gradually shut this facility down and moving
7	services to the Riverside Campus.
8	I urge this Board to not accept this. I
9	urge this Board to listen to my colleague, Maurice
10	West, and to Mayor McNamara and please keep this
11	open. Thank you very much.
12	MS. SIMMONS: Thank you. Next, I have
13	Senator Steve Stadelman. You're still muted, sir.
14	SENATOR STADELMAN: There we go. I got
15	all the buttons pushed now. Sorry about that.
16	MS. SIMMONS: That's okay.
17	SENATOR STADELMAN: I am State Senator
18	Steve Stadelman. Last name is spelled
19	S-T-A-D-E-L-M-A-N. I represent much of the
20	Rockford area, along with Loves Park and Machesney
21	Park. Thank you to the Board for the opportunity
22	to express the concerns of many in this community
23	about the planned closure of 70 inpatient surgical
24	beds at Mercy's Rockton Avenue Campus.

This is, as you've heard, one of several reductions of services in a disadvantaged part of town over the past several years. Unfortunately, many in the community feel victim to what can best be described as a bait-and-switch strategy at retail stores. You're promised one thing, but it turns out to be a much different product when you get there.

A few years ago, when Mercy Health

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A few years ago, when Mercy Health officials asked the State for permission to build a new hospital on the east side of town, there were promises of two equal campuses and continued inpatient and outpatient services at the Rockton Campus.

Instead, as you heard, trauma services were eliminated on the Rockton Campus at the start of the pandemic in 2020. A 20-bed inpatient mental health unit was also closed on the campus. And in 2018, Mercy Health officials did say it was important not to abandon the Rockton Campus because of the hospital's impact on the west side of Rockford. However, I fear, and many in that part of the community fear, that's exactly what's slowly been happening as inpatient services and

1	access to critical health care services continues
2	to go away on the west side of Rockford.
3	Thanks for the opportunity.
4	MS. SIMMONS: Thank you. Next, Mitch,
5	we're going to go to Joanna Benning.
6	MS. BENNING: Good afternoon. Thank you,
7	Board. And my name is Joanna Benning. I am vice
8	president of facilities and support services for
9	Mercy Health. I am speaking in support of this
10	application today.
11	As noted by Mr. Bea, Rockton is an
12	integral part of the services we offer in
13	Rockford. Because of this, we have invested more
14	than a million dollars into the campus over the
15	last six years. I have led and overseen every
16	single one of these projects.
17	We are needing to stay on the west side.
18	We are needing to stay on our Rockton Avenue
19	Campus. The hospital building is a beautiful
20	renovated facility. We have built a new
21	state-of-the-art cancer center, GI labs, upgraded
22	radiology capabilities, a new ortho suite, EMS
23	training centers, and much more.
24	The only thing, as noted, that would shut

1	this facility down is flooding that we have
2	already seen and occur from water rain events that
3	is increasing after more time and time again.
4	Following the 2018 flooding, we worked closely
5	with Fehr Graham, a Rockford-based engineering
6	firm. Fehr Graham is also the engineering firm
7	for the City of Rockford.
8	We need to focus and help the City and
9	Mayor McNamara help understand the criticalness to
10	install a box culvert to help us keep this
11	facility open. It's important to understand that
12	the City's sewer system has not changed since 1962
13	when much of the property around the campus was
14	not developed. What once was green space
15	surrounding the campus was paved over. The City
16	allowed 250 acres to be built surrounding the
17	Rockton Campus without upgrading the sewer system.
18	We need your help in getting the City to
19	implement this critical infrastructure to help us
20	save our campus from flooding that will occur.
21	Thank you.
22	MS. SIMMONS: Thank you. Next, we have
23	Alderman McNeely.
24	MR. MITCHELL: I do not see Linda McNeely

1	on our list of attendees. If she's calling in, if
2	she could please use star 3 to raise her hand.
3	MS. SIMMONS: Mitch, I'm hearing some
4	background. Do you see who's unmuted between
5	myself and you? I can't tell. Am I I may be
6	hearing something. Okay. Well, you don't see
7	Alderman McNeely? So let's go to Alderman
8	Alderman Bonne.
9	MR. MITCHELL: Again, that name is not on
10	my list of attendees.
11	MS. SIMMONS: Okay.
12	MR. MITCHELL: If he is in attendance and
13	dialing or calling in on the phone, if he could
14	use star 3 to raise his hand and we will recognize
15	him. I do not see that anyone.
16	MS. SIMMONS: Alderman Wilkins. Do you
17	see
18	MR. MITCHELL: Yes. Yes. I have Alderman
19	Wilkins.
20	MS. SIMMONS: Alderman Wilkins, you are
21	unmuted. Please proceed.
22	ALDERMAN WILKINS: Thank you. Thank you
23	guys for having me on today. There's clearly
24	something between the organization and the City of

1	Rockford and we all know that there has been
2	millions of dollars that has been invested into
3	this campus and (indiscernible)
4	THE REPORTER: I'm sorry. I believe
5	you're freezing.
6	MR. MITCHELL: Alderman Wilkins, you are
7	freezing.
8	ALDERMAN WILKINS: I'm not sure. Can you
9	guys hear me okay now?
10	MS. SIMMONS: Yes.
11	ALDERMAN WILKINS: I don't know what you
12	heard or what you didn't hear.
13	MS. SIMMONS: Alderman Wilkins, your
14	connection is slightly bad. So let's do this,
15	let's go to the next one, and we'll come back to
16	you.
17	Okay. All right. Chief Pankow. Okay.
18	There she you are unmuted. Chief Pankow?
19	CHIEF PANKOW: Good afternoon. Thank you
20	to the Health Facilities and Services Review Board
21	for the opportunity to speak today.
22	My name is Michelle Pankow, and I am the
23	chief of the Rockford Fire Department. Our
24	department is the primary emergency medical

1 response and trained support agency for the City 2 of Rockford. 3 In 2015, our department began to assess 4 the impact that a new hospital on the far 5 northeast side of Rockford would have on both 6 operations for our department as well as the 7 community that we serve. At that time, Mercy 8 Health stated that a regional destination campus 9 would give us the economic strength allowing Mercy Rockford to continue to invest \$50 million in 10 11 Rockton Avenue, allowing Mercy Rockton to continue 12 hospital services on the west side. 13 But since then, we have seen a systematic reduction in services, not only at the Rockton 14 15 Avenue Campus but at the Riverside Campus as well, 16 most notably, the pediatric intensive care unit. 17 There are numerous concerns with the additional requested reductions, as the patients living on 18 the west side are already forced to seek 19 time-sensitive care for critical conditions at 20 facilities on the far east side of Rockford. 2.1 22 Previous closures of the cath lab -- or 23 relocation of the cath -- the cardiac cath lab 24 affects treatment and early treatment for heart

1	attacks. Early treatment for stroke was
2	negatively impacted with the relocation of the
3	stroke team and then trauma intervention with the
4	reduction of trauma capabilities at the Rockton
5	facility.
6	As an agency, we've seen a negative impact
7	on ambulance out-of-service times. This impact
8	has been felt citywide, but it's most acute for
9	those on the northwest side of Rockford. With the
10	reduction in emergency services at the Rockton
11	Campus, our ambulances are forced to transport
12	critical patients to hospitals further away
13	MR. ROATE: Two minutes.
14	CHIEF PANKOW: these transports often
15	take two or even three times as long as a
16	transport to the Rockton Avenue Campus, and
17	ambulances returning from these other facilities
18	are out of service for a much longer period of
19	time
20	MR. ROATE: Two minutes.
21	CHIEF PANKOW: Just done almost done.
22	If services are further reduced, it will likely
23	create what we're looking at as a health care
24	desert on the west side of Rockford, and it will

