Re: University of Chicago Medicine - Cancer Facility Project Letter of Support

Dear Chairwoman Savage and Members of the Illinois Health Facilities and Services Review Board:

As the Senior Pastor of University Church and the Inaugural Chair of UChicago Medicine's Community Advisory Council, I write in support of the University of Chicago Medicine's (UCM) application for a proposed dedicated Cancer Facility as part of its Medical Center on Chicago's South Side. The proposed cancer facility will increase access to complex care for patients, offer convenient and compassionate care to neighborhoods where cancer is most prevalent, and bring a world class cancer facility to the city of Chicago.

Our organization is a Christian community, which affirms the transformative power of God's love, calling us individually and collectively to act for justice and to respect all creation. We value the life and teachings of Jesus, and we believe that God continues to be revealed in the world. We are a faith community that holds our theology and ethics to the light of the Great Commandment: "Love your God with all your heart, with all your soul, and with all your mind. And Love your Neighbor as yourself." (Matthew 22:37-39)

UChicago Medicine addresses institutional, structural, and health inequities through the Urban Health Initiative (UHI), a community health department to administer our population health and community benefits programs. UHI's asset-based, community development approach is accomplished through collaboration with community programs and partners, innovative strategies, and the utilization of existing resources. University Church is also located on the South Side of Chicago and is proud to be a longstanding partner of UChicago Medicine in improving the health of our community.

Residents on the South Side of Chicago are twice as likely to die from cancer compared to almost anywhere else in the United States. Cancer is also the second leading cause of death in our communities. We know that inequities in health outcomes related to cancer are largely a product of the social



determinants of health, including access to cancer prevention and care. A new cancer facility will simply provide South Side residents with healthcare resources that other neighborhoods in the city often take for granted.

Today, over half of South Side patients leave our area for the complex care they require. Research shows delayed care is directly correlated with worse health outcomes. Living farther from healthcare facilities creates longer lengths of hospital stay, non-attendance at follow ups visits, and increased overall disease burden. The proposed hospital will decrease the effects of delayed care for all South Side patients.

Building a world class cancer facility on the South Side will bring technologically advanced care incorporating the newest therapies and treatment innovations to a part of the city that has been historically underserved by the healthcare community. As one of only two NCI designated cancer facilities in the state of Illinois, a cancer facility constructed by UCM stands to reimagine cancer care for the South Side and the entire city of Chicago.

Thank you for taking the time to read this letter, and I hope you will vote to approve UCM's application to build a cancer facility that will transform the lives of so many families in my community.
