## ILLINOIS HEALTH FACILITIES AND SERVICES REVIEW BOARD PUBLIC HEARING

REPORT OF PROCEEDINGS had at the hearing in the above-entitled cause before MR. GEORGE ROATE, Hearing Officer, in the Board Council Room, Village of Roscoe, Illinois, on August 13th, 2024, commencing at 1:00 p.m.



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MR. ROATE: Good afternoon. My name is George Roate. I'm accompanied by Mr. John Kniery, Board Administrator, Ms. Blanca Dominguez, Board Legal Counsel, and Ms. Sherrie Ryan, Operations Manager. We are from the Illinois Department of Public Health and represent the Illinois Health Facilities and Services Review Board.

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We are here to conduct a public hearing on the proposed project known as Project 24-018, NorthPointe Neighborhood Hospital, Roscoe. As per the rules of the Illinois Health facilities And Services Review Board, I would like to read the legal notice into the record.

In accordance with the requirements of the Illinois Health Facilities Planning Act, notice is given of receipt of a request for a public hearing for project 24-018 NorthPointe Neighborhood Hospital, to establish a 10-bed small format hospital located at 5605 East Rockton Road, Roscoe, Illinois. Project cost, \$20,760,312.

The public hearing will be conducted by the staff of the Illinois Health Facilities and Services Review Board. On Tuesday, August 13th, beginning at 1:30 p.m., the Roscoe Township Community Center, Roscoe, Illinois.

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The public hearing is to be held by the Illinois Department of Public Health pursuant to the Illinois Health Facilities Planning Act. The hearing is open to the public and will afford an opportunity for parties with interest to present written and/or verbal comment relevant to the project.

All allegations or assertions should be relevant to the need for the proposed project and be supported with two copies of documentation or materials that are printed or typed on paper size 8 1/2 by 11 inches.

Consideration by the State Board has been tentatively scheduled for the October 29, 2024 Illinois Health Facilities and Services Review Board meeting. If you have not done so, please sign in using the appropriate registration forms. One form is for individuals who want to provide testimony in favor or opposition to the project. The other form is for individuals to register their attendance who do not wish to testify.

To insure that the Illinois Health Facilities and Services Review Board's public hearings protect privacy and maintain the confidentiality of an individual's health information, covered entities as

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1 presented. And we'll call our first speaker shortly. 2 First, the Board would like to call 3 Mr. Tim McKevitt.

> MR. McKEVITT: Good afternoon. My name is Tim McKevitt, and I've had the honor of being employed by Beloit Health System 39 years, the last 10 as its President and CEO.

I would like to thank the Illinois Health Facilities and Services Review Board and the staff for the opportunity to present our project and how it will benefit the Stateline Community.

Beloit Health System is a not-for-profit community health system. We are one of the largest employers in the Stateline area, employing over 1,600 individuals. We are the only LeapFrog A rated safety and quality organization in the region, including Rockford, Janesville, and Madison, Wisconsin.

Beloit Health System owns and operates the NorthPointe Health and Wellness campus. Beloit Health System has been serving the Illinois Stateline community in South Beloit, Roscoe, Rockton. And when combined, the population now is 45,000. That is bigger than Beloit. That supports our hospital that is six times the size.

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So the community deserves its own hospital. Beloit Memorial has been serving the community and it was serving it when it opened as a municipal hospital in 1928. That is almost 100 years.

We established a physical presence in the market when we opened our South Beloit Clinic in 1988 providing primary care services for a total of 33 years out of that -- 36 years at our location. We expanded with the Roscoe/Rockton Medical Center in 1991, and operated that for 16 years until we transitioned the care when we opened up the NorthPointe Health and Wellness campus 17 years ago after due consideration by the Illinois Health and Services Review Board at their January 23rd, 2006 meeting.

The NorthPointe Health and Wellness campus, of course, offers primary and specialty care. We have 25 providers that are providing that care. Full diagnostic services including lab, imaging including CT and MRI, occupational health with close to 250 occupational health clients in the State of Illinois, a lot of whom have third-shift operation. Physical therapy, a medically integrated wellness/fitness center with 3,500 active members, an Immediate Care that is open 12 hours a day that has 11,500 visits, 24 senior assisted living

service those patients locally, close to their home, involving their family, their friends with help in the healing process. So bringing that care close to home will definitely enhance the care.

The facility will provide lower acuity inpatient care. The creation of these beds will allow us at the main hospital back in Beloit to go to all private suites which is what our patients, their families, and our staff deserve.

This will improve access to lifesaving emergency care. The new NorthPointe Neighborhood Hospital will convert its existing Immediate Care to 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, 365 days a year emergency services. Already our Immediate Care is provided by board certified emergency room physicians, specialists 12 hours a day, and this coverage will simply increase to 24 hours a day all year around.

This will help save lives by having quicker response times in the EMS services and the ambulances to the emergency room at the NorthPoint Neighborhood Hospital, in some cases saving upwards of 10 minutes on a transfer from locally or less to going down to -- either going to up to Beloit or going down to Rockford. And those 10 minutes will save lives. Every second

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apartments, and ambulatory surgery center that received CON approval in 2015, and opened for business in 2017.

And most recently, I'm very happy and proud to say that we opened up a one-of-a-kind unique service for our free-standing birth center that received CON approval in 2021, and open up in early 2024. We are happy to have the first baby that was born at the birth center with us today. In total, we have 200 employees at our NorthPoint Health and Wellness campus.

We are proposing and asking for approval for a Certificate of Need to establish a 10-bed neighborhood hospital to better serve the Stateline community on our NorthPointe Health and Wellness campus.

We believe this project will enhance care, improve access to life saving emergency care, and have minimal impact on existing providers.

It will enhance care. This morning when I went up and did rounds on the inpatient units, and it proves out throughout the year we have 20 percent of our patients on an inpatient basis are residents of South Beloit, Roscoe, and Rockton. That equates to about eight to 12 patients.

So by creating this new community neighborhood hospital that has 10 beds, we'll be better able to

counts in an emergency situation.

You keep ambulances in the community.

Previously when you go down to either Rockford or go up to Beloit, it can be up to an hour turnaround time for the ambulance. Now coming to -- coming to the new Neighborhood Hospital at NorthPointe, it can be -- that will save close to a half hour to an hour for each ambulance run, keeping those ambulances in the community better serving its citizens.

The new year we will also serve the Medicaid and uninsured patients, and will have a minimum impact on existing providers. We are already seeing these patients. These are patients as of this morning that I went up and saw as part of our inpatient. So creating the hospital down here and transferring those patients downs here won't have an impact on the hospitals or the oppositions.

Other things to consider from an opposition issue, there is state precedent. Mercy Hospital established a similar facility in Crystal Lake, and Quincy Medical Group established a similar facility down in Quincy, Illinois.

We find it somewhat disingenuous us that Mercy has opposed this project when they built this same type

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of facility in Crystal Lake, and they see the benefits of what it did for that community.