1	have a direct impact on those in a one-mile radius
2	around the facility.
3	The population there has a higher portion
4	of persons living with disabilities, a greater
5	percentage of population over the age of 65, and a
6	significant number of households without access to
7	transportation. Further reduction in services at
8	the Rockton Campus will be felt citywide, but most
9	acutely by those who can afford to endure it the
10	least. Thank you.
11	MS. SIMMONS: Thank you, Chief Pankow.
12	Next, we have Mr. Todd Anderson.
13	MR. MORADO: Mr. Anderson is going to be
14	speaking from the conference room that's listed,
15	the Mercy Health conference room.
16	MR. MITCHELL: Okay. It's connected.
17	MS. SIMMONS: If you can please unmute
18	yourself, Mercy Health. There you go. You can
19	proceed.
20	MR. ANDERSON: Good afternoon. My name is
21	Todd Anderson, T-O-D-D, A-N-D-E-R-S-O-N, and I am
22	the vice president of finance for Mercy Health.
23	I feel it necessary to clarify a few key
24	facts so that you are aware of the investment in

1 community development that Mercy Health has and 2 continues to provide to our community. 3 You may have heard today that Mercy Health 4 does not support the community. This is not true. 5 Mercy Health has invested heavily in jobs. Over 6 the last six years, we have invested over 7 \$1,686,000,000 in jobs. These jobs positively 8 touch all areas of the Rockford community and 9 economy. They include entry-level positions such 10 as highly -- as well as highly skilled and trained 11 medical physicians, nurses, and clinicians. 12 are one of the top employers in Rockford. 13 We also have the highest Medicaid utilization in the region. Prior to the changes 14 15 we made due to the for-profit Medicaid Managed 16 Care Organizations, MCOs, not paying us, we were 17 58 percent Medicaid utilization, the second 18 highest in the state out of over 200 hospitals. 19 This is five times higher than OSF, and they 20 withdrew from the two largest for-profit Medicaid 2.1 MCOs, Meridian and Blue Cross Blue Shield, before 22 Mercy Health did. It's also over twice as large 2.3 as UW Swedish American. 2.4 Six years ago, Mercy Health in Rockford

1	had over 85 percent of our Medicaid patients tied
2	to the state directly, and the state reimbursed
3	Mercy Health better and did eventually pay patient
4	bills. At that time, less than 15 percent of our
5	Medicaid patients were on the for-profit MCOs that
6	not only pay 18 cents for a dollar cost of care,
7	but many don't pay it at all. And four years
8	later, we had 100 percent of our Medicaid patients
9	on these nonpaying MCOs. This is why we had to
10	make changes. Even with these changes, we are
11	losing money.
12	The MCOs often do not pay us at all. And
13	when they do, they pay at 82 cents less than one
14	dollar cost of care. The MCOs pay only 18 cents
15	on a dollar cost of care, and that is why we lose
16	so much money in Rockford. In Rockford, Mercy
17	Health lost \$73 million in 2020, lost \$43 million
18	in 2021, and we are on track again to lose over
19	\$40 million this year, 2020.
20	MR. ROATE: Two minutes.
21	MR. ANDERSON: Under Mr. Bea's leadership,
22	Mercy Health has built Rockford a new \$500 million
23	state-of-the-art tertiary regional referral
24	center, invested over \$100 million on the Rockton

1	Avenue Campus, as you previously heard today,
2	built new beautiful clinics at various locations
3	in Rockford, such as Cherry Valley, north on
4	Alpine Avenue, and brought new family practice and
5	internal medicine doctor training programs,
6	training 75 new doctors for the Rockford area.
7	MR. ROATE: Two minutes.
8	MR. ANDERSON: Since I'm almost done.
9	Since rumors are spread about Mr. Bea's
10	compensation, I will say the following points.
11	First, 80 percent of Mr. Bea's compensation is at
12	risk. If he does not achieve the goals the board
13	demands of him, then his compensation severely
14	drops. Mr. Bea has no involvement in setting his
15	compensation. It is set by the board.
16	MS. SIMMONS: Thank you, Mr. Anderson.
17	Thank you, Mr. Anderson. We're going to move on
18	to the next the next speaker. You know, I want
19	to Mitch, do you see Dorothy Reddick? I did
20	not see Dorothy Reddick.
21	MR. MITCHELL: No. She is not on the
22	list.
23	MS. SIMMONS: And she's not in as a
24	call-in user either? Do you get those

1	registrations?
2	MR. MITCHELL: No. I don't have any names
3	associated with the call-in users. She would need
4	to raise her hand with star 3.
5	MS. SIMMONS: Okay. All right. Well,
6	let's go back to Linda Alderman Linda McNeely.
7	I see we have a couple of hands raised. I'm
8	guessing that's either Alderman McNeely or
9	Alderman Bonne. No. We have Alderman so
10	Alderman McNeely.
11	MR. MITCHELL: I'm still not seeing them
12	on my list of attendees.
13	MS. SIMMONS: Let's go back to Alderman
14	Wilkins.
15	MR. MITCHELL: I also do not have her on
16	the list anymore. I believe she's probably
17	disconnected.
18	MS. SIMMONS: Okay. Well well, let's
19	go to the first hand that's raised. I see another
20	hand. Michael is that Michael Dillard? It's
21	not coming in on mine.
22	MR. DILLARD: Hello?
23	MS. SIMMONS: You're unmuted.
24	MR. DILLARD: Yes, ma'am. My name is

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1
    Michael Dillard. D-I-L-L-A-R-D. I'm a resident
2
     from the west side of Rockford, Illinois. And I
3
    was just calling to voice some of my concerns and
4
    comment on some of the things I've heard.
5
            The first thing I'm going to talk about is
6
    Mercy Health just put on a hell of a dog and pony
    show. If they're going to provide integral --
7
8
    capitalize integral, that word, to the citizens of
9
    Rockford, why are they continuing to remove
    services?
10
11
            They've got an emergency room that is
12
    staffed with only nurses with an on-call doctor.
     That could contribute to life or death. If I'm an
13
    EMT, I've got to make a decision where I'm going
14
15
    to take my patient.
16
            So by stripping away all these services,
17
    you're actually accelerating the demise of the
18
    hospital. These people must be held accountable.
     I mean, they're talking about Medicare and
19
20
    Medicaid. At the end of the year, they get all
2.1
    that money back. They're talking about losses
22
    within the year. The logistics just don't work.
23
    Cutting services are just not acceptable.
24
    emergency room looks like a war room because the
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1	EMTs, as brave and as talented as they are, got to
2	make a decision where they're going to take a
3	patient.
4	And, you know, it's just it's just not
5	acceptable. The west side is already underserved,
6	very underserved, and we do not need this. We
7	need a fully-staffed emergency room. You know,
8	this is where a lot of violence happens on the
9	west side. We have a lot of shootings. We have a
10	lot of trauma over here. They have it on the east
11	side too, but it's more so on the west.
12	And they've taken away an integral
13	component of emergency care. And I just think
14	that's despicable. And like Mr. McNamara said,
15	our mayor, everything Javon Bea has said he was
16	going to do, he didn't do.
17	You know, so and that's all I have to
18	say. And I thank you for allowing me the
19	opportunity to speak.
20	MS. SIMMONS: Thank you. Next
21	MR. MITCHELL: April, I believe we may
22	have Janessa Wilkins back. Let me check. Just a
23	moment. Is this Alderman Wilkins?
24	ALDERMAN WILKINS: It is. I just put it

1 in the Q and A that I dialed in on my phone to see 2 if that would help with the connection, but can 3 you guys hear me okay now? 4 We can. Please proceed. MS. SIMMONS: 5 ALDERMAN WILKINS: Thank you. And thank 6 you for having me on. And thank you guys for 7 taking the time to meet with us all for this 8 hearing today. 9 I know this pretty much boils down to 10 money. You know, the hospital has put in money 11 for the facility, the City has put in money for 12 the facility. And what we all do know is that 13 it's in a bad spot for the flooding. And so as Mr. Bea stated earlier, it's not a matter of if it 14 15 will flood again but when. 16 And it's not only the hospital that's 17 suffering, but it's also the residents around the 18 hospital that's suffering as well. I can't go 19 back and we can't change anything that happened in 20 the past, but I would like to see what we can do 2.1 to move forward. I think we can -- most of us 22 agree that, you know, the facility on Riverside, 23 while we are grateful that, you know, you guys do 2.4 still have services available for the residents of

the Rockford area, we need services on the west side as well.

