For me, I'm essentially a family physician 21 by training a long time ago, and I'm more of a 22 healthcare business executive and a healthcare 23 technology architect by passion, and I really have

2 From what I have gleaned from meeting and 3 looking at a lot of details is that this hospital

4 has tremendous potential. It is underutilized and

5 has a lot of additional capacity to provide

6 services that the community would need.

My first order of business would be to work

8 with members of the community who can actually9 articulate the needs of the community, work with

10 the 800-plus colleagues or future colleagues who

11 can actually -- who live in the community who can

12 tell us what exactly is needed, as well as our

13 work with the governing board who selflessly give

14 up their time to guide the facility and articulate

15 a strategic plan.

Now, one of the things that -- you know, I

17 have been a Midwesterner for 32 years having lived

18 across the pond in Michigan -- is that in order to

19 truly understand the needs of the community, you

20 have to become part of it. So I'm proud to say

21 that in a couple of short weeks I'm going to become

22 a permanent Chicagoan, as well, and I look forward

23 to doing that so I can truly be local and be part

24 of this community, especially the diverse community

1 I've seen in the Uptown area. I have confessed in

2 the past to a lot of people, anybody who would

3 hear, my favorite place in Chicago all these years

4 has been Devon Street where you can get a flavor

5 of all the different international communities all

6 in one place.

But again, I mean, I know that along with

8 that comes diverse needs of the people and the

9 community, and a true community hospital really

10 partners with the community to provide the care

11 and services that they need.

One of the things that the folks who are

6 revenue cycle management who have come and evaluated

7 the facilities, and our combined opinion -- of

8 course, we are outsiders looking in -- our combined

9 opinion is that the revenues are there; it's just

10 a matter of getting the processes streamlined so

11 we can actually collect on the revenues, and that

12 in itself is going to make a significant

13 difference in how the hospital does financially.

In addition to that, I have always

15 propounded and my practice has been to constantly

16 maintain communication. I'm going to be very,

17 very local. I'm going to be actually roaming the

18 halls, walking around, meeting with everyone. And

19 the thing with us is that there isn't a large

20 group of people who have to make decisions; we can

19 hospital to allow us to grow, expand our services,

20 and continue to care for the members of our

21 community. I have always loved the multicultural

22 environment at Weiss. The Uptown community is

23 especially diverse with many different cultures

24 and languages.

I came to the United States from the

2 former Soviet Union 32 years ago. With a large

3 population of Russian speaking community members,

4 I can greet patients in their language, and I can

5 give back on a very personal life. Countless

6 others at Weiss feel the same way. They give to

7 our patients in their own personal ways. Our

8 physicians and our staff truly care.

We are excited at the prospect of having a 10 buyer who is local. He will be ingrained in the

11 community, and he will understand our day-to-day

12 needs. For those reasons today I'm speaking in

13 support of the change in ownership for Weiss

14 Memorial Hospital to Resilience Health.

In my own conversation with Dr. Prasad I've

16 shared what I consider to be our top three needs

17 moving forward. I've asked him to take care of

18 our staff -- they are our biggest asset -- to help

19 us build our primary care base and continue to

20 expand our services, and to make sure we continue

21 to be present in the community.

23 know we will continue to support the community

24 that supports our hospital in so many ways. Thank

19 about our concerns regarding the sale of Weiss and

20 West Suburban Hospitals. Over the past several

21 months members our community have tracked the

22 unfolding of the proceedings through these sales.

23 We've been pleased with the work that the Board

24 has performed to date in their effort to assess

26

1 the Senior Center program I have had some of the

2 most appreciable opportunities to interface and

3 encounter one-and-one with members of our diverse

4 surrounding community. I have established

5 relationships with our community's senior

6 residential buildings and our postacute network

7 partners, offering monthly visits to provide and

8 promote complimentary health screening for their

9 residents along with other activities.

Throughout my years at Weiss I have worked 11 under three different owners. Each owner has

12 delivered a different sense of what the hospital

2 delivered a different sense of what the nospital

13 and the senior center should embody, and each one

14 has demonstrated consistent dedication to our

15 community.