Also, Illinois Medicaid Managed Care Options, when Mercy dropped their participation in several Illinois Medicaid Managed Care Networks, NorthPointe Beloit Health System did not. We knew these people needed access to care. We continue to provide that, and will be providing that same service and that access at the new neighborhood hospital.

As discussed, the scope of the project is the creation of a 10-bed inpatient unit in existing shell space in the hospital, to modernize the immediate care to emergency room space, and add a 4,200 square feet addition to the emergency room, about 1,800 in garage space. The total project cost is \$20,760,312.

Other benefits quickly. Cost effectiveness and ease of conversion. We already have the staff in place. A lot of the infrastructure. A lot of the mechanicals are all in place to be able to create this.

The staff qualifications. These same staff are providing the care up at our main hospital. The ER doctors, and the lab techs, they are also working in our hospital, so it is an easy conversion. And we have the support departments in place. Full lab, full x-ray,

the Illinois Health Facilities and Services Review Board and everyone who took the time to be here today. My name is Sonya Hoppes. I'm the City Administrator for the City of South Beloit.

I was born and raised in South Beloit, and I'm proud to be here today to speak on behalf of my family's support for the planned neighborhood hospital.

I want to highlight the support from the Village of Rockton and the Village of Roscoe, and also the city of South Beloit for the proposed NorthPointe Neighborhood Hospital. We all agree that it is important for the development and the vitality of our communities. These three communities together are the Northern Illinois element of the Stateline community, which also encompasses nearby Wisconsin communities.

I care deeply about our city and about our region, and I want what is best for people who live here. South Beloit has suffered economic hardships over the last 12 percent -- with over 12 percent of the population living below the federal poverty limit, and 65 percent of our students qualifying for free or reduced lunches.

It is important to recognize the way that South Beloit is unique. We appreciate and value the

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physical therapy, pharmacy, and surgery.

Patient access and choice of care for safety net. We will hold ourselves to the federal EMTALA standards, and we will treat patients regardless of their ability to pay. We'll see Illinois Medicaid patients, as previously mentioned, or Managed Care Choice for our community and the residents in the Stateline community.

It will improve access to law enforcement. Not only the ER beds, but the police officers, when they come and they do medical clearing exams, DUI, post accidents.

It will create 30 new jobs at the NorthPointe campus, and 50 new construction jobs throughout the construction process.

We have very strong community support. I see a lot of familiar faces out here. We do appreciate it. We have leadership in the Roscoe/Rockton/South Beloit supporting the project. EMS, fire, and police support.

For these reasons, we ask the Board to approve the project and issue a Certificate of Need. Thank you.

MR. ROATE: Next, the Board would like to call Sonya Hoppes.

MS. HOPPES: Good afternoon, everyone. Especially

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services provided to South Beloit by the Beloit Health System.

At work every day we work hard to make sure that the services that are available are coordinated for our local families, and that they have accesses to our resources. We are trying now to grow and attract even more development and opportunity. We support the opportunity -- we support the project for helping us reach these goals.

During construction, Tim mentioned that there will be 50 construction jobs, 30 of those permanent. Local opportunities like these are exactly what we are striving for.

An important aspect of this project is that the planned hospital will provide 24-hour care to the most vulnerable members of our community that lack access to transportation and have difficulty finding someone that can drive them 30 minutes to one of the Rockford area hospitals.

Just because we reside near roads and highways doesn't mean that everyone has the same access and opportunity for travel. Having to travel out of the area is not always easy to do, and I know that it is hard when you can't easily access care. It is also

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difficult when you have a family member that is getting care, because you can't easily visit them or pick them up. These are very real concerns for South Beloit residents.

Finally, this neighborhood hospital will improve the quality of life in our community. When people can get close care to where they live, they may better be able to get the care and also have better health.

I want the residents of the city of South Beloit to have every opportunity, and that includes the excellent care and specialty doctors that this campus can offer.

I ask that you please approve the NorthPointe Neighborhood Hospital for my neighborhood and my neighbors in South Beloit.

MR. ROATE: Thank you.

Next, the Board would like to call Kim Scace, S-c-a-c-e, speaking for Senator Chesney.

MS. SCACE: Hi. My name is Kim Scace. I am here on behalf of State Senator Andrew Chesney. He's disappointed that he could not be here today to personally share his support of the NorthPointe Neighborhood Hospital. He provided me with his

I believe health outcomes will improve if we allow the campus to accept ambulances at an emergency room and provide comprehensive emergency care in the same location.

The project plan is impressive, and it is supported by extensive resources. I believe it will attract more doctors, more investment, and more opportunity for this area.

Finally, it is important to me that I represent the people in this district who are here today asking for this project to be approved. We should not let this opportunity pass us by.

Please allow the NorthPointe Neighborhood Hospital to move forward. Thank you.

MR. ROATE: Thank you.

Next, Board staff would like to call State Representative John Cabello.

MS. GRIGOROFF: Good afternoon. My name is Shelly Grigoroff, and I am Chief of Staff in the office of State Representative John Cabello. He is in strong support of this project, and he asked me to read this on his behalf.

Dear Illinois Health Facilities and Services Review Board members, and member of these great

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supportive comments, and asked me to read them.

Good afternoon members of the Board and all attendees at today's hearing. My name is Andrew Chesney, and I am this area's State Senator. I wanted to make sure my support of the NorthPointe Neighborhood Hospital was registered at today's public hearing and that it becomes part of the official record. I am sorry I could not be here in person.

I represent more than 200,000 people in the 45th Senate District, many of whom live along the state line. I work hard to make sure their voices are heard, as they want a safe and good place to live, work, and raise a family.

As a small business owner, I know how important economic development and opportunity is for many people who live in small towns in our area. And I support consumer choice and a healthy competitive market.

I'm glad the Beloit Health System is willing to invest millions of dollars to continue expanding their local campus in our district for the betterment of the people who live here. We have clearly seen that local residents want access to doctors and to specialty care of all types at the NorthPointe campus.

communities, my name is John Cabello, and I represent the 90th District in the Illinois House of Representatives.

As a police officer of over 30 years, I am proud to serve my community. I use my knowledge and experience to be the ranking member of my party on both the House Public Safety-Appropriation Committee and on the House Police & Fire Committee.

The safety and security of our communities is of the utmost importance to me, and that is why I'm in strong support of the NorthPointe Neighborhood Hospital project. I truly believe that having access to an emergency room directly in town will save lives.

To me, the decision of whether to approve this facility should be based on what is best for the families that live here. Not on what is happening or who spends what in other communities. The truth is that every minute less that a member of Rockton, Roscoe, or South Beloit communities has to travel to get emergency care is a better chance at their lives being saved or their health improving.

I served as a police officer in South Beloit, and I know these communities well. We should not have to send individuals in need up to Wisconsin or south by

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another 20 to 30 minutes if we have the resources to meet the need here at home. When someone calls 9-1-1, I know what it is to answer that call. Families should not have to sit and wait for emergency care while our ambulances are tied up making longer round-trips, drives out of the area.