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And even if you don't live over here, you may be passing through here. Someone you may know, someone in your family may be over here and they may need those facilities and those critical couple minutes that might be -- excuse me -- might work into the situation could affect you in ways that you don't even comprehend right now.

So what I would like to do -- and, moving forward, if anyone is willing to sit down with me and we can talk about how we can move forward, whether that involves moving the campus to a spot that makes sense over here on the west end, if we need to utilize the facility for mixed services to raise money until we're able to get that facility, I'm all ears.

I understand you guys have had conversations with the Mayor and other individuals before. You have not with me. And so if we could explore all possible opportunities, I am here for it, and I am more than willing to take some time out of my day and sit down and see how we can move forward in getting the residents something that

1	they need over here on the west side. Thank you.
2	MS. SIMMONS: Thank you. Karl Franzen.
3	MR. MITCHELL: He is unmuted. Sorry. And
4	now he's unmuted. Sorry.
5	MR. FRANZEN: Thank you. I am Karl
6	Franzen. K-A-R-L. F-R-A-N-Z-E-N. I'm the
7	director of community and economic development for
8	the City of Rockford. In my role, I leverage
9	economic development tools, including agreements
10	for developments that can enhance the community,
11	provide equitable economic opportunity, and
12	benefit the public.
13	The City entered a development agreement,

1	staggering for Rockton Avenue. Data from the
2	analytic firm Placer indicates visits, including
3	employees, patients, families, vendors to the
4	Rockton Campus fell 51 percent once critical
5	services and employees transferred to Riverside
6	and steadily declined from all there to now, just
7	23 percent of pre-2019 levels.
8	This activity decline correlates with
9	closures of essential commercial services like the
10	Rockton Avenue Schnuck's grocery store, which
11	closed just before Riverside opened. Contrastly,
12	during and despite the pandemic, Riverside visits
13	increased.
14	The development agreement has provisions
15	to maintain and invest in Rockton Avenue. Section
16	9(C), Mercy commits to maintaining operations at
17	the Rockton Campus and establishing an advisory
18	board for the repurposing of the clinic building
19	to include the Mayor, community leaders, and Mercy
20	representatives. This has not occurred.
21	Also of note, the agreement has provisions
22	to ensure that Rockford residents benefitted from
23	the services and tax dollars from commercial
21	development adjacent to the Riverside facility

1	Sections 4(C) and (D) commit Mercy to commercial
2	development on at least 60 acres and commencing
3	development of a hotel by September 2020. No
4	development has occurred, and Mercy has repeatedly
5	rejected referrals I have sent from developers
6	interested in a hotel and other commercial
7	activity at the site.
8	Approval of the applicant's request is
9	inconsistent with their agreement with the City
10	and not in the interest of the City of Rockford.
11	Thank you.
12	MS. SIMMONS: Thank you. Maryanne Miller.
13	DR. MILLER: Hello. Good afternoon. My
14	name is Dr. Maryanne Miller. M-A-R-Y-A-N-N-E.
15	Miller. M-I-L-E-R. And I'm the head
16	hospitalist and current president of the medical
17	staff at Mercy Health. I'm speaking in support of
18	Mercy Health's proposals.
19	As you've heard from Dr. Dorsey, staffing
20	for inpatient services for two Rockford hospitals
21	is simply not efficient or comprehensive,
22	especially now with the growing shortage of health
23	
	care workers. Staffing units at two hospitals

staff and is not viable with the current patient
volumes at the Rockton campus.

Because so much can be done on an

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outpatient basis now, only the sickest of the sick get admitted to the hospital these days. When they do, they often require subspecialty services from more advanced providers. The availability of subspecialty physicians remains both a local and a national issue with significant shortages in multiple fields. We spend months and years recruiting for these providers, as they remain a scarce resource and are not always readily available.

We have been fortunate to add critical, necessary, and specialized support in recent years, including neurointerventional, gynecologic oncology, and interventional radiology physicians that provide excellent and advanced care to our patients. These services, however, cannot be readily duplicated at two campuses.

Inpatient services at the Rockton Campus have become inconvenient to the patients because they often end up requiring the specialized services offered at the Riverside Campus. Often,

1	we admit them here, but we have to transfer them
2	there, because we do not have the subspecialty
3	support here at the Rockton Campus, nor can we
4	provide that service because of the lack of
5	providers.
6	In addition to the patient satisfaction
7	concerns, teams need to assemble each day to
8	determine which patients need the extra cares.
9	These meetings can be lengthy, and then that time
10	can be used by all staff to provide necessary and
11	invaluable patient care.
12	By consolidating inpatient care to the
13	Riverside Campus, we are better able to utilize
14	our existing staff, thus, allowing us to provide
15	better and complete patient care. Thank you.
16	MS. SIMMONS: Thank you. Anqunette
17	Parham.
18	MS. PARHAM: Good afternoon. My name is
19	Anqunette Parham. A-N-Q-U-N-E-T-T-E.
20	P-A-R-H-A-M. I'm the executive director of health
21	and human services for the City of Rockford. My
22	role includes leading the City's programmatic
23	efforts towards geared towards the most
24	vulnerable residents of our city, so that includes

1	children in head start all the way up to adults
2	experiencing homelessness and those in crisis.
3	Please know that the steady decline and
4	reduction in services provided at the Rockton
5	Avenue location and now this stated plan of
6	consolidation of inpatient services on the
7	Riverside Campus and of outpatient services at the
8	Rockton Campus is not what was promised to this
9	community nor this Board at the time of Mercy's
10	certificate of need application to build their
11	Riverside Campus.
12	Closure of this location is detrimental to
13	the entire Rockford community and, most
14	specifically, the west side. Decreased access to
15	care will continue to make it more difficult to
16	adequately address the social determinants of
17	health in this community and improved health
18	outcomes for all of Rockford.
19	The closure of this hospital location will
20	also continue to add additional stressors on the
21	City's other health care partners that continue to
22	serve all of Rockford. Other health care
23	organizations have dug in and expanded their
24	footprints in underserved areas of our community

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1
    at this most critical time in the midst of a
2
    global pandemic.
3
            This current picture of one hospital and
4
    two locations does not look like the one promised
5
    to residents, patients, taxpayers, and Rockford's
6
    elected officials not too long ago. I urge the
7
    Health Care Facilities and Services Review Board
8
    to reject Mercy's request for exemption, stop the
9
    bait and switch that's in progress, and stand up
10
    for the residents and taxpayers of Rockford,
11
    Illinois who have been misled throughout this
12
    process. Rockford deserves better. Thank you
13
    very much.
            MS. SIMMONS: Thank you. Let's go to

2	southwest quadrant of Rockford, the oldest, most
3	historic district of Rockford. I also am a former
4	scientist with the Illinois Department of Public
5	Health and was a private sector environmental
6	consultant to Rockford Memorial Hospital sampling
7	and analyzing and advising on their wastewater
8	treatment system. So I am somewhat acquainted
9	with the water quality issues there, however,
10	there was no flooding, to my knowledge, when I was
11	involved in 2000 to 2005.
12	I moved to Rockford from Springfield and
13	chose to restore a neighborhood and my ancestral
14	home from 1923. We've been very successful in
15	doing both. However, the reason I moved to the
16	neighborhood was because I was appalled at how the
17	west side of Rockford has systematically been
18	disenfranchised. And leaving for college in the
19	1970s to Southern Illinois University where I got
20	my bachelor's and master's degrees in the sciences
21	and coming back in the mid '90s was quite a wake
22	up.