I choose to work at Weiss because of my

17 own dedication to our community. While I have

18 questions about what the new owner will want to

19 focus on, I am confident that the change of

20 ownership will continue that same sense of

21 dedication in putting the community first.

22 Pipeline purchased this hospital in

23 2019 and made some wise decisions and investments.

24 Now the time has come for another new owner. I

1 the exact nature of this transaction. We've also

2 reviewed all of the documents that are publicly

3 available on the IHFSRB website about this sale

4 and realized that a number of critical questions

5 have yet to be answered about the sale of these

two hospitals.

"We believe that you're in your right to

8 demand full and relevant responses to the

We're encouraged by seeing a number of

7 Q and A from Board staff, you know, back and forth

8 with the potential owner posted. We know the

11 formally ask all of those that are possibly within

12 their purview and encourage the applicants to

13 answer in as forthcoming a way as possible the

16 The certificate of exemption lower-level

17 scrutiny gives us some pause based on the sad

18 events recently at Galesburg Cottage Hospital and

The reason for the move was, of course, to

13 continue to render medical care, gynecological

14 care in particular, stopping the obstetrical part

15 for me, but most importantly to go to a community

16 hospital with the hopes of also continuing to be

17 an educator, not only an educator to the patient

18 population but to the staff, nursing staff,

19 resident staff, and other services and to the

20 community in general, preventive medicine care and

21 the like.

With that I became director of the Women's

23 Center that was in the process of some great

24 things, expanding, and then, of course, COVID hit

1 us. We at the Women's Center, my staff and

2 Dr. Butler, we continue to render, I think very

3 good gynecological care to the patient population

4 even though COVID was very restrictive. It was

5 important because the tertiary care centers were

6 being more overwhelmed than sometimes even the

7 smaller community hospitals. So I was very

8 aggressive in continuing to service as far as

9 gynecological care.

I was only able to do this because of the

11 medical staff and others at Weiss. Weiss, now

12 that I've been here a couple of years, is a very,

13 very family-oriented community hospital. We all

14 work together. We all pick up when there is a

15 need to pick up even when it's not in our normal

16 duties. I was extremely impressed that I was not

17 handicapped as far as continuing to expand the

18 Women's Center and to render great gynecological

19 care during the COVID season.

20 Before COVID hit, of course, I was doing

21 community outreach and the like, and that, of

22 course, is going to be starting back up since

23 COVID is a little bit better around the city. But

24 most importantly, I am here to denote that I was

1 not only able to continue the gynecological part

2 of it but also the educational part of it and

3 bring a large group of patients from my private

4 sector over to the hospital and never miss the

5 tertiary care atmosphere that I had at my previous

6 institution.

7 I am very impressed that this hospital

8 works as a team to service the doctors here, to

9 service the community and go beyond the call of

10 duty as far as I'm concerned. This is the first

11 smaller community hospital that I've ever been on

12 staff, and I am very pleased with my move, looking

13 forward to the continuation of all the projects

14 that we had planned prior to COVID. It will

15 continue because I know that the community will be

16 serviced because the family at Weiss, the people

17 that you've heard from that's worked there for

18 decades, they are beyond the word committed to

19 continuing to service this community.

16 block from Weiss Memorial Hospital. I'm a

17 registered nurse and the interim president of the

18 local block club, Lakeside Area Neighbors

19 Association, known as LANA, which includes the

20 area of Weiss Memorial Hospital. I have been on

21 the board of LANA for over four years.

Three weeks ago I was contacted by a

23 representative of Weiss to inform me of the

24 potential change of ownership and if I had any

1 questions. I stated many questions on that call.

2 A week later I received another call asking if I

3 would write a letter on behalf of LANA in support

4 of the change of ownership.

5 As I not received answers to the many

6 questions from the prior week, I could not provide

those to the LANA members to review to be able to

8 have a feedback process and thus get a community

9 consensus.