At the same time, any individual in need preserves the right to decide what hospital or hospital system they choose to utilize. That is important.

The NorthPointe complex is already doing a lot of good work here, and many people are getting good care close to home. I want to see more of that. This micro hospital concept is appropriately sized for the region's needs and certainly small enough to not unduly impact hospitals from other regions.

It is my opinion that we should support this investment in our communities and their health and safety. I ask that you join me and the more than 1,000 people who have signed petitions and letters in support and approve this proposal. Please listen to the people who live here. It is their lives and health at stake. Thank you.

MR. ROATE: Thank you.

Next, the Board would like to call Mr. Todd

East, and to Afghan in 2001.

Rockton is the neighboring town up the river from Roscoe. I know I'm among many Stateline community residents who enthusiastically support the plans for the NorthPointe Neighborhood Hospital.

Over time, I have led the department in DUI arrests and received several certificates of appreciation from the Alliance Against Intoxicated Motorists. I have also received the HERO award from Mothers Against Drunk Driving.

Stopping people who drive under the influence of drugs and alcohol and taking them off the road, and sending them to treatment when possible is a step toward reducing the people who will require hospitalization or may not survive an accident with an impaired diver.

But when we arrest a driver who is suspected of driving while impaired, officers often find themselves needing to go to a hospital emergency department for clinical testing such as a blood test to determine a blood alcohol concentration.

These duties often take us well away from our communities because the testing cannot be performed at the police station and because there's not a nearby hospital. We also deal with suspects who have physical

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MR. ANDERSON: My name is Todd Anderson. I am a resident of Roscoe, Illinois.

I am concerned that the small NorthPointe Hospital may not be able to care for complex issues, which will lead to a delay in care and getting the care my family may need in an emergency.

How does my family know what illnesses and injury I can go to them for, and which illnesses or injury I need to go to a larger hospital with a trauma center?

This uncertainty about the hospital's capability makes me concerned about relying on the small NorthPointe Hospital in an emergency. Thank you.

MR. ROATE: Thank you.

Next, the Board would like to call Mr. Justin Jobst. Police Chief Jobst.

MR. JOBST: Good afternoon, and thank you for attending this hearing. My name is Justin Jobst, J-o-b-s-t. I am a Deputy Police Chief for the Village of Rockton. I've been with the Village of Rockton for over 21 years.

Prior to that 20 years of service, I also was United States Navy. I was deployed twice in 1998 Middle Page 21

or medical issues and must be seen by a licensed physician or medically cleared prior to being taken to jail.

Again, we are usually forced to travel to Rockford. The testing is relatively simple, but cannot be delayed. Depending on the circumstances, these hospital trips can take more than two hours, which is two hours away from our communities and reducing our abilities to provide a safe community.

Having an emergency department at Roscoe will reduce travel time and keep officers on the streets in our respective cities and villages.

Please approve the NorthPointe Neighborhood Hospital. Thank you.

MR. ROATE: Thank you.

Next, the Board would like to call Anna Eich. MS. EICH: Good afternoon. Anna Eich, A-n-n-a E-i-c-h. I do not think we need another hospital in our area. We already have several well-established facilities nearby. Adding another hospital would lead to competing priorities for our healthcare teams, for physicians, and nurses who are already being asked to provide care with inadequate resources.

We should instead focus on improving and

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supporting our existing hospitals to insure they meet the needs of our area residents. Thank you.

MR. ROATE: Thank you.

Next, the Board would like to call Mr. Ken -- Dr. Ken Klein.

MR. KLEIN: Good afternoon. I am Dr. Ken Klein, K-l-e-i-n, board certified non-surgical orthopedist with over 30 years at this health system where I also serve on the Board of Directors.

I fully support the establishment of the NorthPointe Neighborhood Hospital and the benefits it will bring to the Stateline community. At Beloit Health System, we prioritize treating each patient like family and delivering exceptional care.

Over the years, we have developed a comprehensive orthopedic and sports medicine program that includes evaluation, diagnosis, integrative treatment, therapy, and surgical care.

Our pain management strategy, guided by federals studies, emphasizes a multi-faceted approach focusing on mood management, physical therapy, yoga, meditation, while minimizing opioid use and opting for minimally invasive surgeries.

The NorthPointe Neighborhood Hospital

governance for over 10 years, first as a Village Trustee, and now as Village President.

Roscoe is a thriving community in northern Winnebago County, having nearly doubled in population over the last 20 years. We exceed 11,000 people. Our community's growth has created an urgent need for enhanced and accessible healthcare services. The proposed expansion of NorthPointe Neighborhood Hospital is a critical step in addressing this need.

This project not only fills the vital gaps in emergency care and primary care access, as identified in the 2023 Community Health Needs Assessment, but it also alleviates bed utilization issues in the region.

The Village of Roscoe's residential and commercial areas stretch west of Old River Road, east beyond I-90, north almost to the Wisconsin state line, and south to Machesney Park. One of the most significant advantages of this proposed hospital expansion is that it will enable village residents to receive their healthcare locally, within Illinois, without the need to leave the state for Wisconsin or travel south to the congested and overburdened hospitals in Rockford.

The creation of a NorthPointe Neighborhood

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represents a significant investment in our community, enabling low-acuity inpatient services closer to home. This will reduce travel times for families, facilitating their involvement in patient care, which is vital for recovery.

Additionally, the hospital will enhance primary care access in the Stateline area and address challenges related to timely care. It will also support physician recruitment, provide access to advanced technology, and foster collaboration among medical disciplines.

Finally, a full-service emergency department will ease the strain on our current emergency services in Beloit, offering local options for Illinois patients, eliminating the need to travel to Wisconsin or elsewhere for emergency care.

For these reasons, I enthusiastically endorse the NorthPointe Neighborhood Hospital. Thank you. MR. ROATE: Thank you.

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MR. ROATE: Next, the Board would like to call Paula Carynski.

MS. CARYNSKI: Good afternoon. I'm Paula Carynski, C-a-r-y-n-s-k-i, and I am the president of OSF St. Anthony Medical Center.

And I am here this afternoon to highlight the critical importance of OSF's commitment to charitable service within our region. Our mission is to serve with the greatest care and love. And we embody this daily providing extensive charitable healthcare to those in need.

However, the proposed NorthPointe Neighborhood Hospital in Winnebago County poses a significant challenge for us to carry out our charitable work. The Illinois Department of Public Health statistics shows an excess of 94 medical-surgical beds in our region, indicating no need for additional beds.

Adding another hospital would create unnecessary duplication of services, and strain our financial stability essential to continue our charitable work. Moreover, redirecting Illinois patients out of the state to Wisconsin will reduce Illinois providers' ability to generate funding to support Illinois patients and programs.