4	proposal to further diminish services at sorry
5	at Javon Bea Hospital on Rockton Avenue.
6	Two of the essential functions of public
7	health are assessment and assurance. Our health
8	department is charged with monitoring the health
9	status of our county and working with community
10	partners to assure adequate and accessible
11	resources for meeting the needs of our citizens.
12	We oppose the discontinuation of the
13	medical/surgical category of service on Rockton
14	Avenue.
15	We realize that the current inventory of
16	hospital beds in our planning area indicates a
17	surplus of beds, but the location of these beds in
18	the planning area needs to be taken into
19	consideration. Javon Bea Rockton is
20	geographically located on the west side. And as
21	you've heard from other speakers, the west side
22	has suffered from economic disinvestment and aging
23	infrastructure. This part of the city is home to
24	communities of color who have suffered

1	disproportionately the consequences of health
2	inequity, and the closure of beds at Javon Bea
3	Rockton places this part of our community at
4	increased risk for poor health outcomes.
5	In 2015, we supported Javon Bea Mercy
6	Health in its application to build a new facility
7	located northeast of the city with the
8	understanding and commitment from leadership
9	people at Mercy and Mercy board members that
10	services would continue to be provided along with
11	expansion and enhancements to Javon Bea Rockton
12	Avenue.
13	Since 2015, you've heard about the pattern
14	of closures and discontinuation of services that
15	that site has experienced. The current
16	application proposing that the Rockton Avenue site
17	function primarily as an outpatient site does not
18	provide the high quality and high acuity inpatient
19	access that the west side requires.

1	MS. LEWIS: the community deserves a
2	voice in decisions to discontinue and/or relocate
3	services since Javon Bea continues to hold a
4	tax-exempt status. Moving services to the far
5	east border of our county does not serve the
6	purpose of accessible and appropriate services for
7	the people of our community. Thank you.

23	has the best interests of the west side at heart,
24	and he would never close down the emergency room

and the hospital on the west side, and I said I 1 2 don't trust -- I don't trust it. And people said, 3 no, no, no, you can trust. Well, five years --4 six, seven years later, I notice that the only 5 people speaking in favor are employees of Mercy 6 because now we all know who is trustworthy and who 7 is not. 8 This should not be allowed to be continued 9 to be shut down step by step. In my role as a 10 minister, I visit members of my congregation who are in the hospital. The facility on Riverside is 11 12 lovely. And I go to the facility on Rockton, which used to be very nice and well-staffed, and 13 it's a ghost town over there. The quality of care 14 15 is not nearly as good. And the disinvestment is a snowball that continues and continues. 16 17 Many of my people who go there are residents of Wesley Willows, which contains many 18 senior citizens in our citizens -- in our 19 20 community, and they're very close there to the 2.1 Rockton campus but now go much further. 22 And people like to visit their family when 23 they're in the hospital. And when they're all the 2.4 way on the other side of town -- and,

This Board should deny this permit and 1 2 reverse the attempted closure of this hospital. 3 And do not trust the words that you hear from the 4 people that work for Mr. Bea. Thank you. 5 MS. SIMMONS: Thank you. Nikki McIntosh. 6 MS. MCINTOSH: Hi. My name is Nikki 7 McIntosh. I am the senior director, chief nursing 8 officer for Javon Bea Hospital, and I am speaking 9 in support of Mercy Health's application. 10 Like Dr. Miller pointed out, during these times, only the sickest of the sickest patients 11 12 are getting admitted to the hospital these days and they need a number of specialty doctors to 13 care for them. As a CNO, from a nurse's point of 14 15 view, when there aren't the right specialists to 16 care for these patients and they need to be 17 transferred, it creates a huge burden for our 18 nurses. 19 Given the current health care climate, 20 it's unrealistic to fully staff both hospital 2.1 campuses. Patients are better served when 22 inpatient care is at one facility where all the 23 specialists and advanced technology are readily available. 2.4

1	As you all know, businesses across the
2	county are facing severe nursing shortages as well
3	as other health care shortages right now, and
4	Mercy Health is no different.
5	We don't have adequate staff to keep all
6	of our facilities running at 100 percent. In
7	fact, we're not even close to 100 percent. We're
8	short-staffed across the board, and COVID is
9	making it so much worse. Despite our best efforts
10	every day, we have hundreds of employees out
11	across the system because of COVID. We've also
12	had to cut hours at our urgent cares and other
13	departments because we simply just don't have a
14	staff to run them.
15	We've had to take a long, hard look at our
16	operations. We've evaluated our patients' needs
17	and how they're utilizing our facilities to make
18	the best possible decisions about the use of our
19	staff while we continue to provide the very
20	safest, highest quality care.
21	As Dr. Dorsey pointed out, Rockton is
22	licensed for 74 medical/surgical beds but averages
23	only two inpatients a day. It really just is not
24	feasible to run a 24/7 inpatient unit on Rockton

1	when the census is just two patients, especially
2	when we're so short-staffed.
3	As Mr. Bea stated in his opening
4	statement, the difference in patients that were
5	treated last year compared to this year at our
6	Rockton Campus is only 191 less patients. And
7	these patients can easily be cared for at our
8	Riverside campus. Our proposal allows us to still
9	be able to care for the same number of people in
10	Rockford with no job loss, and it also allows us
11	the ability to utilize our staff in the best
12	possible way. Thank you.

Recently, we have noted that the vast number of patients coming to the Rockton Emergency Department do not require admission to a hospital and could have alternatively been treated at an urgent care or even their primary care physician's office. Those patients requiring emergency care will continue to be treated at our Riverside Campus.

Similar to what others have said, it's safer and more efficient for patients to have access to all the specialty services available to them at our Riverside location for emergency care.

I think it's also important to note that Rockford's approximately 147,000 residents currently have four emergency departments and three trauma centers available to them. In comparison, the combined population of nearby Crystal Lake, Cary, Algonquin area is roughly 90,000, and, currently, they don't have a single emergency department or trauma center. Rockford has more options for emergency care, given its population size, than many other areas in the state.

1	Finally, Mercy Health is committed to the
2	training and education of first responders in our
3	region. We have highly skilled EMTs and
4	paramedics in this area who are supported by the
5	MD-1 emergency response program. Our MD-1
6	physicians respond with our prehospital colleagues
7	to bring hospital level care to the scene of a
8	patient's emergency. The MD-1 vehicle is equipped
9	with lifesaving medical equipment, and the MD-1
10	doctors work alongside local first responders to
11	stabilize patients prior to transfer to an
12	emergency department.
13	Basically, we're bringing hospital level
14	care directly to the scene of an accident or
15	medical emergency in order to improve outcomes
16	and, in many instances, save lives. This service
17	further enhances the emergency care available to
18	the Rockford area. Thanks.
19	MS. SIMMONS: Thank you. Mr. Edward
20	Kopeland.
21	MR. KOPELAND: Thank you. My name is K.
22	Edward Kopeland. Kopeland is K-O-P-E-L-A-N-D.
23	I'm pastor at New Zion Baptist Church on the west
24	side of Rockford, Illinois.

I've been here for 20 years. I was there 1 2 in 2005 when promises were made. I spoke out 3 against the permit being offered to the Mercy 4 Health Hospital System, because I could foresee 5 this very thing happening, and that is -- not to 6 relitigate everything that's already been said, 7 but this issue of access, location, and a lack of 8 transportation here in the City of Rockford. 9 In my view, this is the worst possible 10 time to take one of the most needed services from 11 the people who need them the most, because, in 12 Rockford, we don't live in a vacuum. The Rockton Campus, the very location of it, speaks to not 13 14 only being an anchor in the community, but more so 15 to the issue of access given the lack of 16 transportation in this city. 17 Comparisons to other communities are 18 really irrelevant because Rockford has a high 19 incidence, particularly, on the west side, of 20 certain types of trauma, which is why Rockford 2.1 Memorial -- pardon me -- Mercy Health has been so 22 important in that neighborhood. And at the same 23 time, Rockford does not have the type of 2.4 transportation that a lot of other communities

1 have. 2 So I would just urge the -- the Board to reject this plan to closing, because it is part of 3 4 a pattern that we've been watching over the last 5 seven years of just continued excuses for 6 disinvestment. You've heard directly from Mr. Bea 7 that the real problem is that the Mayor won't come 8 up with \$6 million, but, hey, we've put in over 9 \$100 million and for some reason didn't do due 10 diligence as it relates to the flooding issue in 11 the area. 12 We've heard other appeals to just the fact that somehow or another, it really doesn't matter 13 14 because we're going to be seeing the same number 15 of people. But that doesn't speak to the issue of 16 access to those who need it most for the most 17 traumatic traumas as well as the fact that 18 transportation is a real issue here in Rockford, as was highlighted by the chief of the fire 19 20 department. So --MR. ROATE: Two minutes. 2.1 22 MR. KOPELAND: -- for all those reasons, I 23 would urge you to please reject this current 24 application to close down those services. Thank

