Re: The University of Chicago Medical Center ("UCMC") Project No. 23-011 (the "Project")

Dear Chairperson Savage:

It is with great honor and pride that I share the news of the University of Chicago Medicine becoming the newest member of the National Comprehensive Cancer Network (NCCN), a not-for-profit alliance of leading cancer centers devoted to patient care, research, and education. UChicago Medicine is now one of 33 cancer centers across the country that have been admitted to the prestigious alliance.

NCCN's mission is to improve and facilitate high quality, effective, equitable and accessible cancer care so all patients can live better lives. Through the leadership and expertise of member institutions, NCCN develops evidence-based clinical practice guidelines that become the standard of care in oncology in the United States and increasingly around the world. Institutions that apply for membership must demonstrate expertise in research and patient care, among other areas, that could contribute to the NCCN's mission.

In a press release issued in April 2023, NCCN recognized our "substantial work improving outcomes for underserved populations and longtime commitment to advancing diversity, equity, and inclusion. They serve an ethnically and economically diverse population and have a history of higher-than-average rates of Black patients taking part in clinical trials. Their work also includes a focus on cancer prevention through tobacco control and HPV control programs."

UChicago Medicine representatives will participate in NCCN programs and committees in such areas as professional and patient education; research; health policy; diversity, equity and inclusion; operations; managed-care contracting; oncology pharmacy; and use of electronic health record systems. These activities provide shared learning opportunities that help achieve UChicago Medicine's tripartite mission and advance NCCN's vision and goals.

This recognition of our cancer program comes at an opportune time, as we prepare to present our Certificate of Need this month to build the city's first freestanding cancer care and research facility on our campus in Chicago's South Side. Our NCCN membership and proposed facility will further drive our efforts to address a pressing challenge: the increasing cancer burden in the community and beyond. The CDC estimates a nearly 50% increase in new cancer cases from 2015 to 2050 in America. Locally, Illinoisans see a high rate of cancer incidence compared to the national average, according to the National Cancer Institute. What's more, South Side residents are twice as likely to die from the disease as those living almost anywhere else in the U.S.

My UChicago Medicine colleagues and I are confident and hopeful that our collective efforts will allow us to serve our patients and the community by integrating equity, research, innovation and compassion into the care we provide now and into the future. I look forward to seeing you at the meeting in Bolingbrook on June 27.


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National Comprehensive Cancer Network Names the University of Chicago Medicine Comprehensive Cancer Center as 33rd Member Institution

The alliance of leading academic cancer centers will include experts from UChicago Medicine Comprehensive Cancer Center on panels that create recommendations for cancer care worldwide.

PLYMOUTH MEETING, PA and CHICAGO, IL [April 4, 2023] — The National Comprehensive Cancer Network® (NCCN®) today announced the addition of the University of Chicago Medicine Comprehensive Cancer Center as the newest Member Institution to join the not-for-profit alliance of leading cancer centers. There are now 33 academic centers across the United States contributing multidisciplinary subject matter experts to 61 different panels determining the latest evidence-based expert consensus recommendations for risk assessment, prevention, evaluation and treatment, surveillance, supportive care, and survivorship throughout the cancer care continuum.

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The UChicago Medicine Comprehensive Cancer Center utilizes a broad array of unique and innovative educational, training, clinical, and research programs all characterized by a particular focus on increasing the presence of underrepresented populations in oncology and better understanding and serving their catchment area population. These include training and mentorship programs for students at all levels starting in high school, as well as partnerships with numerous community programs throughout their area.

Additionally, the UChicago Medicine Comprehensive Cancer Center was designated as a National Cancer Institute cancer center in 1974 and earned the comprehensive cancer center designation in 2008. It has been recognized for genetic classification of hematologic malignancies and for pioneering risk-adapted therapies. The UChicago Medicine Comprehensive Cancer Center also has a long history of major contributions to drug development and early-phase clinical trials.

"We are thrilled to join NCCN, which means our renowned faculty will contribute to evidence-based cancer treatment guidelines, research and education that will have an impact on patient care in the country and across the world," said Kunle Odunsi, MD, PhD, Director of the UChicago Medicine Comprehensive Cancer Center; the Dean for Oncology in the Biological Sciences Division; and The AbbVie Foundation Distinguished Service Professor in the Department of Obstetrics and Gynecology at the University of Chicago. "We need to have better cancer prevention, screening, diagnosis and treatment for our communities, especially those that are underserved and face some of the worst cancer disparities."