The beauty of the prairie, visible from my room, was more than just aesthetically pleasing. It fostered a sense of peace and wellness. This environment was not just about addressing physical health needs, but also promoting overall emotional and mental well-being. The tranquil setting allowed me to relax and recuperate more effectively, free from the usual stresses associated with hospital stays.

In addition to personal recovery, the benefits of incorporating natural elements into healthcare facilities are well-documented. Access to green spaces and natural views can reduce stress, anxiety, and depressive symptoms for patients, staff, and visitors alike.

These elements can also approve cognitive function, aiding in better decision-making and overall mental performance. For healthcare workers who are often at risk of burnout, such environments can provide a necessary respite, helping them maintain their well-being and perform their duties with greater focus and empathy.

Furthermore, the design of the birthing center encouraged physical activity, which is crucial for recovery. I found myself taking short walks around the

The large windows and natural surroundings provided a calming backdrop that eased my transition into motherhood, once again. facility, which not only helped me physically but also mentally, as the natural surroundings lifted my spirits.

This focus on holistic care, incorporating nature into the healing process, underscores the importance of not just treating illness, but promoting overall health and wellness.

My experience at the NorthPointe Birthing Center has convinced me that expanding these principles to a full neighborhood hospital would be incredibly beneficial for our community.

The proposed NorthPointe Neighborhood Hospital promises to provide a holistic healthcare experience, integrating state-of-the-art medical care with the healing power of nature. This approach will, without a doubt, enhance patient recovery times, reduce pain, and improve the overall quality of care.

Having such a facility would not only serve immediate healthcare needs, but also set a new standard for hospital design and patient care in our region. It would offer an invaluable resource for families and individuals in our community, providing a place where healing and wellness are intertwined.

I wholeheartedly support the establishment of the NorthPointe Neighborhood Hospital and encourage our

As a Roscoe resident, I'm concerned that the proposed NorthPointe Hospital might drive up healthcare costs in our area. With plenty of other hospitals already available, I'm worried that adding another facility could lead to higher expenses for patients.

I think it is important that we consider the potential financial impact on our community before moving forward with this new hospital.

MR. ROATE: Thank you.

Next, the Board would like to call Ms. Sharon Cox. Ms. Cox, C-o-x?

MS. COX: Good afternoon. My name is Sharon Cox, C-o-x, Vice President and Chief Nursing Officer for Beloit Health System.

I began my career here as a certified nursing assistant in 1998, became a Registered Nurse in 2000,

Beloit Health System's evolution reflects our commitment to advancing healthcare. The new hospital is a crucial step in enhancing patient care, supporting our medical staff, and addressing community needs. I strongly support this initiative.

I want to thank the Health Facilities and Services Review Board for its consideration and ask that it approve a neighborhood hospital on our NorthPointe campus. Thank you.

MR. ROATE: Thank you.

Next, the Board would like to call Mr. Jason Nelson.

MR. NELSON: Good afternoon. My name is Jason Nelson, J-a-s-o-n, N-e-l-s-o-n. I'm part of Beloit Health System, and I am here to discuss the NorthPointe Neighborhood Hospital project and why it is a crucial development for the Stateline community.

First, I want to express my gratitude to the community representatives and others who are here today to support this project. This proposal has been meticulously crafted to address our community's healthcare needs while ensuring cost-effectiveness. We have taken a prudent approach by adding only 10 beds to

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and have since held various leadership roles culminating in my current position.

Over the years, Beloit Memorial Hospital has grown significantly. Located in Beloit, Wisconsin, and opened in 1970, and has continually adapted to meet patient needs.

In 2010, we expanded our emergency department, making it one of the busiest in Wisconsin. By 2017, we transformed our fourth floor into the Hendrick's Family Heart Hospital, enhancing our cardiovascular care. In 2021, we renovated our pediatric unit creating the Packard Family Care Center to better serve our youngest patients.

Looking ahead, by 2027, all patient rooms at Beloit Memorial Hospital will be private, significantly improving family support, communication, and overall patient care. Additionally, the proposed NorthPointe Neighborhood Hospital in Roscoe will provide more immediate access of our high-quality care to more communities.

This facility will offer inpatient and emergency services, providing timely medical attention for our critical conditions and supporting our physician recruitment efforts in this health professional shortage Page 33

the service area, ensuring we meet demand without overextending our resources.

In the context of healthcare delivery in the U.S. post-pandemic, the concept of a small-format hospital is not novel. Despite what some detractors-primarily the competition- might suggest, this project is both sensible and necessary for the Illinois communities we serve.

A key advantage of this project is that many required services are already in place. We have existing imaging, laboratory, and pharmacy facilities that will seamlessly integrate with the new hospital. This approach allows us to leverage our current infrastructure, reducing overall costs and implementation time.

Additionally, we plan to convert our existing immediate care center into the emergency department. This conversion maximizes the use of our current facilities while expanding critical emergency services. Also, we will transfer one operating room from the NorthPointe Surgery Center to the new hospital, optimizing our surgical capabilities without unnecessary duplication.

These strategic decisions demonstrate our



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commitment to efficient resource allocation and fiscal responsibility. By carefully repurposing existing assets and adding only essential new elements, we ensure that this project delivers maximum value to our community while minimizing financial impact.

Thank you for your time and consideration. I stand with my colleagues in asking the Illinois Health Facilities and Services Review Board to approve this project.

MR. ROATE: Thank you.

Next, the Board would like to call Mr. August Querciagrossa.

MR. QUERCIAGROSSA: Good afternoon. My name is August, A-u-g-u-s-t, Querciagrossa,

Q-u-e-r-c-i-a-g-r-o-s-s-a.

I serve as the western region CEO for OSF Healthcare, which includes the Rockford and surrounding communities. I want to address the pressing issues of avoiding the duplication of healthcare services. The Illinois Department of Public Health Statistics clearly show that our region has 94 more medical-surgical beds than needed.

The Beloit Health System's proposed NorthPointe Neighborhood Hospital aiming to serve a including adding a local emergency room, because I think it is in the best interest of the residents of Rockton that I represent, as well as our Stateline community region.

For me, nothing comes before the health and safety of our residents. In Rockton, we have responsive and excellent emergency responders. We know that ambulance transport times in the region can range from 15 to 25 minutes. Every minute counts. It is not hard to think about that amount of time making a huge difference.

Having an emergency room in the community will shorten those times, ensuring prompt intervention, thereby increasing a patient's chance of survival.

Ambulances transporting patients to a facility close to home will ensure the ambulance will be promptly back in service and ready to answer the next call when Rockton residents are in need. Supporting a small-format neighborhood hospital here in our neighboring region is the right call to make for public safety.

It is not in my speech here. But on a personal level, a couple years ago my diabetes went crazy on me. I was fortunate enough to be in a place where an ambulance was close to the hospital. The

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17-mile geographic area that already includes 22 urgent care centers and emergency departments is unrealistic and unnecessary.