1 you. 2 MS. SIMMONS: Thank you. Judy Moe. MS. MOE: Hello. My name is Judy Moe. 3 4 J-U-D-Y. M-O-E. And I'm speaking as a typical 5 patient and citizen of Rockford for over 40 years, 6 more than half of that time on the west side. 7 I used Rockton Mercy or Rockford Memorial, as we 8 knew it, for all of my -- my and my family's 9 medical needs, including the birth of our daughter 10 and granddaughter and several surgeries, etc. was always a busy place, and it was usually hard 11 12 to find a parking place. Since Mr. Bea took over, it has become 13 like a graveyard. Many of my doctors have been 14 15 moved to the east side clinics or have left town. 16 I've had six different oncologists in the last 11 17 years dealing with my cancer because they just 18 keep mysteriously moving on. 19 The most concerning situation to me was 20 when, at the end of 2020, I received a letter from 2.1 my neurologist office that they were closing that 22 department that deals with memory issues, and I 23 would have to go to Barrington, Illinois to find a 2.4 new doctor. Can you imagine all the memory,

1	dementia, and Alzheimer's patients having to
2	navigate that situation?
3	And, also, think about the fact that these
4	are people who are using Medicaid and Medicare
5	quite often. They are our older, more vulnerable
6	community. The letter said that I could call my
7	primary doctor for help in locating a new doctor.
8	When I called their office, they became very
9	distressed, because they had not even heard
10	anything about this department closing. No
11	warning at all. They eventually found me a doctor
12	at OSF, which is helping me. Thank God.
13	Since then, I have heard from many medical
14	people how upset they are with Mr. Bea and how he
15	continues to take services away from the west
16	side. He certainly has not kept his promise to
17	keep the Rockton Hospital available to meet the
18	needs of the people on that side of town. How
19	will we keep good medical people in Rockford when
20	they're treated in this way?
21	Thank you for letting me speak.
22	MS. SIMMONS: Thank you. Litesa Wallace.
23	MS. WALLACE: Good afternoon. Can
24	everyone hear me?

1	MS. SIMMONS: Yes, we can. Thank you.

3	I am former state representative Litesa Wallace.

5	And before we begin, I want to state my
6	fundamental position, which is that health care is
7	a fundamental right. Your right to decent health
8	care should not depend on your ZIP code or where
9	you live.
10	I've been involved in the issues related
11	to Mercy Health Systems for almost seven years.
12	In the late summer of 2015 in my role as state
13	representative, I was asked to take part in a
14	meeting with Mercy Health Systems to discuss the
15	possibility of one hospital, two campuses.
16	During that time during that meeting, I
17	was asked to support this expansion, which was
18	described as an opportunity to maintain services
19	on Rockford's west side and to expand the health
20	center's patient base throughout the region.
21	I heard a lot of promises. The community
22	heard a lot of promises. But as these plans
23	advanced, people in the surrounding neighborhood

began raising opposition to the project. And in

24

1 response, the CEO threatened to close the hospital 2 and whittle its services down to an urgent care 3 center if the two campus proposal was not 4 approved. 5 I was horrified that this hospital system 6 would play with people's lives and their health in 7 this way. But given that the health system was 8 one of the largest employers in my former 9 district, I reluctantly supported the plan for one 10 hospital, two campuses. 11 But it was apparent to me even then that 12 the hospital system's promises could be hollow. So to protect the people on Rockford's west side 13 and people across Illinois whose health care might 14 15 be threatened by a badly managed or heartless 16 system, I introduced and passed House Bill 4964 in 17 the Illinois General Assembly to amend the 18 Illinois Health Facilities Planning Act with the 19 support of my colleague, Senator Steve Stadelman. 20 That amendment is the reason why we have 2.1 this legally-mandated opportunity today in a place 22 that is close to us, barring -- even if there was 2.3 no COVID and we were on Zoom, we would have to

have this hearing in the neighborhood in which

2.4

1	these changes were being proposed.
2	And this is an opportunity for the public
3	to speak out about this proposal to shut the door
4	of accessibility to inpatients.
5	MR. ROATE: Two minutes.
6	MS. WALLACE: Thank you. And to provide
7	comprehensive health care for people on the west
8	side of Rockford and Winnebago County.
9	I oppose this proposal which threatens the
10	health and the well-being of thousands of people
11	in Rockford and beyond. And I do ask that we
12	decide what is really the issue. Is it the
13	staffing the viability of staffing? Is it the
14	flooding, which is not noted in the application?
15	And will we please center the 191 patients that we
16	say are fewer that will be served at Riverside and
17	think about their families as well.
18	Thank you for the opportunity to be here
19	today. Again, I oppose this application.

Regulations change, 8 treatments change, providers come and go, and the 9 needs of the community are always changing. 10 Mercy Health and care providers, we are committed 11 to providing care to our patients the best way we 12 know how. Obviously, being able to provide specialty 13 care in many locations would be ideal, but not a 14 15 reality in today's health care market, compounded 16 by a challenging labor market and poor 17 reimbursement, as you heard. 18 In reference to the comments on Mercy doing this during a pandemic, I think it is 19 20 important to highlight that Mercy has added 2.1 services and adjusted their work continuously to 22 meet the needs of their community and their patients during this pandemic. Like many other 23 2.4 health care organizations in this country, Mercy

            Mercy Health also serves as the regional

9	Rockford, born and raised. I was born at Rockford

11	They were a strong pillar in the community and had

13	I'm not a politician. I am, however, a
14	registered nurse. I've been in health care 27
15	years. I hear a lot of talk, work with a lot of
16	nurses that used to work at Rockford Memorial and
17	left because they did not like the politics that
18	Mercy Health Systems brought into the City of
19	Rockford.
20	That being said, I heard on this call the
21	financial person mention that Mercy stands to lose
22	\$40 million this year. And I want to ask everyone
23	on that call, is \$40 million worth the lives of
24	people on the west side?

1	I watch literally watch ambulances
2	drive past the Rockton unit to turn on Riverside
3	to head down to that Riverside Campus. And I
4	often think to myself, wow, are they bypassing the
5	former Rockford Memorial Hospital to literally
6	drive all the way out to that Riverside Campus for
7	services for health care? That's not fair.
8	That's not fair. And it is not right.
9	My mother is 74 years old, and she lives
10	behind Auburn High School. So instead of
11	considering the dollars and cents, consider the
12	people. Lives can be lost. And this is not fair
13	to the community.
14	I don't know Javon Bea. But I know he
15	thinks very highly of himself, because he has his
16	names on both of these buildings. And I really
17	wish I really wish this community, this board,
18	would consider denying terminating the services at
19	that Rockton Campus.
20	MR. ROATE: Two minutes.
21	MS. BOWEN: That is not where we need to
22	go. And instead of talking about staffing
23	shortages, why don't you consider opening up
24	another nursing program. Rockford Memorial used

1	to house a nursing program. Why don't you get in
2	the community and start talking to these high
3	school students about the importance of health
4	care and try to grow the health care profession
5	instead of complaining that you don't have enough
6	nurses or health care personnel to run two
7	campuses? Do something about that.
8	MR. ROATE: Two minutes.