Many of the concerns I have about this

11 transaction are spelled out in a letter to members

12 of the Board that you received from several

13 community organizations and which Angela Clay read

14 today. I do want to mention a few items verbally

15 today that are very meaningful to the community

16 that surrounds Weiss.

On July 15th, 2021, Irene Dumanis mentioned 18 that 100 percent of the sale of the lot would go

19 back into Weiss. The press release about the

20 change of ownership stated \$12 million would be

21 refunded by Pipeline back into Weiss from the sale

22 of the last remaining expansion land, the surface

22 of the last remaining expansion land, the surface

23 parking lot at Weiss but that \$4 million would go

24 to West Suburban.

1 Last night at the community meeting the

2 lawyer for Dr. Prasad and Mr. Patlola stated that

3 the lot sold for \$8 million, not 12 million. The

4 community and IHFSRB needs to know the accurate

5 amount of the sale, and Pipeline/Weiss needs to be

6 held accountable for the promise of the 100 percent

7 being put back into Weiss.

8 When Weiss and Pipeline made the decision

9 to renovate the parking garage structure, they

10 eliminated the rooftop community garden. As a

11 good faith gesture by the buyer, can we get this

12 back? The garden was used by local families to

13 gain access to fresh foods and to learn about

14 gardening and conservation. The community gardens

15 nearby at Clarendon Park have a waiting list of

16 over 100 people.

17 The lack of communication with the community

18 about the garden removal and no intention to bring

19 the garden back was unacceptable. We were told

20 that the gardens were damaging the structure, but

21 there are many organizations that Pipeline and

22 Weiss could have partnered with to get funding to

23 help keep this a viable option for the community.

After meeting with Dr. Prasad and

46 1 Mr. Patlola last night at Weiss, I liked what they

2 had to say and their vision for helping keep Weiss

3 in our community. I really want to take them at

4 their word. However, I and the community would

5 like some concrete examples, facility names and

6 dates of what they have done in the past that

7 would help me and community members to feel more

8 at ease with this change of ownership. When you

9 go into an interview for a job you have to provide

10 strong references and a strong résumé. I believe

11 this process should be no different.

12 If this change of ownership occurs, Weiss

13 will have had four owners in seven years. We need

14 strong leadership for Weiss so that the staff and

15 the patients are well taken care of for many years

16 to come. We also need accountability for those in

22 viability of the hospital in the long-term.

So my question or concern to the Board is

24 this. How can we make sure that the property

1 owners aren't just opportunity investors who try

2 to maximize their benefits without caring for the

3 long-term success of our community's hospital?

22 Park, I'm sure it was vital for Melrose Park.

23 They shut it down and, in fact, they were sued and

24 had to pay Melrose Park \$1.5 million, but that

1 Dr. Prasad and the new owners are projecting about

2 the growth of the hospital, et cetera, there's

3 going to be a need for expansion, and there's

4 nowhere to expand except in that presently vacant

or presently used parking lot.

6 We also think that, you know, Dr. Prasad

7 comes with a really great -- you know, we're

8 really happy about how excited he is about our

9 community. What the sale of the hospital

10 represents is and will become is another luxury

11 development in our community.

In the last 10 years we have lost over

5 what turnaround has meant to public and community

6 hospitals around the country starting in the

7 1970s. Turnaround has meant in many of these

8 instances the decimation and the closure of public

9 and community hospitals.

10 So I think that we're urging the Board to

11 look very closely at the entity that is coming in.

12 We're also urging Resilience, Dr. Prasad, and the

13 chief investor in this project to strongly -- not

14 just consider, to actually take the money and buy

15 the parking lot back.

Because if you love what you see in this

17 community, Dr. Prasad and the chief investor, you

18 are not going to have that as more and more luxury

19 housing is built in our neighborhood and more and

In 2000 our community was majority minority,

22 like 60 percent of African-American, Asian, and

23 Latino and was -- the median income was moderate.

24 Now, in the 2020 census, our community, the

3 We need to stop this trend. You can be a 4 good partner, community partner and help us with