The healthcare needs of Roscoe and its surrounding communities are already being met through OSF and other healthcare providers. This project leads to increased healthcare costs and misled patients about the level of care available, potentially risking patient safety.

Moreover, the introduction of this hospital could exacerbate our already challenged clinical workforce shortage creating more inefficiencies.

I urge supporters of this proposed project to reconsider, and instead invest in enhancing our current healthcare infrastructure to provide efficient and effective care to our communities without redundancy. Thank you.

MR. ROATE: Thank you.

Next, the Board would like to call Mr. John Peterson.

MR. PETERSON: Wow, there's a lot of you. My name is John Peterson, J-o-h-n, P-e-t-e-r-s-o-n, and I'm the Mayor of Rockton. I'm speaking in support of the NorthPointe Neighborhood Hospital proposal before you,

NorthPointe has proven it can deliver the care that people need and want. And if our area is short on physicians, we should help prevent people having to drive out of the area for care.

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MS. HILL: Good afternoon. My name is Kerry Hill, K-e-r-r-y, H-i-l-l, and I'm the Regional Vice President of Finance for OSF Healthcare, to include Rockford and the surrounding counties.

I'm here today to make a crucial recommendation regarding the proposed NorthPointe Neighborhood Hospital by Beloit Health System.

While the intention to expand healthcare services to the Stateline community might seem beneficial, it poses a significant challenge for us as we carry out our charitable work in the region. The region already has an excess of 94 medical-surgical beds with 22 emergency department and urgent care centers, all within the 17-mile radius.

The proposed NorthPointe Neighborhood Hospital offers limited specialty services, which ultimately could lead to patient confusion and delays in critical care.

Adding another hospital campus to a well-served region increases overall healthcare costs without improving patient care. Furthermore, redirecting insured populations out of state to Wisconsin reduces the Illinois hospital providers'

equipped with the necessary infrastructure and ancillary services to provide comprehensive emergency care.

Our team is comprised of highly skilled and motivated professionals, including board certified emergency physicians, nurses, administrative staff, and laboratory and radiology personnel, all dedicated to delivering exceptional care.

Access to emergency care is a fundamental right and critical service for any community. While NorthPointe Immediate Care excels in providing urgent care comparable to other area hospitals, it is limited by its inability to accept ambulance transports.

Additionally, as an Immediate Care Center, we cannot offer the full spectrum of services available in a hospital emergency department such as a 24-hour care for acutely ill or injured patients, and the capability to admit patients for overnight monitoring and additional testing. The proposed NorthPointe Neighborhood Hospital will address these limitations.

By incorporating a full-service emergency department, we will be able to accept ambulance transports, significantly reducing transport times and potentially saving lives. Our location will have the transport times for emergency medical services, which

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1 can be crucial in any life-threatening situation. 2

Also, having an emergency department on the NorthPointe campus will allow the EMS personnel to return to service much more quickly, enhancing overall emergency response efficiency.

The addition of this hospital is not just about improving emergency care. It is about enhancing the overall healthcare infrastructure of the Stateline

In sum, the approval of the NorthPointe Neighborhood Hospital will significantly improve access to emergency services for the residents of the Stateline community, and I urge the Illinois Health Facilities and Services Review Board to approve this vital project. Thank you for your time.

MS. DONALD: Good afternoon. My name is Nommo Donald. I'm the Vice President of Professional Support Services for the Beloit Health System. With over 20 years of healthcare administration, I oversee critical services for the communities we serve including cardiovascular, rehabilitation, imaging, pharmacy, laboratory in our beautiful NorthPointe campus.

Neighborhood hospitals like the proposed NorthPointe facilities specialize in lower acuity cases, representing a growing trend in healthcare delivery. They provide an additional access point for emergencies and inpatient services.

The NorthPointe Neighborhood Hospital will be an important part of our integrated healthcare system, collaborating with the broader medical community and partnership.

Our proposal fully complies with the Illinois Health and Hospital Association criteria for small-format hospitals. Notably, it will be owned by a nearby health system, which operates a general acute care hospital.

It will be located near our other Beloit

MR. BROCKMAN: Good afternoon. My name is Zach Brockman. Z-a-c-h, B-r-o-c-k-m-a-n.

Again, my name is Zach Brockman. I'm the President of the Beloit Sky Carp, a Minor League Baseball affiliate of Miami Marlins. And our team is proud to contribute to community development by creating jobs and attracting tourism. And I'm here to express my support for the NorthPointe Neighborhood Hospital.

Our owners, Quint and Rishy Studer, who many of you know, are deeply committed to community-based development and education. They have made significant contributions to enhancing healthcare outcomes, supporting small businesses, improving urban environments, and advancing early childhood education.

This last calendar year alone they contributed over half a million dollars back to this community for those programs. Their dedication to reinvesting into community initiatives through both investment and philanthropy is evident in their actions.

As you can imagine, we have given our hard work to establish emergency services at the NorthPointe location over the years. I'm here to support the NorthPointe Neighborhood Hospital.

Beloit Memorial Hospital operates one of the busiest emergency departments in the State of Wisconsin. Many of the patients that present to our emergency department in Beloit are Illinois residents. Establishing a small hospital in Roscoe with a full service emergency department will help stem this outmigration and keep patients closer to home.

The planned project will result in the upgrade of the current Beloit Immediate Care to a full service

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promoting independence and reducing social isolation.

These programs are vital for fostering a healthier and more equitable community, and we truly value our partnership with Beloit Health System.

I support the approval of this proposed neighborhood hospital. NorthPointe services focus on wellness and patient-centered care. By prioritizing preventive care, well-being, and empowering patients to be active participants in their health journey, this provider demonstrates a deep commitment to improving the overall health of the community.

I know of many transit-dependent individuals who use NorthPointe services and do not have access to alternate transportation outside the area. When people need care that is not available locally, it is very taxing for the patients and their families close to home, especially when a hospital stay is required. Keeping area residents close to home for healthcare will enable patients to remain near their loved ones, making it easier for family members to visit them while in the hospital.

SMTD strongly supports the transition of NorthPointe to a hospital facility to meet the needs of the local community. NorthPointe is a strong community emergency department with 13 bays. Eight bays will be dedicated to emergency patients, and five bays for immediate care.

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Patients presenting at the NorthPointe emergency department will be triaged according to medical conditions, with patients presenting with emergent conditions like uncontrolled hypertension, pneumonia, or dehydration going to the emergency bays, and patients who historically used NorthPointe Immediate Care for less urgent conditions like respiratory infections, sprains, and minor lacerations will be sent to the Immediate Care area.

Importantly, there is flexibility in the emergency department design. If additional emergency bays are needed, we can convert immediate care bays to emergent bays so we can quickly address those with emergent conditions.

The planned hospital will alleviate over utilization at Beloit Memorial Hospital and allow patients to be treated closer to home and where they can be predictably -- predictably rely on their family's support.