1	The City of Rockford has tried to work
2	with Mr. Bea on this whole issue of the flooding
3	at Rockford Memorial. Rockford Memorial has been
4	flooding for at least 30 years, and it had nothing
5	to do with the way that the houses were built up
6	around there. It does have to do with the fact
7	that Rockford Memorial paved over almost every
8	inch of grass on their campus over the years.
9	There's multiple sources.
10	Mr. Bea didn't want to pay the permit
11	fees, so he came in and said, if you oppose me,
12	I'll move it to Beloit. I'll move it to
13	Wisconsin. And I said go ahead and move it. Of
14	course, he didn't. But Rockford's Alderman
15	capitulated and cut his fees in half. The state
16	of Illinois gave him \$10 million to build the
17	roads around his hospital. Everyone has
18	cooperated with him and worked with him.
19	As far as I'm concerned, this latest round
20	of cuts is orchestrated. I think it's been
21	orchestrated from the beginning. Rockford
22	Memorial is a shadow of its former self
23	MR. ROATE: Two minutes.
24	MS. HERVEY: I used to get all of my

1	health care at Rockford Memorial, and I moved it
2	all to Swedish American.
3	This committee, this Board, doesn't have
4	the authority to deny this petition. Senator Dave
5	Syverson saw to that in, I think, 2014 when the
6	law was changed so that we no longer have even the
7	power to ask for the state to protect our
8	interests.
9	I will submit written comments, because
10	there's much more to say. Thank you.
11	MS. SIMMONS: Thank you. Mitch, do we see
12	Alderman McNeely?
13	MR. MITCHELL: No, I don't. Let's go back
14	to Mr. Johnson.
15	MR. JOHNSON: Hello. Can you hear me now?
16	MS. SIMMONS: Yes.
17	MR. JOHNSON: Excellent. I'm Harlan.
18	H-A-R-L-A-N. Johnson, a community therapist
19	living in Parker Woods, a stable, integrated
20	subdivision located just west of Rockford.
21	I'm deeply concerned about the public's
22	erosion of trust in government. Because Javon Bea
23	lied, breaking his promise by closing Mercy's west
24	side emergency room and inpatient hospital with

1	total impunity, I want to know, is the Illinois
2	Health Facilities and Services Review Board also
3	breaking the public trust by colluding with Bea to
4	do absolutely nothing to stop him?
5	People in west Rockford die without an
6	emergency response from our only west side
7	hospital. I would be dead if Rockford Memorial
8	Hospital hadn't been there ten years ago when I
9	fell off my roof and was bleeding out. The level
10	I emergency department saved my life with
11	immediate surgery. This is personal for me.
12	As president of the Northern Illinois
13	Institute for the Healing of Racism, Incorporated,
14	I'm outraged at this blatant action to expand
15	institutional racism in health care. What needs
16	to happen to hold the Illinois Review Board and
17	Mercy Health accountable for their betrayal of
18	Rockford citizens?
19	We appealed to Governor Pritzker to
20	intervene. Federal intervention to confront the
21	systemic racism is justified based on the
22	Affordable Care Act Section 1557 and Title VI
23	regarding Javon Bea's actions which put profit for
24	Mr. Bea over the very lives of the people of west

1	Rockford, the lives of stakeholders, not
2	shareholders.
3	And what's this about so many paid
4	testimonies from Bea's employees testifying rather
5	than citizen input? Thank you.
6	MS. SIMMONS: Thank you. Next, we will
7	have Taj Guzzardo. G-U-Z-Z-A-R-D-O.
8	MS. GUZZARDO: Yes. Can you hear me?
9	MS. SIMMONS: Yes, we can. Please
10	proceed.
11	MS. GUZZARDO: I will cut out a little
12	bit, like two or three seconds, and then I'll
13	repeat what I said.
14	With the closure of medical and surgical
15	service at the Rockton Avenue Campus, Javon Bea
16	Mercy Hospital is abandoning the west side. As a
17	person who grew up on the west side and proud of
18	it, I find this closure deplorable. I find it
19	(indiscernible) Mr. Bea that you grew up on the
20	west side. It appears you feel no scruples about
21	betraying your own west side.
22	A friend of mine has a daughter living in
23	the Searles housing project. This woman has no
24	car. The nearest hospital to her is Rockford

1	Memorial. Previously, she suffered a miscarriage
2	and was taken to Rockford Memorial. Her condition
3	was serious with minutes counting. What will she
4	do if she is in need of a hospital in the near
5	future?
6	The east side now has two hospitals at
7	their disposal. Prejudice? Yes. I ask how can a
8	hospital be so uncaring of our community's need,
9	the west side. By this action, I see no mercy in
10	Javon Bea Mercy Hospital. Thank you.
11	MS. SIMMONS: Thank you. Mr. Morado?
12	MR. MORADO: Yes. Thank you. I'd like to
13	begin my comments by thanking staff for all of
14	their work in putting in today's public hearing.
15	We appreciate your time and we welcome the
16	feedback from the community on the proposed plan
17	regarding the medical/surgical beds at the Rockton
18	Avenue Campus.
19	This decision was not an easy one but
20	ensures appropriate health planning and
21	utilization of the existing facility in the long
22	term per this Board's mission.
23	We would note the following: The
24	applicant has provided all of the required

information per the Illinois Health Facilities
Planning Act; they've been deemed substantially
complete by HFSRB staff; and they are, therefore,
legally entitled to approval pursuant to 77
Illinois Admin Code 1130560B1, which provides that
the HFSRB shall approve an application for
exemption that it determines to be in compliance
with the requirements.
This is no longer a discretionary matter.
Having met all the Board's requirements pursuant
to the Board's own rules, this project is entitled
to approval as a matter of law. As we discussed
today, this change in services will allow Mercy
Health to continue to offer robust outpatient
services to the community at the Rockton Avenue
Campus.
You heard from Mercy's clinical staff
about the spectrum of access to care in the health
care delivery system, and the hospital feels this
plan will continue to provide that access. You've
also heard about the advancements in Mercy
Health's MD-1 and how that will change
on-the-scene emergency care.

1	is an emotional issue and that bealth come is record

2	personal. But this decision is part of a
3	thoughtful regional approach to health planning.
4	And the closure of Mercy's underutilized inpatient
5	medical/surgical beds will allow for the better
6	utilization of the existing facilities in the
7	community. This much has been made clear through
8	the testimony by our own employees today.
9	This is the same approach that Mercy
10	Health takes systemwide. Mercy Health alone has
11	been investing significant amounts of money in the
12	west side community of Rockford and will continue
13	to do so following the approval of this
14	application. Thank you, again, for your time.
15	MS. SIMMONS: Thank you. Next, I have Eli
16	Nikolosi. Do you see Mr. Nikolosi?
17	MR. MITCHELL: No. I do not see that name
18	on the list of attendees.
19	MS. SIMMONS: Okay. Let's go to Paul
20	Klazura. K-L-A-Z-U-R-A.
21	DR. KLAZURA: Hello. I believe you could
22	hear me.
23	My name is Paul Klazura, and I'm a retired
24	physician. I was a vascular surgeon who worked

1 primarily out of Rockford Memorial for the better 2 part of 25 years. I've been involved with --3 toward the end of my career -- with Mr. Bea's 4 decision to build a hospital on the east side. 5 I think, to a certain extent, Mr. Bea has 6 been trying to walk a tightrope, trying to keep 7 both ends together in the middle. But I think 8 with the approval of the hospital being built on 9 the east side, which was primarily for profit to 10 improve the payor mix, the genie came out of the 11 It's impossible to put that genie back in 12 the bottle. We can't have Rockford Memorial the way we all remember it and have something out on 13 Riverside at the same time. 14 15 I think it's inevitable that Mr. Bea, 16 through all of his deception and disingenuous 17 comments, is ultimately going to close Rockford 18 Memorial Hospital as we all know it. It's sad, but I think it's true. I think if there's 19 20 anything that could be done here, I think Mercy 2.1 Health System needs to be turned into a for-profit 22 organization. It's not for -- it's not a 23 not-for-profit organization. 2.4 We've heard Mr. Anderson speaking from

1	within a conference room talk nothing about money.
2	All the time we hear about the bottom line.
3	Bottom line for health care should be good health
4	care. The bottom line for Mr. Bea is how much
5	money he can make in the business of health care.
6	So that said, I am certainly in agreement
7	with the Mayor and Representative West and
8	everyone else who's concerned about how
9	disingenuous and untruthful Mr. Bea has been to
10	this entire community.
11	The concept that he grew up on the west
12	side and now he's always going to be thinking of
13	Rockford I think is just silliness. It doesn't
14	mean anything. He gets none of his health care in
15	Rockford.
16	So that said, I hope the Board does the
17	right thing. Unfortunately, we all don't know
18	what the right thing is, other than Mr. Bea will
19	ultimately close the hospital on Rockton Avenue.
20	Thank you for your time.
21	MS. SIMMONS: Thank you. Jamie Wilson
22	Cook.
23	MR. MITCHELL: I do not see that name. I
24	would remind people if they are calling in on the