As you may gather, I know a pretty good deal about the politics, economics, and operation of a regional healthcare. Most importantly, I've been a Roscoe and Boone County resident for 30 years, caring for extended family and raising my own family. So I'm speaking to you as an emergency physician who lives and works in this community.

I'm not a hospital spokesman. I'm not an

traumas. Very sick children. And we do a damn good job of resuscitating, stabilizing, and then transferring them.

The infrastructure is solidly in place. It is not a difficult step to become a full-service, 24-hour emergency department if given the proper authorization.

Anyway, I do wholeheartedly support this. I mean, it is a no-brainer. We need the care in the area. Beloit Health System is willing to provide it. Thank you.

MR. ROATE: Thank you, sir.

Next, the Board would like to call Mr. James Bird.

MR. BIRD: Not sure I can follow that, but I'll try. My name is James Bird, B-i-r-d.

Good afternoon. I'm the CFO for the Beloit Health System. I'd like to highlight our financial stability, which puts us in an ideal position to undertake the NorthPointe neighborhood Hospital project. We are proud to report that Fitch's Ratings has awarded us an A bond rating with a stable outlook.

This rating reflects our solid market position, stable operating performance, and moderate leverage position. It is a strong vote of confidence in

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administrator, a lawyer, or salesperson for a large health care system. We have heard from some hospital administrators about these 94 excess critical care beds in the Rockford area. Please show me where they are.

I tell you, for the last few years, we have had increasing ER volumes. We are boarding patients in the emergency departments. Boarding means that after we make the decision to admit the patient, they may stay in the ER for two hours, four hours, 12 hours waiting for a bed to become available.

It is not just Beloit. It is every Rockford hospital. Swedes, OSF, Javon Bea, UW. We are all seeing this.

I'm proud to work at NorthPointe Immediate Care. It is a great service and medical asset to our community. But urgent care really doesn't sum it up. It is a state-of-the-art facility staffed by EM boarded docs, complete with full radiology, pharmacy, and laboratory.

Now, we do see the typical sprains, aches, pains, cuts, minor complaints. But what people don't realize is that we get really sick patients that walk through our doors. They don't come by ambulance. But I have seen heart attacks. I have seen strokes. Major

serving the Stateline communities of Roscoe, South
Beloit, and Rockton, through the NorthPointe Health and
Wellness campus in Roscoe.

For those of you unfamiliar with NorthPointe, it is a unique health and wellness campus spread over 122 beautiful acres restored northern Illinois prairie conveniently located off Interstate 39.

Our campus offers a comprehensive range of

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Today I am here in order to express my support for the NorthPointe Neighborhood Hospital. Across the United States, both emergency departments and EMS systems face increasing pressure to deliver more services with fewer resources.

For our area's EMS professionals, providing quality, timely, and efficient patient care is complicated by delays in transporting patients to emergency departments that are located a significant distance from their response areas. Often times this is up to 20 to 30 minutes away.

These delays not only reduce the availability of EMS units to respond to other emergencies. These delays can also lead to negative patient outcomes.

Currently there is no emergency department in the Roscoe, Rockton, South Beloit community area. Although our NorthPointe Immediate Care center can provide timely services for urgent medical issues, it cannot accept emergency ambulance transports.

The establishment of an emergency department on the NorthPointe campus would enable us to accept these ambulance transports. A flexible design of the emergency department will allow us to convert immediate care beds to urgent care beds during high-volume

services tailored to meet the needs of the community including NorthPointe Health providing diagnostic services, immediate care, and physician clinics.

NorthPointe Wellness, a medically integrated fitness center with state-of-the-art equipment and amenities. Our NorthPointe Terrace is our assisted living community. We have our NorthPointe Birth Center offering a comfortable and supportive environment for childbirth. NorthPointe Surgery Center, a licensed ambulatory surgical center for same-day surgery.

For strategic investments in physician services, we have significantly improved the healthcare access in the region, unmatched by any other health system.

In addition to my role with the Beloit Health System, I also serve as a firefighter EMT with the Harlem-Roscoe Fire Protection District. This dual role gives me first-hand insight into the EMS challenges the Stateline community faces.

A full service emergency department in Roscoe would be transformative for our community. It would reduce the patient wait times and decrease ambulance transfer time by 50 percent, freeing up EMS personnel for the next emergency call within our district.

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The impact of this development cannot be overstated. It would enhance patient outcomes, ensure our ambulances remain available, and ultimately save lives.

I urge the Health and Facilities Services Review Board to approve this essential initiative. Thank you.

MR. ROATE: Thank you.

Next, the Board would like to call Jeni Hallatt.

MS. HALLATT: Good afternoon. I'm Jeni Hallatt. J-e-n-i, H-a-l-l-a-t-t. I'm Vice President of Operations at Mercyhealth. And we are joining with other healthcare providers in the region today to oppose this unnecessary project.

I firmly believe this project is unnecessary and will not only call negative impact on facilities in the area, but also confusion for the residents in the community. The residents in Rockton and Roscoe and the surrounding communities are blessed with having great access to healthcare.

There are so many options. Within a 17-mile radius of the proposed project, there are seven hospitals, four of which are here in Illinois. Two of

project simply does not meet the Board's standards and does not even meet the Board's stated mission to increase unmet access and lower costs for patients.

For these reasons and many others, we believe this project should be denied. Thank you.

MR. ROATE: Next the Board would like to call Mr. Tom McCawley.

MR. McCAWLEY: Good afternoon. Thank you for being here. My name is Tom M-c-C-a-w-l-e-y. I'm one of the Vice Presidents for Beloit Health Services.

The Roscoe community has been federally designated as a health professional shortage area because too few primary care providers practice in the area. We are dedicated to addressing these access challenges using a strategic approach of physician recruitment and retention.

We work with national organizations to benchmark our efforts, ensuring that we employ a data-driven and candidate-centric strategy tailored to the specific needs of the communities we serve. As it stands, the physician office hours offered at our NorthPointe campus have vastly improved access to our patients who have appointments without having to travel to Wisconsin.

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those are Level 1 trauma centers. There are nine existing emergency departments, and a tenth under construction. There are 12 urgent care facilities, including Mercyhealth Urgent Care which is just a mile away.

In my experience, the majority of urgent care is just that. Urgent care. And the numerous urgent cares in the area can continue to support the existing need.

In their own application, NorthPointe currently serves just 27 patients per day. That is about two an hour based on their hours of operation. And other urgent care sites also have capacity. Patients requiring emergency level services have fast access to nine existing ERs in the area.

Our initial review of this application reflects that the types of patients that could be served at this facility are already being cared for in existing facilities. And patients with more acute needs would not be able to be treated in this low acute setting.

The Board's own need methodology sets the foundation for consideration of this project. And those projections, as already mentioned, do show that the area already has an excess of 94 medical-surgical beds. This

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The proposed NorthPointe Neighborhood Hospital will be instrumental in advancing our recruitment and retention objectives. Expanding our continuum of services will not only improve the quality of care we can provide, but also make our campus more attractive to qualified medical professions.