1 its board of directors has disenfranchised some of 2 its most vulnerable and growing population in our 3 city. 4 It's even more disappointing for 5 Rockford's northwest neighborhoods that over \$50 6 million was going to be expended on improving, not 7 repairing, flood damage the old Rockford Memorial 8 Hospital, which has evaporated without any 9 explanation. 10 We have heard plenty of excuses from Javon 11 Bea as to why they wouldn't invest or reinvest in 12 the site. Issues of flooding are a result of the 13 hospital's own poor planning and development of that site, having paved over the entire site for 14 15 surface parking with absolutely no stormwater 16 detention and the exposing of the hospital's 17 basement to potential flooding is all of their own 18 making. 19 Cooperate mismanagement and poor planning 20 have created a self-fulfilled prophecy of never 2.1 intending to renovate the facility and then 22 blaming others to shift that responsibility. 23 addition, their corporate decisions over the past

    with Mercy Health System and the impact of the

    Along with my husband Jeff, we have two daughters,

    Hannah and Audrey. My daughters were ages three
18
    years and eight months when the new hospital was
19
    opened. I remember touring the building at the
20
    grand opening and hearing about the services
    available.

           As a mother of young children, it was
23
    comforting to have a children's hospital close by
24
    and to know that our girls could receive emergency
```

1	or specialty care at a local hospital, if needed.
2	Unfortunately, at one year old, our
3	youngest daughter began suffering from significant
4	health complications. Although Audrey was
5	previously healthy, she began having seizures that
6	were diagnosed as infantile spasms, which is a
7	catastrophic type of epilepsy that often leads to
8	intractable seizures, developmental delays,
9	autism, and other behavioral or neurological
10	problems. To this day, we still don't know what
11	caused Audrey to have this disorder.
12	Audrey's condition requires treatment from
13	a team of specialists as well as frequent
14	inpatient hospitalizations. Unfortunately, as a
15	result of Mercy Health System's reductions in
16	services, our daughter's care team has eroded over
17	the past two years and we continue to struggle to
18	access services to meet her needs.
19	Audrey's neurologist was let go from the
20	health system in 2020 when Mercy eliminated
21	pediatric neurology services. The inpatient unit
22	that was familiar with Audrey was also closed in
23	2020. During a recent viral illness, when we
24	called the Mercy emergency room to seek care for

1 an increase in seizures, we were told not to bring 2 her there since they no longer had facilities to 3 help her. Audrey needs EEGs at least twice per year, 4 5 and those also now have to be done in Madison or 6 other hospitals. Audrey requires speech, 7 developmental therapies, behavioral health 8 services, and autism services. Mercy has 9 eliminated many of those services as well. 10 We were recently referred for case management to support Audrey's complex needs and 11 12 were informed that Mercy eliminated outpatient case management services. Just last week, we 13 14 received yet another notification that Audrey's 15 ophthalmologist is leaving and we will need to 16 locate another provider for that service as well. 17 The amount of time required to coordinate the providers and services, drive to out-of-state 18 19 appointments and hospitals, and appeal for 20 insurance coverage has had a direct impact on our 2.1 family's quality of life and Audrey's health and 22 developmental outcomes. 23 The Illinois Health Facilities Planning 24 Act requires that modification or closure of

1 health care facilities meets the following 2 requirements. 3 MR. ROATE: Two minutes. 4 MS. CISMESIA: I'm almost done. 5 It shall establish a comprehensive health 6 care delivery system and guarantee the 7 availability of quality care to the public and it 8 shall assure that the reduction or closure of health care services or facilities are deemed to 9 10 be in the best interest of the public. 11 The Rockford region has significant needs 12 for behavioral health care, services for children and youth with special needs, and access to 13 quality and comprehensive health care services 14 15 across the lifespan. I'm here to ask that the lawmakers 16 17 involved in this proceeding today would require 18 Mercy Health System to follow through on their commitment to provide adequate care for the needs 19 20 of our region. The actions they have taken have 2.1 reduced the available care in our community and 22 left families like mine without critically needed health care for our loved ones. 2.3 2.4 I'm asking for his body to hold Mercy

1	Health and Mr. Javon Bea accountable to ensure
2	that the services needed across our community
3	remain available and accessible at the local
4	hospitals. Thank you for your time.
5	MS. SIMMONS: Thank you. Ms. Mila Meeks.
6	You are unmuted. Please proceed. Ms. Meeks?
7	Ms. Meeks, you can proceed.
8	MS. MEEKS: Yes. I think pretty much
9	everything's been said that I was going to say.
10	I I live on the west end of Rockford.
11	I have a lot of medical issues. And it's been a
12	very it's been very inconvenient for me to have
13	to move all my doctors over to Riverside.
14	And I work for the CDC and the handwriting
15	has been it's been written on the wall five
16	years ago that they were going to move. And
17	nothing has been done to try to get us a facility
18	over here. And I think it's disgusting.
19	So I hope that we can get something over
20	here, but I don't think it's fair that they're
21	going to take our health care away. That's all I
22	have to say.
23	MS. SIMMONS: Thank you. Let's go to
24	Sarah Dorner.

1	MS. DORNER: Yes. Can you hear me?
2	MS. SIMMONS: We can. Please proceed.
3	MS. DORNER: I'm Sarah Dorner and I'm
4	speaking with you today as a member of Women's
5	March Rockford and as the president of Rockford
6	United Labor.
7	In 1992, when I was 12, my dad was
8	installing a window in the attic of our home when
9	he fell from the third story onto the sidewalk.
10	He was rushed to Rockford Memorial Hospital,
11	broken nearly everything, and was in critical
12	condition.
13	My mother, a working mother of four
14	school-aged children, had to be at the hospital
15	regularly to make critical decisions regarding my
16	father's health. He was in the hospital bed for
17	ten weeks at Rockford Memorial. I remember doing
18	my homework in his hospital room, because medical
19	crisis does not make time for the rest of the
20	world.
21	I worry for the women who cannot load four
22	children into her car on a school night to drive
23	45 minutes or an hour away to participate in the
24	medical care of her loved one. And I shutter to

1 think of the children who risk losing their father 2 because the nearest hospital is too far away. 3 My father lived. And, in fact, in 2013, 4 when I had my son at Rockford Memorial Hospital, 5 he sat with me and we discussed how happy we were 6 to be together, for good reasons. 7 Finally, I do want to say that we can 8 shout out to the west side all we want, but for those who lived their lives on the west side of 9 10 Rockford, we know that it is more than a geographic location. It is a way of life. And it 11 12 is the solidarity of having seen business after business shut down, a landscape of vacant 13 14 buildings. And those of us who truly care about 15 and love the west side, we can say that we are 16 from the west side because we come back and we 17 invest in it. 18 Maybe put some of that \$9 million a year 19 salary that Mr. Bea is making off of our medical 20 crisis into building up the west side. Bring a 2.1 union into the hospital, get people good, quality 22 jobs with dignity, and show pride in our 23 community. I'll tell you what, if you abandon us, 2.4 don't be claiming the west side, because we will

1	not claim you, sir.
2	MS. SIMMONS: Thank you. Jim Roberts.
3	MR. ROBERTS: Can you hear me?
4	MS. SIMMONS: Yes. You are unmuted.
5	Please proceed.
6	MR. ROBERTS: I'm Jim Roberts.
7	R-O-B-E-R-T-S. I've been a pastor in Rockford for
8	49 years, so I've seen a lot. I've been president
9	of the Greater Rockford Clergy Association for
10	some years.
11	I'm committed to the whole city. I mean
12	that. I have been very upset over these years
13	watching so much move east in Rockford; colleges,
14	hotels, restaurants, all kinds of things,
15	including health care.
16	The west side has been slighted over and
17	over, but at least we had a hospital, and it was
18	that was huge on the west side and a good one.
19	I worked there as a chaplain for a while. And the
20	staff was great. It was a great place and a safe
21	place.
22	I was at the Rockford Minsters Fellowship,
23	which is pretty much west side pastors, I was