With this proposal, we'll be able to recruit primary care physicians, as well as other primary and secondary specialists by offering access to state-of-the-art facilities and equipment, a well-rounded group of physician colleagues, and the ability to consult with specialists. All while allowing them to retain autonomy and make practice decisions on a local level.

Our strategy is not just to recruit talent, but to also foster a positive work environment with the supportive culture and a sense of community. We value work-life balance and consistently work to assess and improve job satisfaction by among other things, recognizing and rewarding our staffs' achievements.

The NorthPointe Neighborhood Hospital is a critical component in expanding primary care access, supporting our recruitment and retention efforts, and ultimately addressing local healthcare needs.

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It truly represents a significant step toward ensuring that the Stateline community has appropriate access to the healthcare services that promote health and wellness.

The origination of birth centers is to provide a calm, comfortable setting for low-risk pregnant patients that feels more like home than a medical facility. With an emphasis on natural unmedicated childbirth, we are proud of the services we provide to these expecting mothers at the birth center.

Patients in labor at the center are carefully monitored and assessed to ensure that the births that

Today, I'm here to express my strong support for the establishment of the NorthPointe Neighborhood Hospital.

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will occur at the center will not require interventions. The national experience is that freestanding birth centers generally predict this very well.

However, as we all know, labor and delivery can sometimes become unpredictable and more complicated than expected. And it is in these cases that the mother may need to be transferred to a hospital to give birth. If the new NorthPointe neighborhood Hospital is approved, we will have ready access to emergency services to properly assess, stabilize, and transfer a patient if necessary.

I will typically be the patient's physician to take that transfer, and I would be able to meet the mother at the NorthPointe Emergency Center to further assess the situation and make a plan for a safe birth.

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As Mr. McKevitt mentioned in his opening remarks, the NorthPointe campus, which opened in 2007, offers a wide range of services, including NorthPointe Terrace, an assisted living facility that serves numerous residents. However, what the campus currently lacks is a hospital inpatient and emergency room services.

Assisted living residents are typically frail and often have multiple comorbidities, making them more susceptible to hospitalization compared to younger patients for similar illnesses. For instance, an elderly patient with a urinary tract infection might require hospitalization to receive IV antibiotics and to monitor for complications such as cellulitis. Sudden onset of confusion, a common complication, often necessitates hospital monitoring, especially for patients living alone.

The proposed NorthPointe Neighborhood Hospital will be just steps away from the NorthPointe Terrace. The proximity will facilitate the quick transport for residents who require emergency care or hospitalization. Additionally, it will alleviate the burden on families who play a crucial roll in patient care, as they are already familiar with the campus and will find it easier



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to navigate the smaller hospital compared to a large acute care facility.

The establishment of the NorthPointe
Neighborhood Hospital will significantly improve access
to healthcare to residents of NorthPointe Terrace and
the broader Stateline community. By providing local
access to vital medical care, including emergency
services and lower acuity medical care, the hospital

Beloit Health System has had a significant and positive impact on healthcare in our community. As a foundation board member, I reaffirm our commitment to transforming healthcare delivery. A health system's mission must ensure that everyone has a medical home for comprehensive and personalized care.

We pledge significant resources to achieve this, focusing on enhancing facilities and using technology to streamline the care coordination. This will improve care quality and reduce service duplication, and this is particularly important at the facility in our northern campus located in the -- in the

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This campus currently operates a birth center, a fitness center, surgery center, immediate care center, diagnostic facilities, an assisted living facility, as well as physicians' offices. What we are missing is a small hospital with an emergency department. The investment is comparatively small, but the impact will be extremely positive for the area residents.

As a small hospital, it will strengthen competition, while not harming any of the bigger health systems that haven't brought many services to Roscoe. A small hospital in Roscoe will provide us with a local alternative for emergency care and less complex inpatient stays.

The closest emergency department is that of Beloit Memorial Hospital. That program is extremely busy and can have long wait times. The NorthPointe neighborhood hospital emergency department will not only be closer to home, but with shorter wait times allowing patients the ability to return home more quickly as well.

Additionally, while the current immediate care center provides excellent treatment, I understand it cannot accept ambulances. Having an emergency department in Roscoe will reduce ambulance travel times

Our assessment revealed a shortage of primary care providers in northern Illinois. To address this,

I think it is important to consider the potential financial impact on our community before moving forward with this hospital. Thank you.

Not all traumas or emergencies require a Level 1 trauma center.

years. I was also the former Chairman and CEO of Regal
Beloit Corporation. And having served in that role, I
recognize and understand the critical role that a robust

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that didn't require a drive through city traffic. Proximity to the Interstate is also a plus.

Fire departments take patients to the facility of their choice. Patients decide according to insurance coverage and/or severity of injury. Javon Bea Hospital will still receive patients from outlying towns.

For the last 40 years, Mercy's presence in the Rockton/Roscoe area has been limited to OB GYNE and pediatrics. That clinic was closed during COVID precautions. Shortly after the Beloit Health System proposal was made public, we were told Mercy would open a 24/7 immediate care. Why now, after 40 years. The timing appears to be a counter-measure to block NorthPointe expansion.

Threats and promises were made during negotiations. One of those promises was to keep the Rockton Avenue Emergency Room open. Mercy refused to accept certain insurances, resulting in the more indigent patients seeking other treatment options.

Smaller patient load contributed to the closure of the Rockton Avenue ER.

NorthPointe has provided much needed services and has been a respected community partner. An emergency room and hospital beds for those who need

The two lime green As represent the letter grades that the health system has received from LeapFrog, an independent watchdog group. Beloit Health System is currently the only health care organization in the region that can make that quality achievement claim.

My wife Beth and I have been residents in Roscoe since 2006, and we raised our two children in this wonderful community. In that time, as I'm sure most of you can experience, we had our share of trips to the hospital for my daughter's severely dislocated hand, my son's third-degree burns from boiling water, and my wife's two broken bones.

While the care we received from the Beloit Health systems for those emergencies was wonderful, it would have been much less stressful for me as the driver with additional competition. But the anomaly that really already exists in the county is known to raise health care costs. And so this competition will be something that is very good for competition in the immediate area.

I did want to address this question about excess of beds, and I want to echo Dr. Abernethy's statement about the technical access of beds which appear to not exist. The entire state of Illinois is mostly technically over bedded in medical-surgical beds. The whole state has in excess of 4,046 accessed beds.

But most recently, I have spoke to a health planner at one of the largest health systems, and she said that they are bursting at the seams and they do not know where to put patients, similar to Dr. Abernethy's concern. This bed inventory does not help the board as much as we would like it to.

There have been some efforts in the past to hold hospitals accountable to prove their beds actually exist and could be used to care for a patient. We do know that in this area, the Belvidere Hospital is not taking admissions, and they have over 30 beds that are not used. So you really ought to take a closer look and find out if there are really just beds sitting open, or

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of the car going 80 or 90 miles on Route I-90, and much safer to have had the hospital right here down the road.

Thank you for your trust, and I support the neighborhood hospital.

MS. FRIEDMAN: I'm Kara Friedman, K-a-r-a, F-r-i-e-d-m-a-n. I'm one of the attorneys for Beloit Health System. I'm a health planner for many years. I work at a law firm, Polsinelli.

First of all, I'm curious to know of the people that have come here today and indicated that they are concerned about confusion about where patients are going to go. I have honestly never heard a community resident oppose creation of a healthcare system in their community except for maybe one time when Lurie Children's Hospital was putting a helicopter pad near their condo building. So it seems a bit disingenuous that people wouldn't want this healthcare resource in their community.

Some people are concerned about rising costs

perhaps some of those beds are ghost beds.

What we do know is that Illinois residents living in the Stateline community leave the state for care in Wisconsin. And the low admissions alone justify the planned 10 bends.

The only other thing that I think is really important to note is if your family member needs emergency medical services, call EMS. My son just got certified as an EMS technician. And they learned a lot about field triage, and whether patients are going to -- there's a whole EMS system that makes sure trauma goes to a trauma hospital, heart attack or stroke goes to a specialized center that has cardiac cath or a primary stroke center. So I'm not concerned about patient confusion if this hospital actually has an emergency room and beds. Thank you.

The proposed NorthPointe Neighborhood Hospital project aims to address critical healthcare needs in the underserved Stateline community. However, the opposition from larger systems, OSF and Mercyhealth raises concerns about healthcare consolidation and market competition. Both have recently or are currently part of transactions to consolidate their markets.

The NorthPointe project would expand healthcare services in an underserved area, improving access to care for local residents. Efforts by larger systems to block this proposal could negatively impact healthcare access and limit patient options.

The coordinated attempt by competing health systems to exclude a smaller provider highlights problematic trends in healthcare consolidation.

Certificate of Need laws, originally intended to control costs, are being exploited to block competition from smaller market entrants. As recently reported by Beckers, large health systems have reported significant profits in 2024, with average operating margins reaching nearly 5 percent in recent months.

Smaller organizations like Beloit Health System have less financial flexibility compared to larger competitors, though it has maintained an A rating incredible job every day being our heros, other area spokespersons and elected officials, and my colleagues including physicians, staff, leadership team, board members. It is an incredible honor to work with you as we have continued to plan for this neighborhood hospital in Roscoe.

Again, I want to thank you Illinois Health Facilities and Services Review Board staff who planned and facilitated this meeting.

I want to conclude this meeting by really going back to our esteemed CEO McKevitt's remarks when he said the planned NorthPointe Neighborhood Hospital, again, is an extension of our original vision of the Roscoe campus.

And we are proud to further invest in the health, but also the wellness of the Roscoe campus, and the residents, and the Stateline community members that really this development is going to be targeted in the state of Illinois.

Neighborhood hospitals offer similar service lines as more traditional hospitals, but with a smaller footprint supporting areas that do not need a large hospital, but lack services immediately in the community.

Mercyhealth and OSF have substantially more cash reserves than BHS along with other indicators of financial strength.

Small, independent hospitals often introduce innovative approaches to healthcare delivery, and excluding smaller competitors, may impede the introduction of new ideas and more efficient practices in the market.

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10 beds is a typical size for these hospitals. Neighborhood hospitals provide better geographic access to patients and improve the ability of hospitalized patients to receive family care when they need it most. This is particularly important in medically underserved communities like Roscoe.

Neighborhood hospitals are gaining traction as more healthcare providers optimize service lines to develop patient-centered value-based care, satisfying consumers' desire for convenience and ease of access. As mentioned, the Illinois' Health and Hospitals Association supports the development of these models.

And as my colleague Ms. Nommo Donald mentioned earlier, our proposal is consistent with those guidelines in the way they have been developed. In fact, our proposal is very similar to the small format hospital that Mercyhealth recently opened in Crystal Lake.

Keep this in mind when you hear any opposition to this model. Because obviously if the format benefits our competitors, the model is okay. But if it is proposed by a competitor, as this proposal is, there's a tendency for that opposition to become a little bit more scrutiny applied to the plan that we are putting in.

And even level criticism against the model that they just recently deployed.

This is a small extension of our current footprints, and objections, again like those from Mercyhealth, are really telling of a health system that goes to great lengths to pull out all of the stops to expand its market share while trying to block another mission-based non-for-profit health system that is also qualified as a charitable organization, especially given its beliefs in and the development, again, of their own small format hospital in Crystal Lake. It makes these objections seem to really lack genuine merit.

And as the Mercyhealth CEO in his testimony at the time mentioned how important the continuity of care is relative to outpatient services, all I can say is we agree. We have built the outpatient infrastructure as our current campus is set up with a broad stroke of outpatient services, primary care, and specialty physicians, many of which are in the room today.

While urgent care centers now play a more prominent role in healthcare delivery than they did say 10 or 15 years ago, they fall short of what the Stateline community needs. This neighborhood hospital will provide more comprehensive care than urgent care

community members. This is what it is all about. And they are offering their support. They are offering their support for our plans.

We have built a great track record in expanding healthcare resources for the Stateline community. And this community's support, sincerely, it means a lot. That is why we are in healthcare. We hope the support informs the State Board, as we move forward to present our plans in fall.

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centers, but without the perceived complexity of a larger hospital.

At the same time, as a Stateline location of our hospital is in Beloit as a satellite location, we'll have an opportunity to transfer patients who have specialized care needs that will more be easily addressed either on our campus or another provider's campus, of course pursuant to the patient's choice.

The planned NorthPointe Neighborhood Hospital will increase access to emergency care and inpatient care. The existing immediate care center does not meet all of the needs in the community. And nothing about expanding the hours of that operation or that of Mercyhealth's urgent care facility will address the need for emergency patients, and especially not those who require hospitalization.

Expanding hours will not allow the immediate care center to accept patients with cardiac or other serious emergent illnesses and injuries, nor can they accept ambulance transports. Urgent care services do not address emergency access and needs in Roscoe, Rockton, or South Beloit.

To conclude my remarks, I'm happy to deliver to the agency a petition that is signed by over 1100

MS. FRIEDMAN: Just briefly, I'm Kara Friedman again. I just wanted to point out, because a lot of people don't know about the complexities of health planning and that sort of go over our heads here.

Here in the State of Illinois, an existing hospital is permitted to add 20 beds every two years without Planning Board approval unless they spend in excess of about \$17 million.

So all these other hospitals in the area are free to continue building and to splitting out their projects so that in each project they spend less than \$17 million. And this leads to two and a half, \$3 billion of spending every year.

So I think that looking at this as a really significant project, it is for the community of the Stateline residents. But this is a very small project, both cost-efficient and relative impact that it would have on the area.

So thank you for letting me provide that just additional context.