24	there when Mr. Bea met with the pretty much black

1	pastors and a few of us and promised even like
2	a vow to not move services out of Rockford
3	Memorial, not move that that means
4	something. A promise means something to me. And
5	some of us were really worried about what would
6	happen but had some trust in what a promise was.
7	Well, moving Rockford Memorial
8	decimating Rockford Memorial would not be a
9	slight; it would be a critical care wound to this
10	whole community. We prayed this would not happen.
11	But we've watched services, over and over, remove
12	piece by piece, brick by brick from the west side
13	and from former Rockford Memorial. We felt
14	abandoned and misled, even betrayed.
15	And pastors don't feel that way quick
16	real quick. That's serious. The only way to
17	right this wrong is to show you care, to hear our
18	prayers, to return services to Rockford Memorial
19	Rockton Campus, and make it right. Make it right.
20	MR. ROATE: Two minutes.
21	MR. ROBERTS: I would support rejecting
22	the current application very strongly.
23	MS. SIMMONS: Thank you. Douglas Ricks.
24	MR. RIX: Yes. Thank you. My name is

1	Douglas Rix. That's, D-O-U-G-L-A-S, R-I-X.
2	Javon Bea, the CEO of Mercy Health,
3	negotiated for a new Mercy Hospital on Riverside
4	Avenue. When questioned if this would affect the
5	existing Mercy Hospital on Rockton Avenue's
6	services, Javon Bea assured the Rockford city
7	officials that the Rockford Mercy Hospital on
8	Rockton Avenue would not be dismantled or their
9	services dismantled.
10	What happened next was untenable.
11	Rockford Mercy on Rockford Avenue services have
12	been increasingly dismantled. Physician clinics
13	have been moved from Rockford Mercy on Rockton to
14	Mercy Hospital on Riverside. This is
15	unconscionable, as many people on the west side of
16	Rockford have limited financial means and depend
17	on Rockford Mercy on Rockford Avenue.
18	Consider the following. I'm confident
19	that many people who live on the west side depend
20	on physician clinics at Rockford Mercy Hospital on
21	Rockton and cannot afford a car or the gas to get
22	them to the physician clinics at Rockford Mercy on
23	Riverside.
24	It is my understanding that the emergency

1	department of the Rockford Mercy Hospital on
2	Rockton Avenue have been greatly reduced, and
3	people have been advised to go to the Mercy
4	Hospital on Riverside. The Mercy Hospital on
5	Riverside is about 10 minutes from my home. And
6	the Rockford Mercy Hospital on Rockton Avenue is
7	about 15 to 20 minutes from my house.
8	At times, in an emergency situation, every
9	minute may be the difference between life and
10	death.
11	MR. ROATE: Two minutes.
12	MR. RIX: Is 45 minutes really acceptable?
13	This is not a matter of law. It's a matter of
14	morality. And the physicians who back up this
15	application should remember what they promised,
16	first, do no harm.
17	MR. ROATE: Two minutes.
18	MR. RIX: Thank you.
19	MS. SIMMONS: Thank you. Kimberly

The news of Mercy Health's application proposal to discontinue 70 medical/surgical beds at Rockton Avenue campus of the Javon Bea Hospital is troubling. Although, it's described in the application as substantive.

Further, Mercy Health lists the reason for discontinuation as the patient census is insufficient to justify the continued operation of a second inpatient medical/surgical set of beds in the Rockton Campus, stating that the capacity at the Riverside campus is more sufficient to meet the need for health care. I differ with this, however, time does not allow me to list the statistics that disavow that declaration.

In actuality, the application is a final layer to replace comprehensive health care with specialty health care. The foundation was laid in 2015 and endorsed by the recklessness of elected officials who voted to provide a flimflam card artist displaying magic potions and advertising the London Bridge with \$25 million of taxpayer funds.

1	Consequently, this flimflam artist has
2	removed capable physicians, eliminated and
3	transferred medical service from the Rockton
4	Avenue campus, thus, creating a greater hardship
5	on the already underserved to receive
6	comprehensive health care. Suffice to say, the
7	approval of this application will not only
8	embolden the applicant to replace comprehensive
9	health care on the Rockton Avenue campus
10	MR. ROATE: Two minutes.

1 in 2020. Last month, the ER was converted to a 2 standby facility staffed by nurses with one 3 physician on call in an area that desperately 4 needs emergency services. 5 A 20-bed mental health facility wing was 6 also closed in 2020. And now, Javon Bea, CEO of 7 Mercy, has announced he will be discontinuing 8 surgical inpatient facilities and will move those to the east side. Rockton Avenue has become a 9 10 shell of its former self. People from the west side have a hard time getting to the east side. 11 12 In many, many times, there is no viable public 13 transportation. They don't have the means. They 14 don't have the wherewithal to get there. It is a 15 hardship. And it is terribly hard on these 16 people. 17 I believe that it is morally and ethically 18 irresponsible of Mercy to diminish the health of 19 human beings. Please do not allow this 20 application to move forward. And as other people 2.1 have said, the only people who seem in favor of 22 this are Mercy employees. Thank you. 23 MS. SIMMONS: Thank you. 22	So anybody that is in the poorest ZIP

24	to get care once this is closed. The campus has

1	been slowly stripped of its services over the past
2	two years, and the complete closure is very
3	obvious very obviously Javon Bea's end game.
4	He's been talking out of one corner of his mouth
5	while saying something else out of the other
6	corner repeatedly.
7	The closure will unequivocally impact the
8	poorest and most vulnerable citizens in our county

14	caring for one another and strangers, our midwest
15	nice, it stands out. It's with this reminder in
16	mind that I sadly speak in opposition to Mercy
17	Health's further reduction in services at the
18	Rockton Campus.
19	As a medical student, much of my role is
20	conversing with patients and studying medicine.
21	Over the past three years of volunteering in the
22	community learning from Rockfordians, including at
23	Rockton Hospital, I've heard numerous opinions
24	about Mercy Health. Some cite positives, but most

1 are negative. 2 Today, we hear an overwhelming majority of 3 speakers explaining the crucial role the hospital 4 plays and the harmful impact changes will bring to 5 the community. Recent history shows indifference 6 to these voices. Mercy Health speaks of 7 efficiency, forcing over 65,000 people residing 8 closest to Mercy Rockton to move several miles for 9 health care is surely the opposite of efficiency, 10 and certainly not midwest nice. 11 I urge local leaders, both political and 12 health care, to work with the community to find 13 solutions that promote healthy communities. 14 Anything less is an erosion of the shared value 15 that distinguishes us from the rest of the world. 16 Thank you. 17 MS. 17	designed and intended to ensure stability. And it
18	is being done with the purpose of ensuring
19	continued access to health care at Rockton Avenue,
20	not to shutting it down.
21	And with that, I want to thank everyone
22	for their time today and thank the Board for its
23	consideration of this project.

6	economic development advocacy organization for the
7	southwest quadrant of Rockford. I was its first
8	executive director in 1996, and I continue to be
9	on the board of directors for the organization.
10	I would like to go on record on behalf of
11	SWIFT to oppose any diminution of services at the
12	Rockton Campus of Mercy Health. The organization
13	originally opposed the cessation of a level I
14	trauma center moving a half hour east to the
15	Riverside Campus.
16	We are principally concerned with the
17	revitalization and business development and
18	neighborhood development of the southwest
19	quadrant, however, the northwest quadrant of
20	Rockford deserves our attention as well and does,
21	indeed, receive our concern.
22	There has been an incredible amount of
23	disinvestment in that neighborhood. Crime is up.
24	Numerous doctors have left that campus and gone to

1	other campuses, numerous nurses and staff have
2	left. The morale is terrible. People talk all
3	the time about how they're not happy at Mercy
4	Health and/or have left. And there seems to be a
5	systemic problem there.
6	And the promises that were made by Javon
7	Bea have not been kept and we refuse to believe
8	that this is a health care issue. It is an equity
9	issue
10	MR. ROATE: Two minutes.
11	MS. DECASTRIS: and it is a moral
12	responsibility of this hospital to retain or
13	enhance services there. Thank you for letting me
14	speak again on behalf of that organization.
